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# Creating a visual

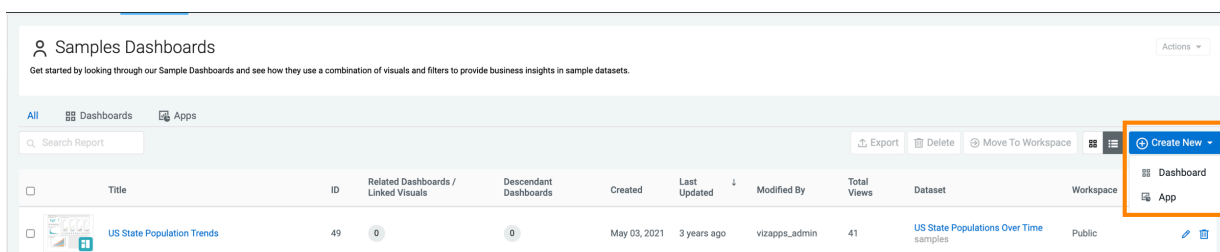
You can easily create new visual representations for your data in Cloudera Data Visualization.

## About this task

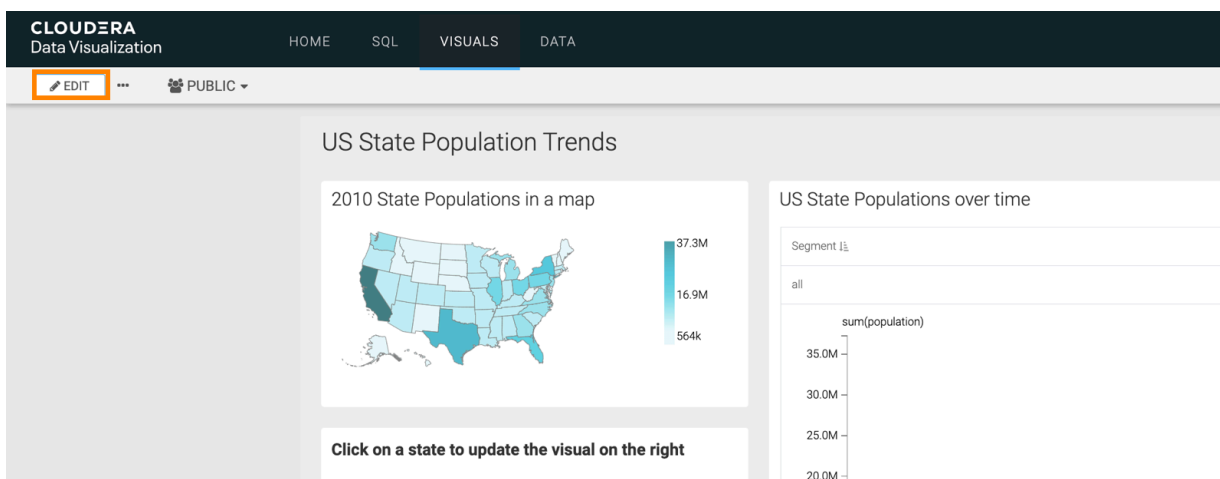
The following steps demonstrate how to create a new visual.

## Procedure

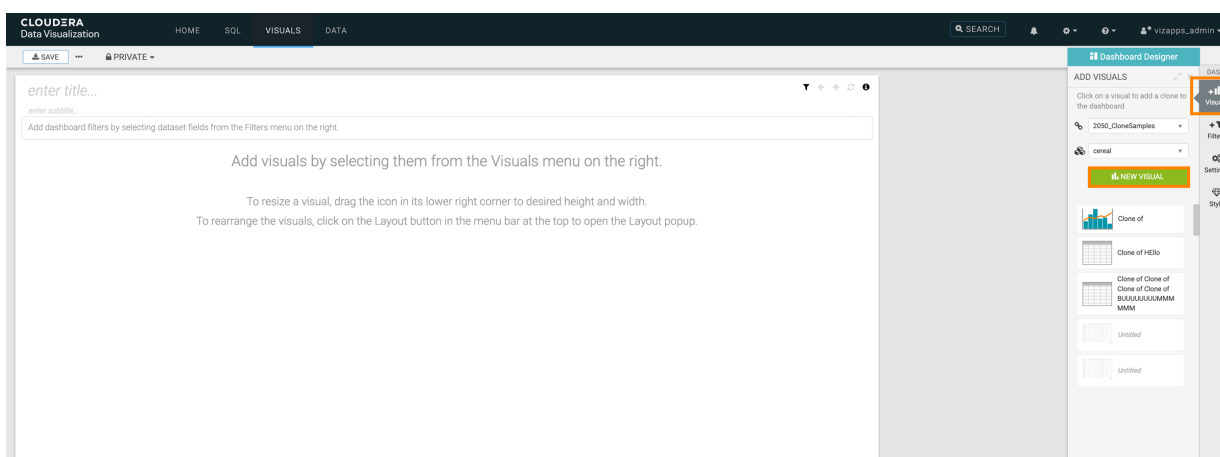
1. On the main navigation bar, click VISUALS.
2. Click **Create New Dashboard** to open a new, blank dashboard.



If you already have an existing dashboard and you just want to add a new visual, open the dashboard and click **EDIT** to make changes to it.



3. In the Dashboard Designer interface, open the Visuals menu from the side menu bar and click **NEW VISUAL**.



- 4. The Visual Builder appears.  
By default, a table visual is selected. For more information, see the *Visual Builder* overview.
- 5. Choose the visual type you want to build.  
In this example, the Bars visual has been selected.

7. Populate the shelves of the visual from the Dimensions and Measures fields:

In this example, the following fields have been added:

- state dimension on the X Axis shelf
- population measure on the Y Axis shelf



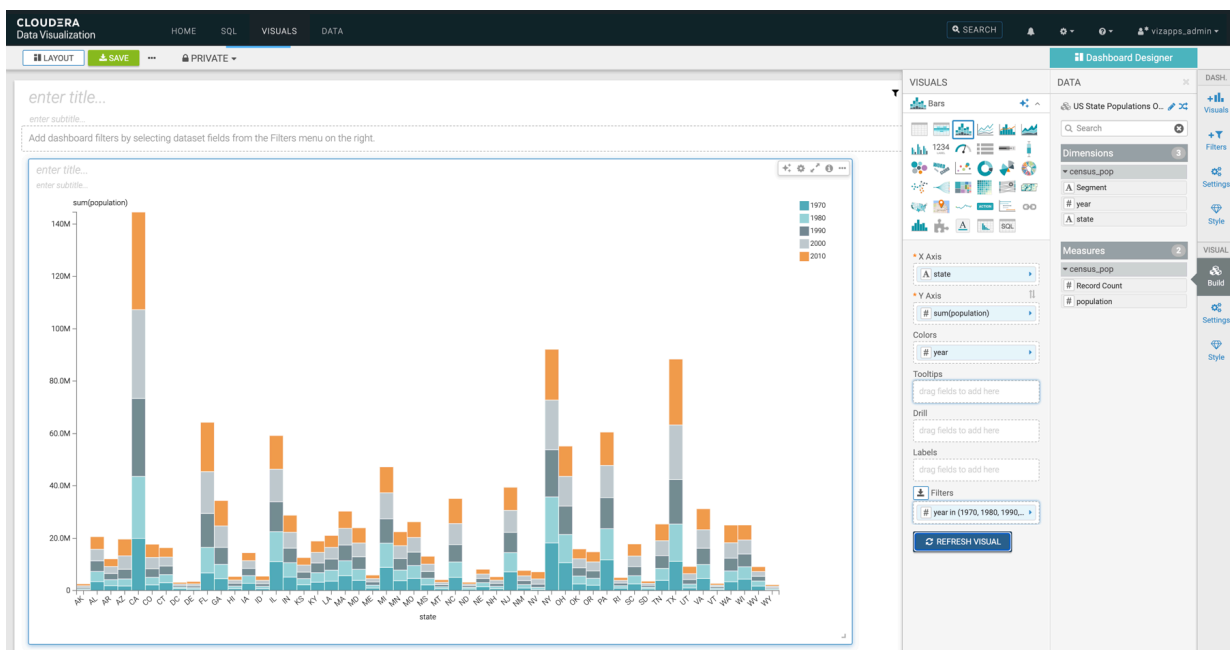
**Note:** The population measure appears with its default aggregation, as sum(population).

- year measure on the Colors shelf
- year measure on the Filters shelf



**Note:** The Filter for year module opens automatically. Years 1970, 1980, 1990, 2000, and 2010 have been selected.

8. Click REFRESH VISUAL.



9. Click the enter title... field and enter a name for the visual.

- In this example the title 'Recent US Census Results by State' has been added.
- You can also click the enter subtitle... field below the title of the visualization to add a brief description of the visual.

10. Click SAVE at the top left corner of the Dashboard Designer.

## Editing a visual

In Cloudera Data Visualization, you can edit an existing visual to update its configuration, data, or appearance.

### Before you begin

You must have Edit access to the dashboard that contains the visual to be able to edit it.

### Procedure

1. Open the dashboard that contains the visual in Edit mode.
2. Click the visual to select it.  
The VISUAL menu appears in the right-hand panel.
3. Click Build to open the Visual Builder panel.
4. Make the required changes.
5. Click REFRESH VISUAL to preview your changes while making your edits.
6. When you are satisfied with your edits, click SAVE in the top-left corner of the Dashboard Designer.

## Cloning a visual

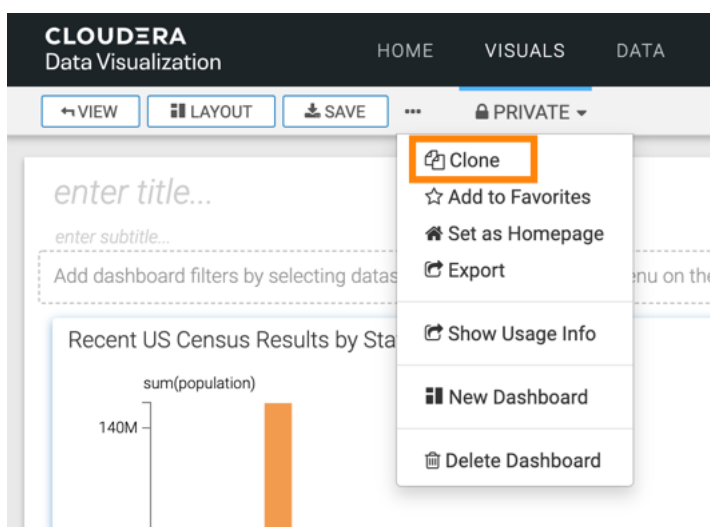
In Cloudera Data Visualization, you can create a new visual that is a clone of an existing visual.

### About this task

The following steps demonstrate how to clone an existing visual.

### Procedure

In the Dashboard Designer, click the (ellipsis) icon at the top of the interface, and select Clone.



You should briefly see a green success notification. The main area of the screen now has a new visual titled Clone of...[Source Visual].

The SAVE button is not highlighted, because the process adds a cloned, unlinked version of the visual to the bottom of the dashboard. This cloned visual includes any setting or shelf changes you made before clicking Clone.

After working on the visual, you can rename and save it.

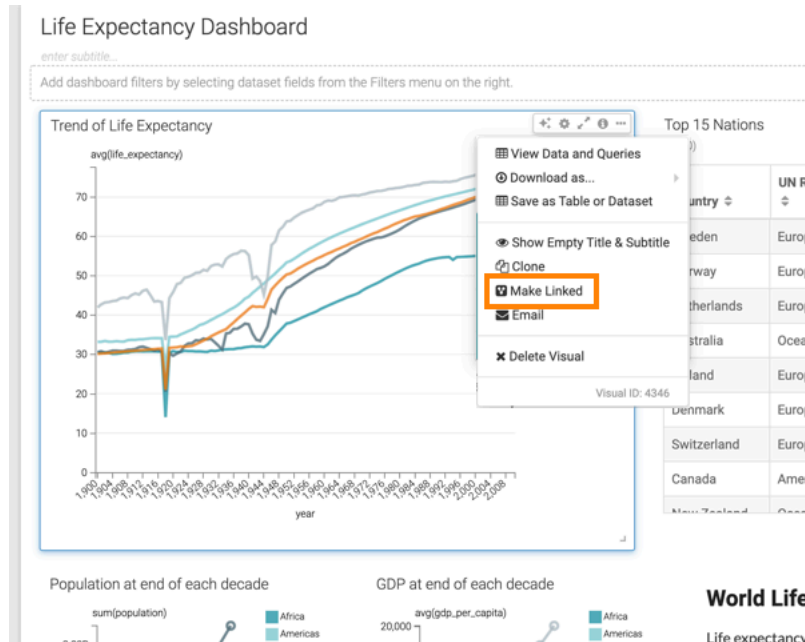
## Linking visuals

In Cloudera Data Visualization, you can link visuals and these linked visuals can be shared across various dashboards and sheets within one dashboard. The following steps demonstrate how to make an existing visual as linked.

### Procedure

1. Open a dashboard in Edit mode and hover over a visual until its control widgets appear.
2. Click the (ellipsis) icon at the top of the visual to open the supplemental menu.

### 3. Select Make Linked.

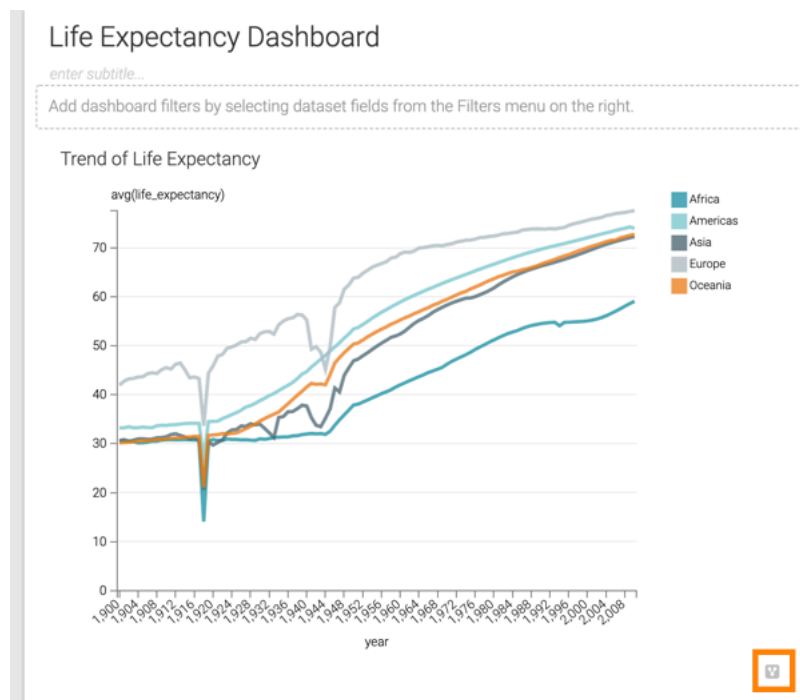


**Note:** Linked visuals cannot be deleted when they are dropped from all dashboards. They are still available to be added in future work.

### 4. Confirm the operation by clicking LINK.

## Results

The visual can now be used in other dashboards. You can see a small icon in the lower right corner of the visual showing the linked designation.

## Unlinking visuals

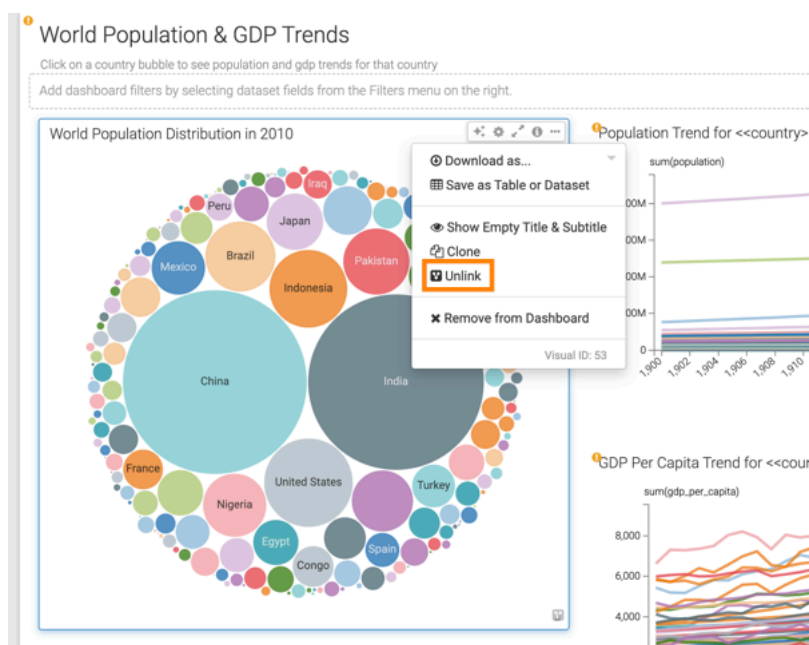
In Cloudera Data Visualization, you can unlink linked visual to break the sharing across dashboards.

The following steps demonstrate how to unlink a visual.

### Procedure

1. In the Dashboard Designer interface, hover over the visual until its control widgets appear.
2. Click the (ellipsis) icon at the top of the visual to open the supplemental menu.
3. Select Unlink.



4. Confirm the operation by clicking UNLINK.

When a visual appears in multiple dashboards, it cannot be unlinked. You can clone it instead. Confirm the operation by clicking CLONE.

After you unlinked the visual by cloning it, it no longer has a linked designation. it is completely independent of the original visual, and its title is Clone of ...[Original Name].

5. You can change the title of the visual to the original title, or use something different.
6. At the top left corner of the Dashboard Designer, click SAVE.

### Results

The visual no longer has the small icon in the lower right corner showing the linked designation.

## Emailing a visual

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to share visuals in an email. You can send them immediately, schedule them at specific times and intervals, or through a triggered response when reaching a specific monitored threshold.

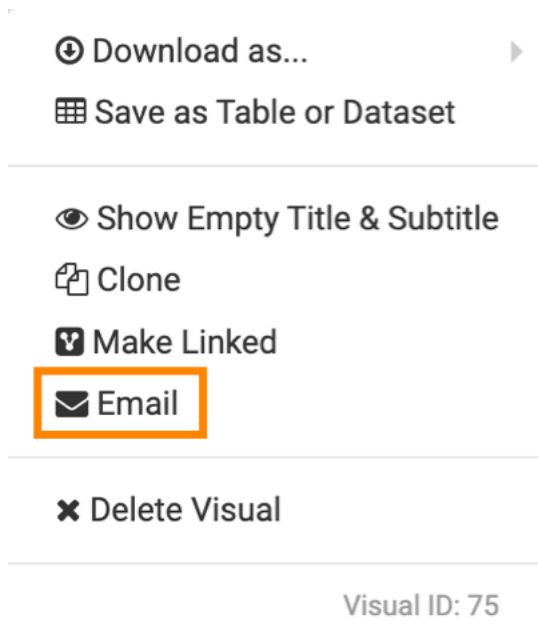

## Downloading a visual

Cloudera Data Visualization supports downloading visuals and their underlying data in multiple file formats for sharing, offline access, or further analysis.

### Downloading a visual as a PNG file

You can download a visual as a PNG image in Cloudera Data Visualization for easy sharing or offline viewing. The downloaded file name includes the visual's name and a timestamp indicating when the file was generated.

#### About this task

This feature is available for all visual types. When you download a visual as a image, Cloudera Data Visualization captures it as a PNG file that includes the visual, its title, and subtitle. If the visual contains annotations, they are also included alongside the visual.

## Removing a visual from a dashboard

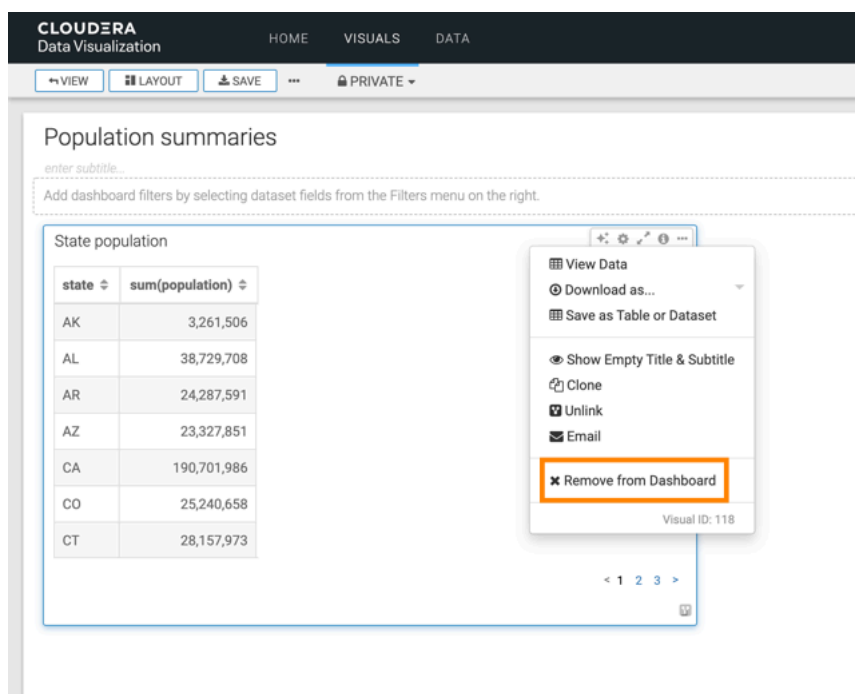
In Cloudera Data Visualization, you can remove a linked visual from a dashboard without deleting it from the system. This is useful when you no longer need the visual on the current dashboard but want to keep it available for reuse.

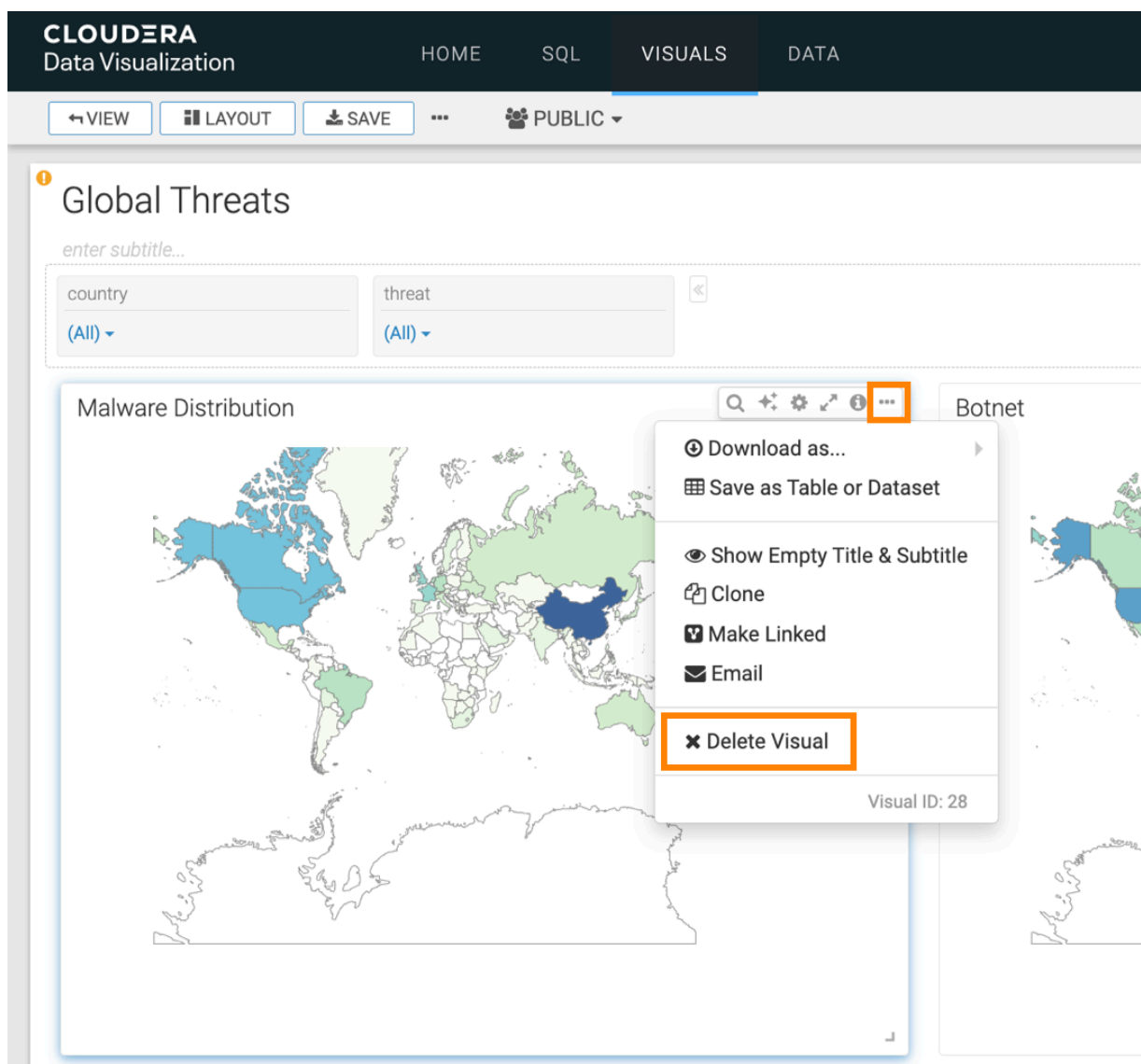

## Adding filters to a visual


Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to add filters to a visual if the visual has a Filters shelf available.

### Procedure

1. Open a visual of your choice in Edit mode.

## 2. Populate the Filters shelf from the available fields (Dimensions, Measures) in the DATA menu.

In this example, the country field is added to the filter shelf. A modal window pops up where you can set the values you want to filter for. You can choose discrete values, ranges, patterns, or use the Select All option for a bulk selection of the shown filter values.



## Creating annotation for visuals

Annotations are brief summaries or description that you can associate with a visual or dashboard. You can use them to clarify data details, highlight outlier values, or provide additional context for visual consumers. The annotations feature supports both manually written descriptions and AI-generated summaries based on the data displayed in a visual.

### How annotations are displayed

If a visual has no annotation:

- In View mode, the Annotation icon () is hidden.
- In Edit mode, the Annotation icon is visible. Clicking it displays a message indicating that no annotations have been added yet, and provides the Edit option for adding an annotation.

If a visual has an annotation:


- In View mode, the Annotation icon is visible. Clicking it or hovering over it displays the annotation.
- In Edit mode, the Annotation icon is visible. Clicking it displays the annotation, and provides the Edit option for editing the annotation.

### Before you begin

- You can create or edit annotations only in Edit mode.

### Creating an AI-powered annotation

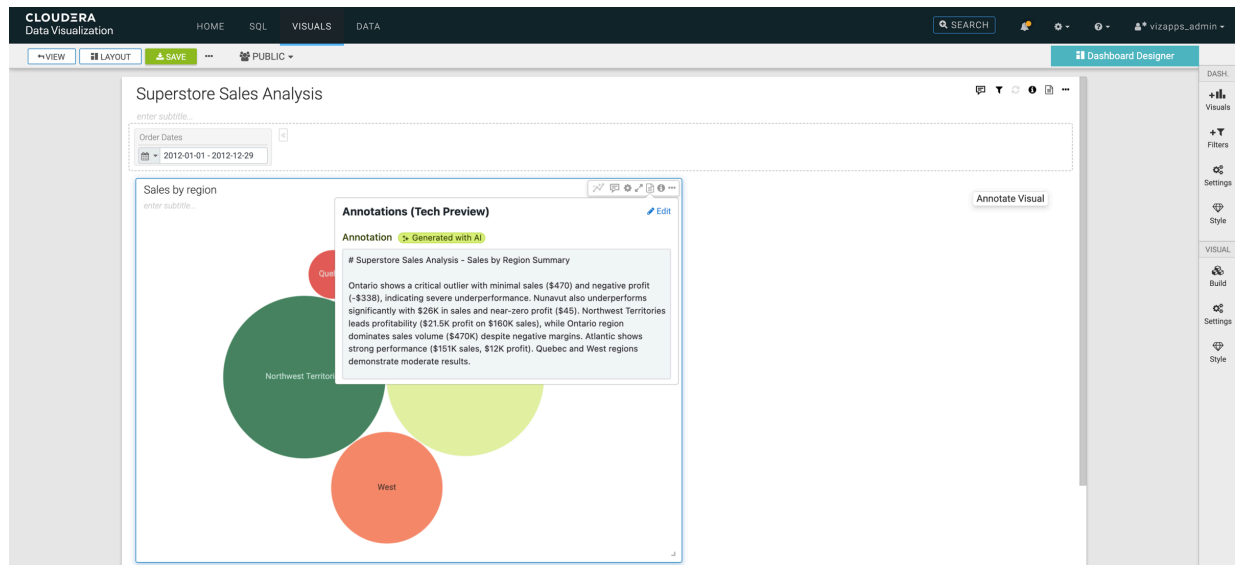

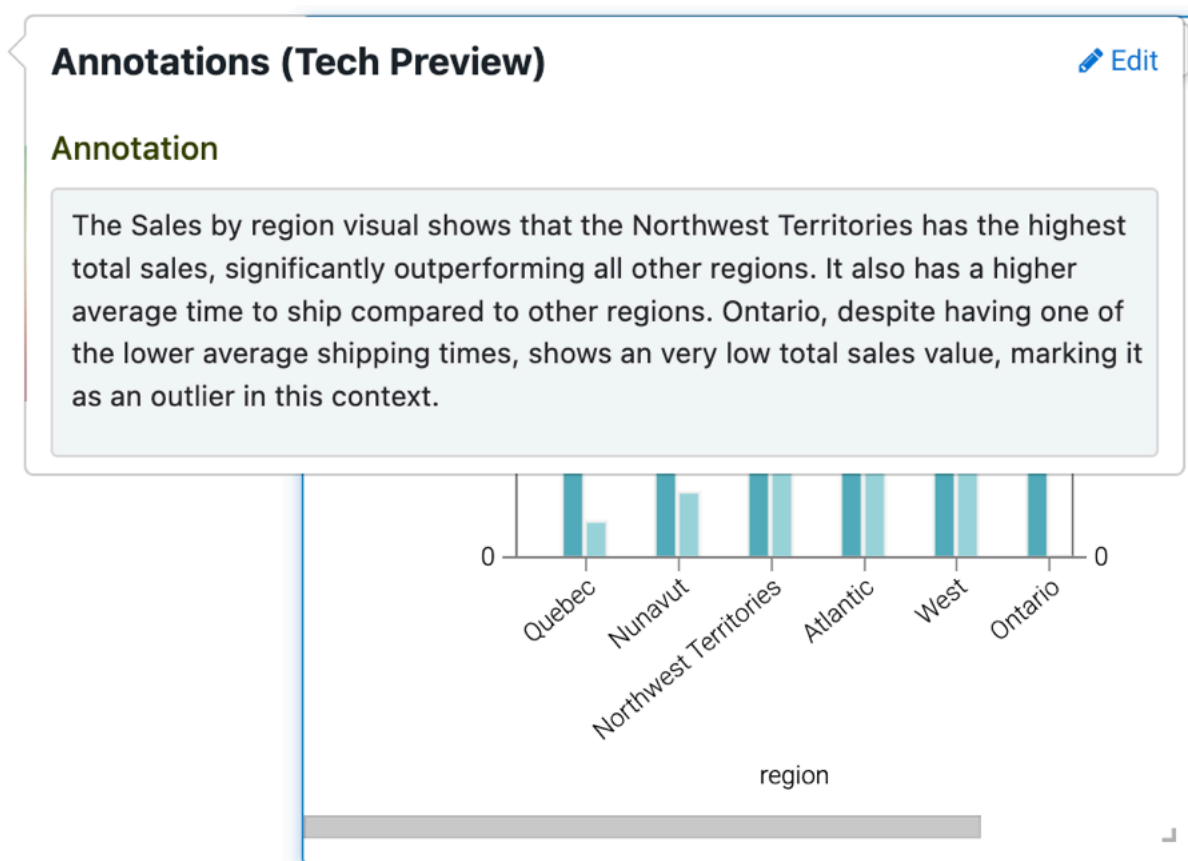

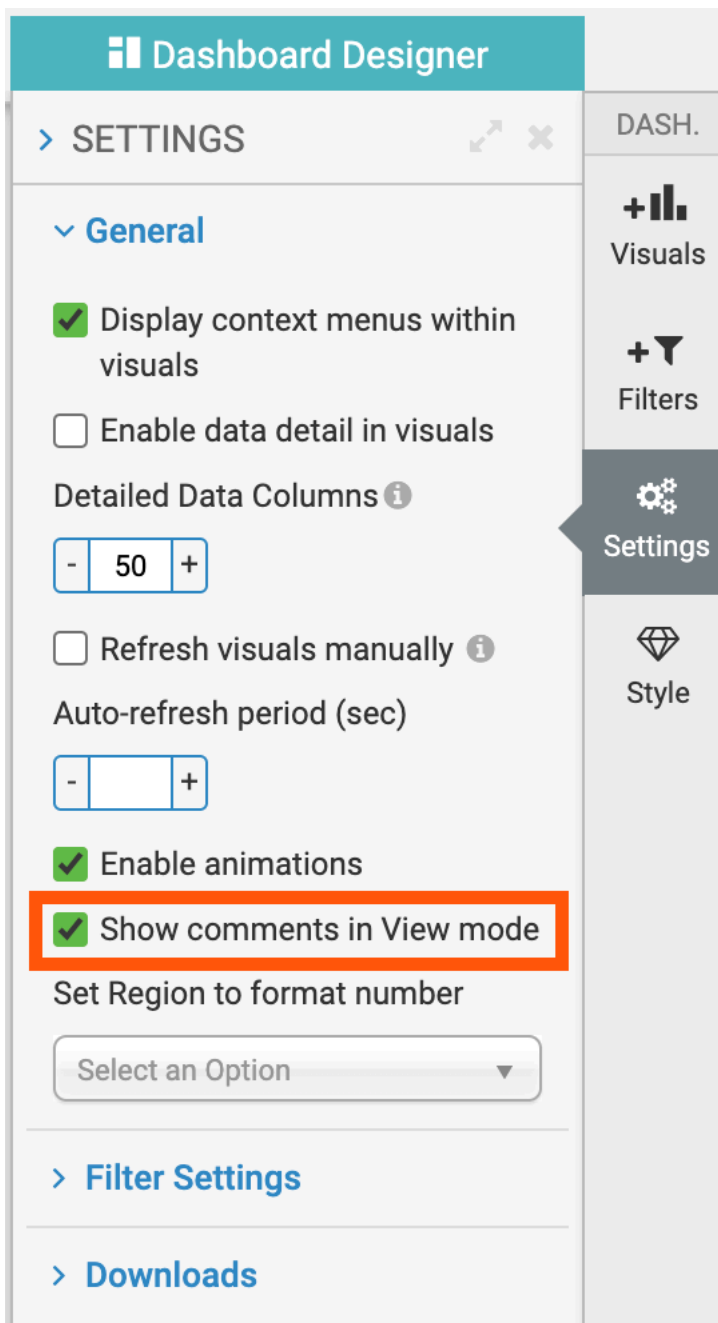

You can reply to the comments added by other users, so discussion threads keep conversations organized and easy to follow.

By default, commenting on visuals and dashboards is disabled. To use this feature, an administrator must first enable it in Site Settings. For details, see [Enable commenting](#).

When commenting is enabled, you can see and add comments in View mode or Edit mode. You can turn off showing comments in View mode in the general settings for dashboards. When comments are hidden, you cannot see existing comments or add new ones in View mode.






### Viewing comments


The Comments panel displays all comments associated with the selected dashboard or visual. If no comments exist for the dashboard or the visual, the panel shows No Comments Yet.

#### To review comments for a dashboard:

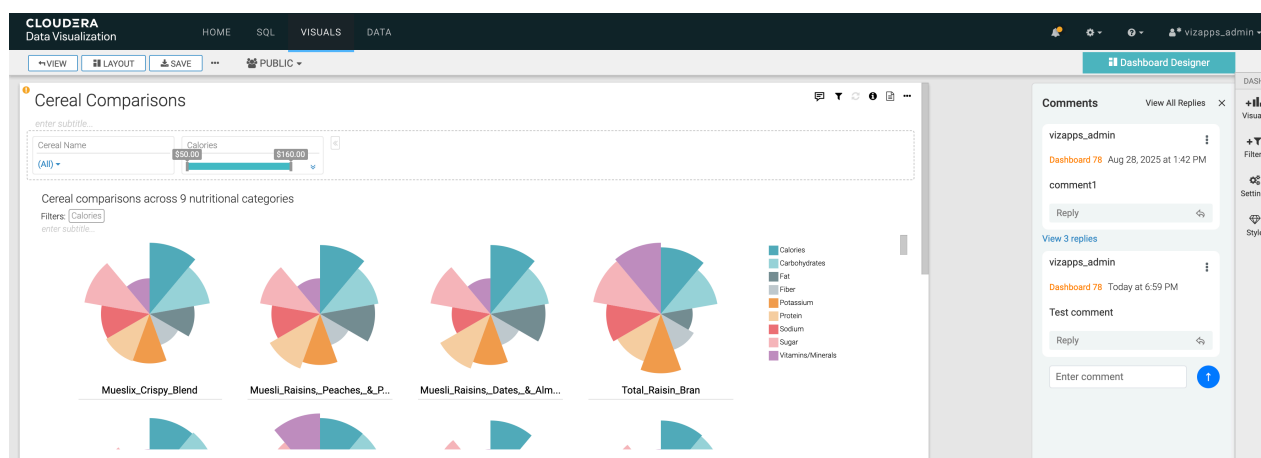
1. Open the dashboard in View or Edit mode.

2. Click  located in the top-right corner of the dashboard to open the Comments panel.  
By default, dashboard-level comments are shown.
  - a. To comment on the dashboard, click  located at the top-right corner of the dashboard.
  - b. To comment on a specific visual, hover over the visual's top-right corner and click .
3. [Optional] Click Filter to open the dropdown filter menu and choose what comments you want to display.  
Setting the filter to All comments provides a complete overview of both dashboard-level and visual-level comments. In this view, each comment is clearly labeled to indicate whether it applies to the dashboard or to a specific visual.

### To review comments for a specific visual:

Hover over the visual's top-right corner and click , or the dashboard-level Comments panel filter to select the specific visual. Both methods display only the comments that were added to the selected visual.

The Comments panel remains open until you manually close it.



### Filtering comments at dashboard level

The dashboard Comments panel provides a consolidated view of all feedback associated with a dashboard. It displays both dashboard-level comments and visual-level comments from the visuals included in that dashboard.

A comments filter allows you to control which comments are shown, helping you focus on the most relevant feedback.

Using the comments filter

A dropdown filter control is available at the top of the dashboard Comments panel. You can choose from the following options:

#### Dashboard comments

Shows only comments that apply to the entire dashboard.

#### Comments for specific visuals

Allows you to select one or more visuals whose comments you want to view. Comments are grouped by the visual they belong to, showing the visual's ID.

#### Dashboard comments and comments for specific visuals

Displays dashboard-level comments together with comments for the selected visuals in a combined view.

#### All comments

Shows all comments associated with the dashboard, including comments added directly to visuals.

### Clear

Allows you to clear all selections and reset the view.

The filter selection determines which comments appear in the dashboard Comments panel.

### Adding a comment to a dashboard or a visual

1. Open the Comments panel from the dashboard or the visual.
2. Type your message in the Enter comment field.

When you start typing, the comment field expands into a larger text area, and a short markdown reference appears below the comment box, showing common formatting options. You can use basic markdown syntax (for example: **\*\*bold\*\***, *\_italic\_*, ``code``, - bullet list item) to format your comment text. You can use this formatting to highlight important information, add emphasis, or present short code snippets.



**Tip:** Press Shift+Enter to insert a new line within the same comment without posting it.



**Note:** Other markdown elements may render, but comments are designed for short notes with basic emphasis, lists, and inline code. Images and complex layouts are not supported.

Click to submit the comment.

The comment is displayed. If you used markdown, the markdown formatting is applied.

Each added comment shows:

- Author's username
- Related context (dashboard or visual ID)
- Timestamp

### Replying to comments

1. Click Reply below the comment you want to respond to.

- By default, only the most recent reply is shown in each comment thread.
- If a comment has multiple replies, click View X replies to expand the thread and view all replies, or click Hide X replies to collapse the thread.
- To expand or collapse all comment threads at once, click View All Replies or Hide All Replies.

### Managing comments

From the # (more options) menu next to a comment, you can:

- Edit – Update the content of your own comment.
  - Comments and replies show an Edited badge and updated timestamp when modified, making it clear when feedback has changed.
  - Markdown support is available when writing comments. When editing a formatted comment, you see and edit the raw markdown syntax in the textarea. For more information on using Markdown in comments, see the *Adding a comment to a dashboard or a visual* section.



- Mark as resolved – Mark the selected comment as resolved.
  - Only that specific comment is marked as resolved. Replies remain open and can be resolved individually.
  - Resolved comments cannot be edited or deleted, but they can be reopened.
  - Resolved comments are automatically moved to the bottom of the thread, keeping active discussions visible. If a resolved comment is reopened, it returns to its original position.
- Copy comment link – Copy a direct link to a comment or reply in a comment thread. Pasting this link in your browser opens the dashboard, automatically displays the comments panel, and highlights the specific comment or reply.
- Delete – Permanently remove a comment.
  - When you delete a comment, all replies are deleted as well.



**Important:** Only the comment owner or administrators can edit or delete comments.

Cloudera Data Visualization helps you to develop valuable insights into your data by suggesting new visual types and options based on the information you already use in your existing visuals.

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to save tabular data as its own table, and writes it back to the database. It also enables you to produce a dataset based on data exposed in a visual, which may be used for self-referenced application stacking.

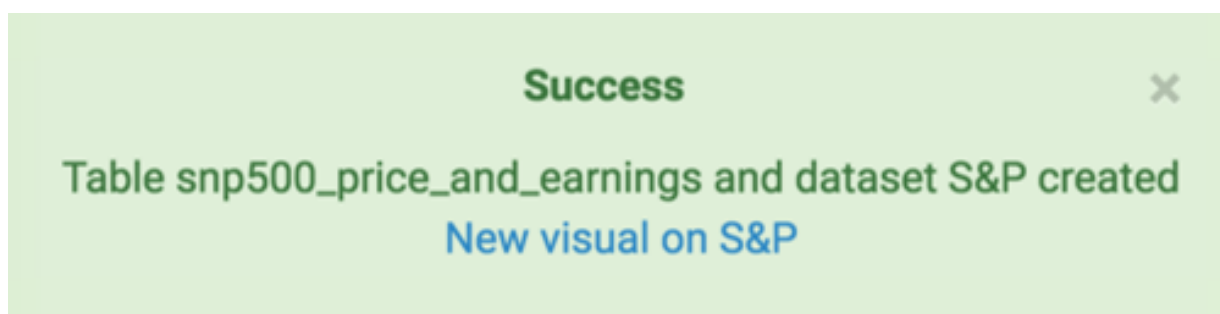

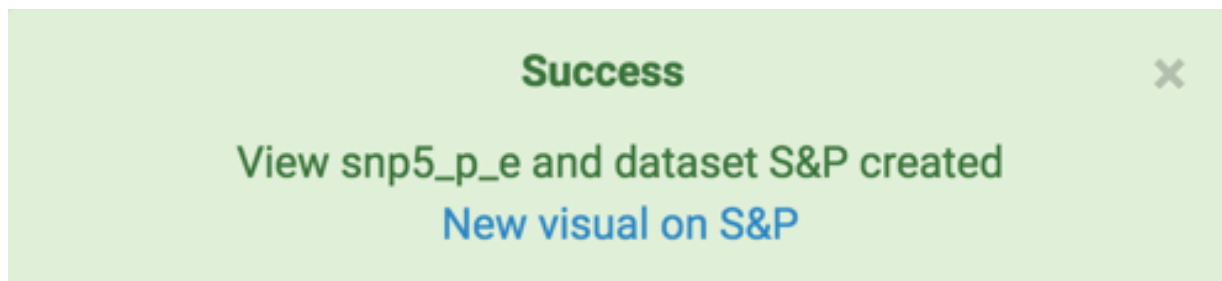

### Saving a table as a dataset based on the query

Cloudera Data Visualization allows you to save a query result as a separate dataset. Unlike a logical view, which is created on the server, this method uses the current query as the basis for the dataset. 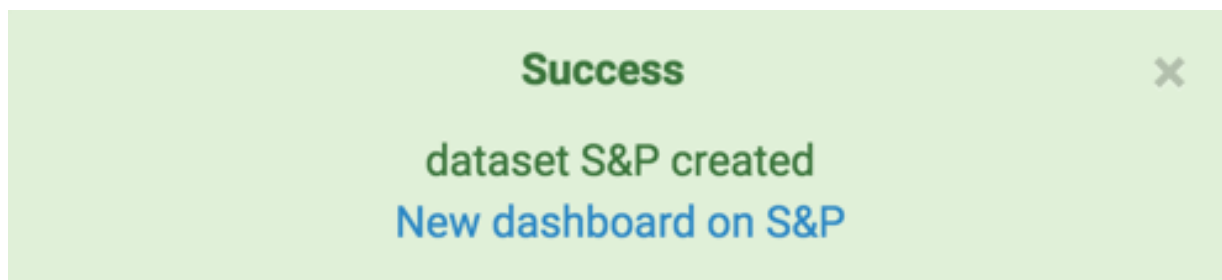

## Cross tabulation

## Bars

## Lines

While line charts are similar to scatter plots, the line chart orders the measurements along the primary axis and it is often used to visualize a time series.

However, values may be measuring completely different things, or the range of values (scale) is too different to show both lines clearly. Cloudera Data Visualization offers a dual axis option for situations like these.

### About this task

The following steps demonstrate how to create a Lines visual that uses a double axis. The example is based on the World Life Expectancy dataset.

## Procedure

1. Start a new visual based on the World Life Expectancy dataset.

For instructions, see *Creating a visual*.

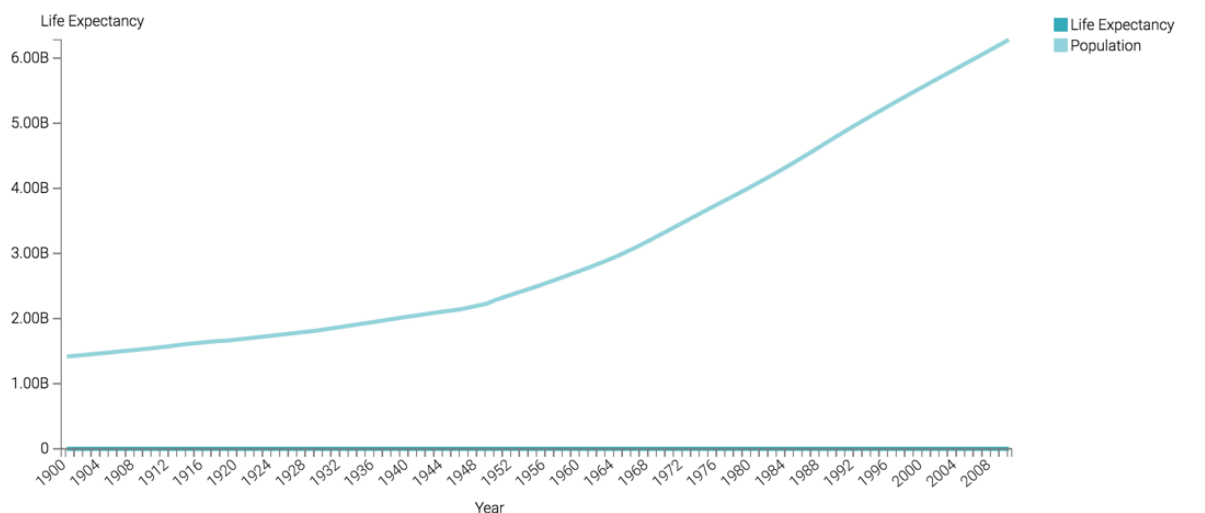
2. In the VISUALS menu, select the Lines visual type.
3. Populate the shelves from the available fields (Dimensions, Measures) in the DATA menu.
  - a) Under Dimensions, select year and place it on the X Axis shelf. Specify ascending order and alias the field as 'Year'.
  - b) Under Measures, select life\_expectancy and place it on the Y Axis shelf, and add an alias to the field.
  - c) Under Measures, select Population and place it on the Colors shelf, and add an alias to the field.
4. Click REFRESH VISAL.

The Lines visual appears. You can see the linear plot of population and life expectancy, on the same axis.

It is impossible to see the values on the life expectancy line because the population line sets the scale for the Y axis.

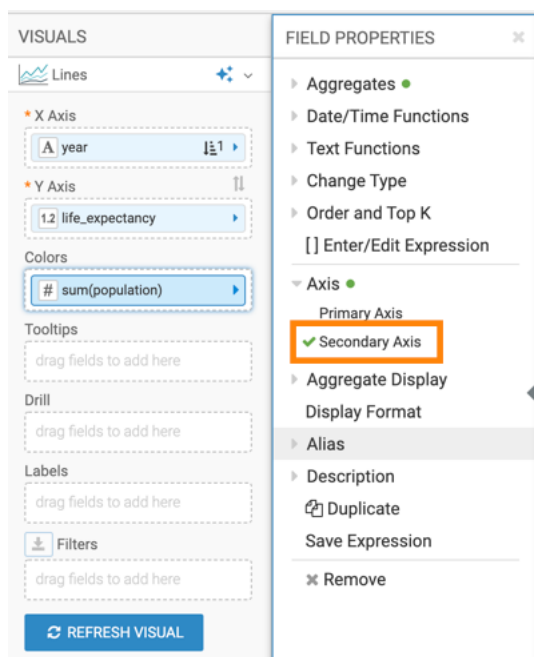
In this case, the label does not correspond to the scale shown, because this information comes from the Y axis shelf.

## 6. Select Axis Secondary Axis .

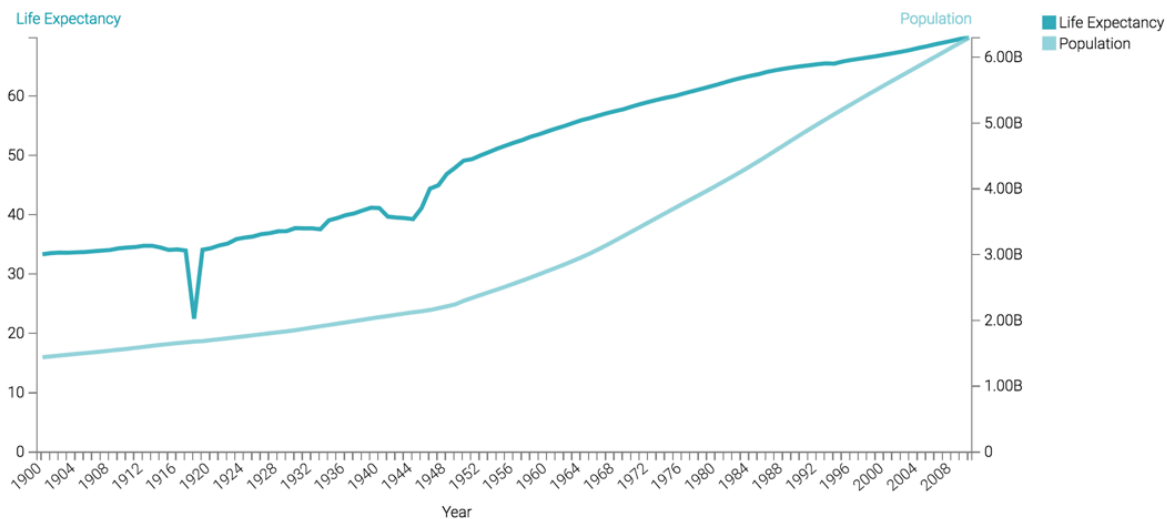


## 7. Click REFRESH VISUAL.

The two lines can now be seen clearly. There is a vertical axis both on the left and the right side of the visual. The linear plot of population and life expectancy are visible each on its own axis.

For convenience, the colors of the axis labels match the line.

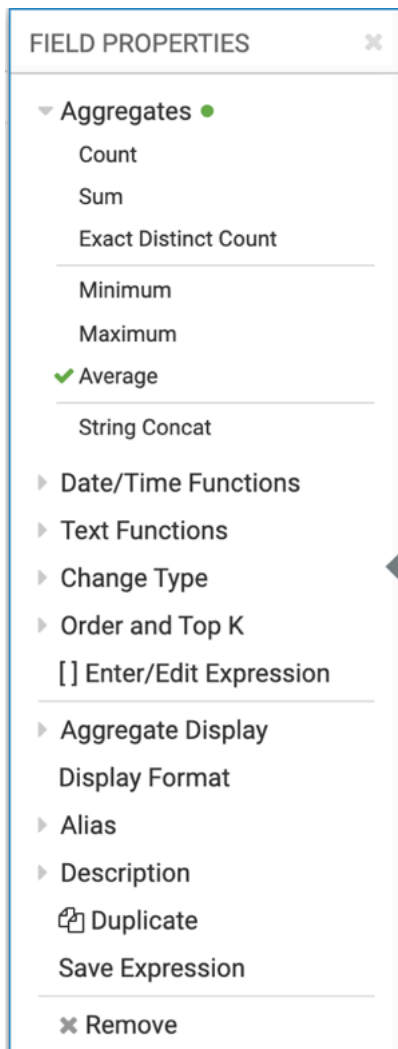

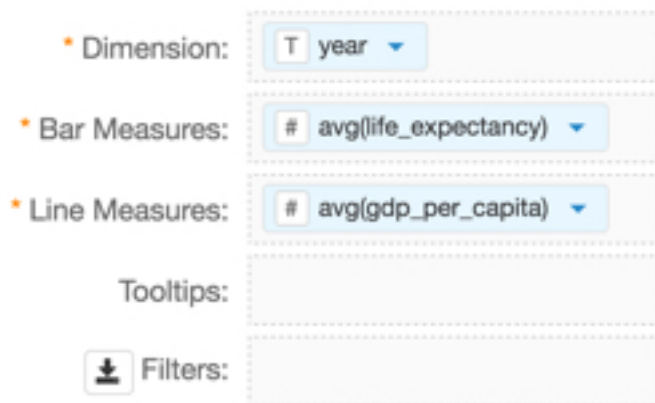

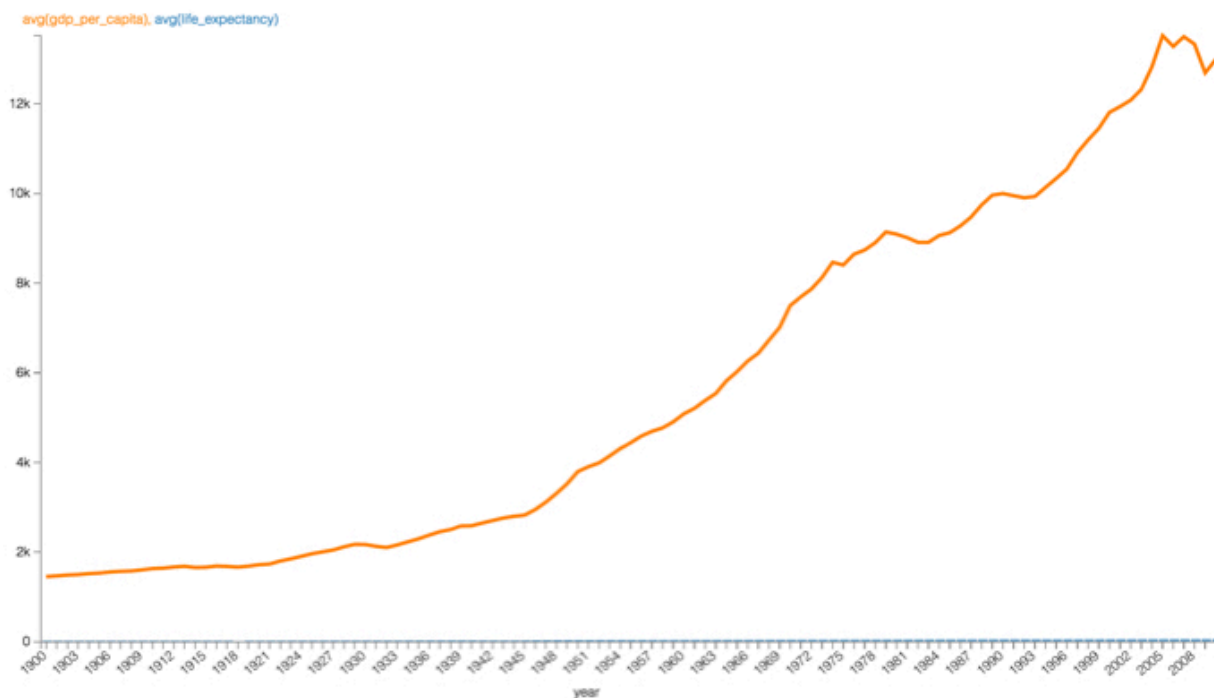

## Assigning a measure to a secondary axis

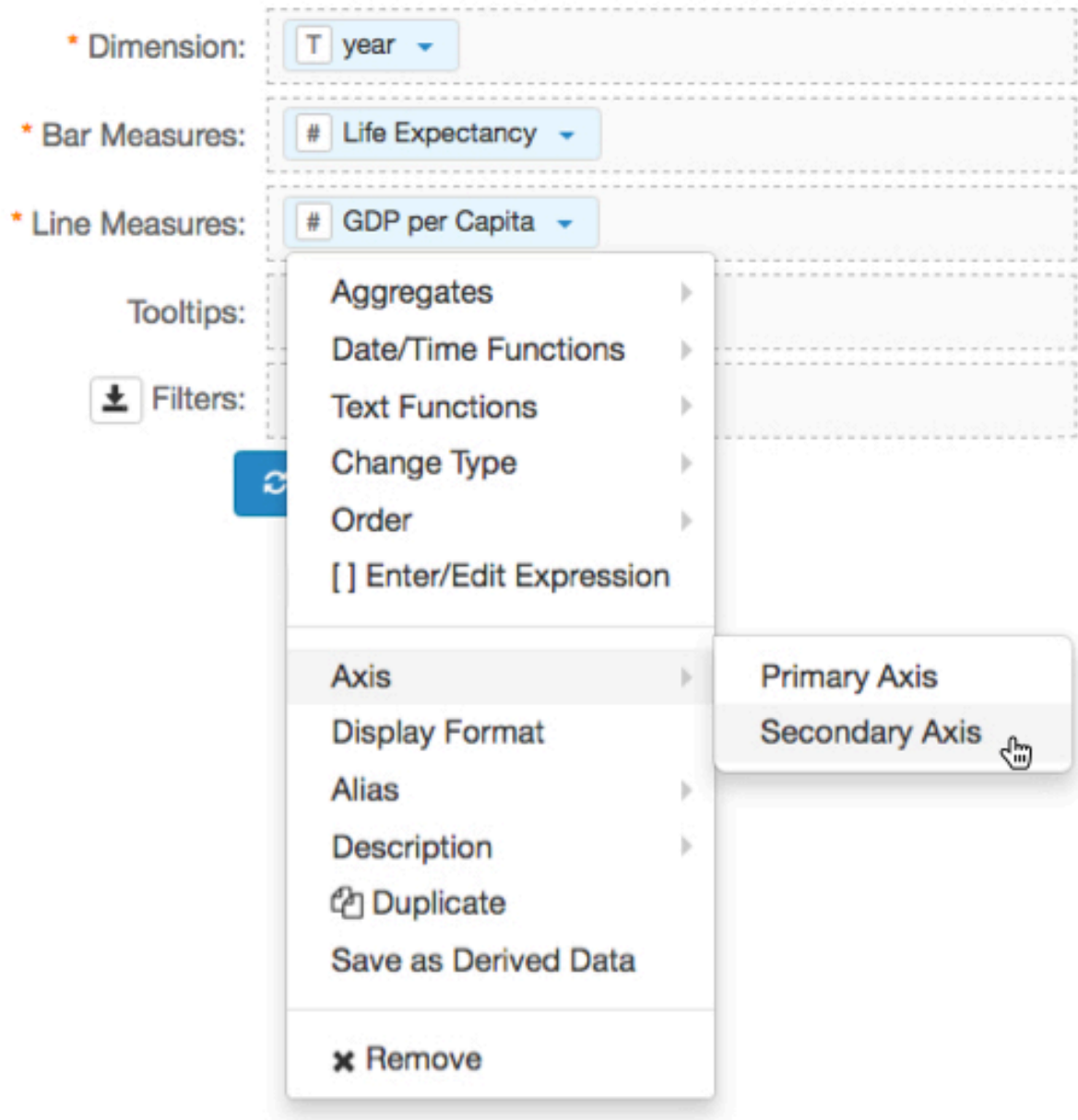

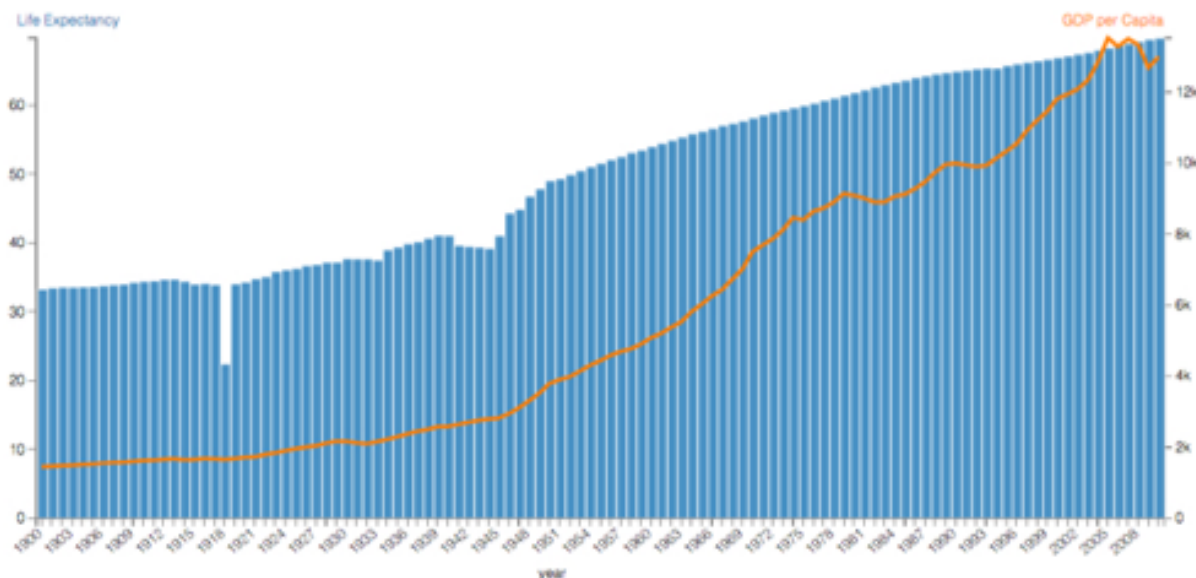

With volume stacked beneath the line, the chart clearly demonstrates both the total of the fields and their relative size.

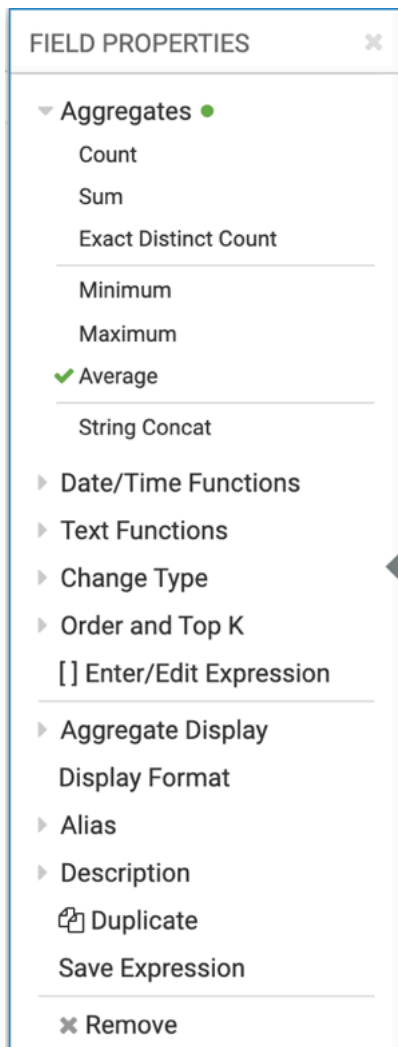

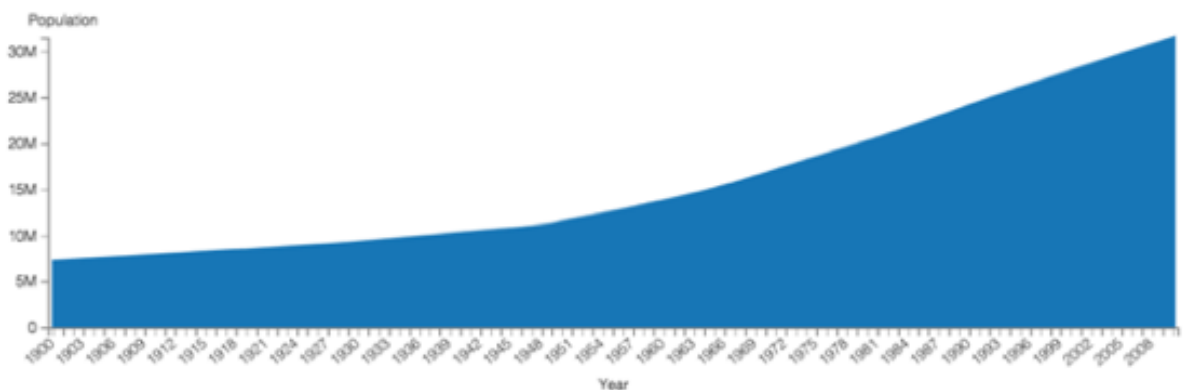

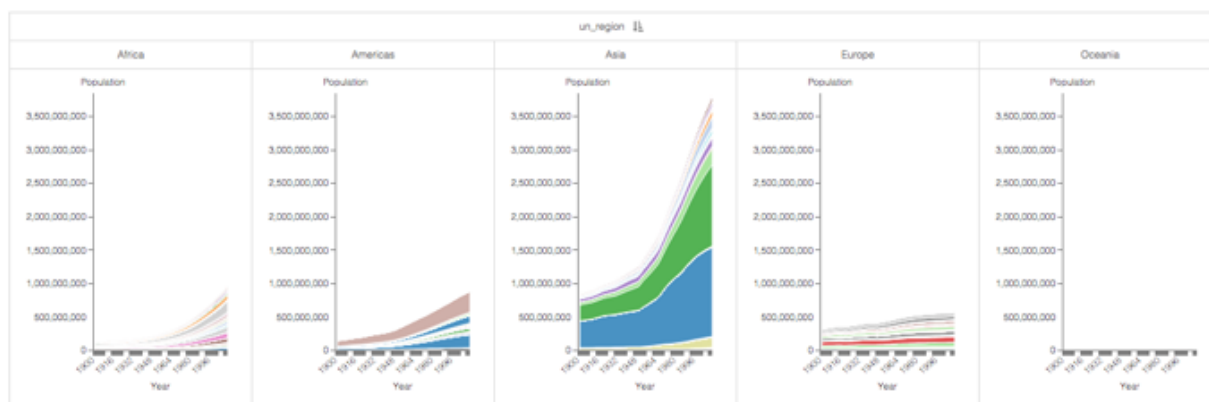

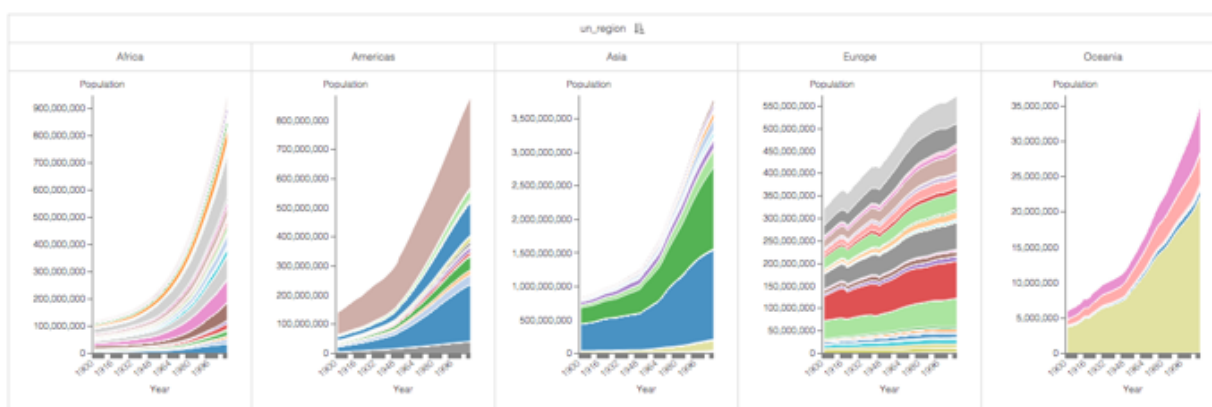

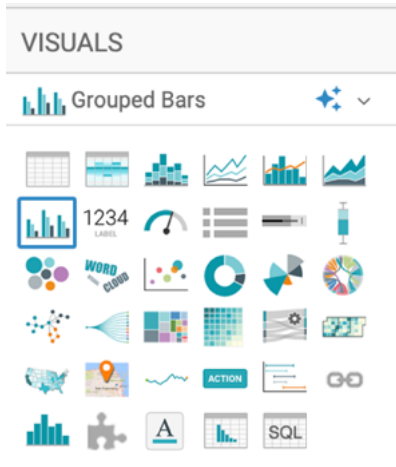

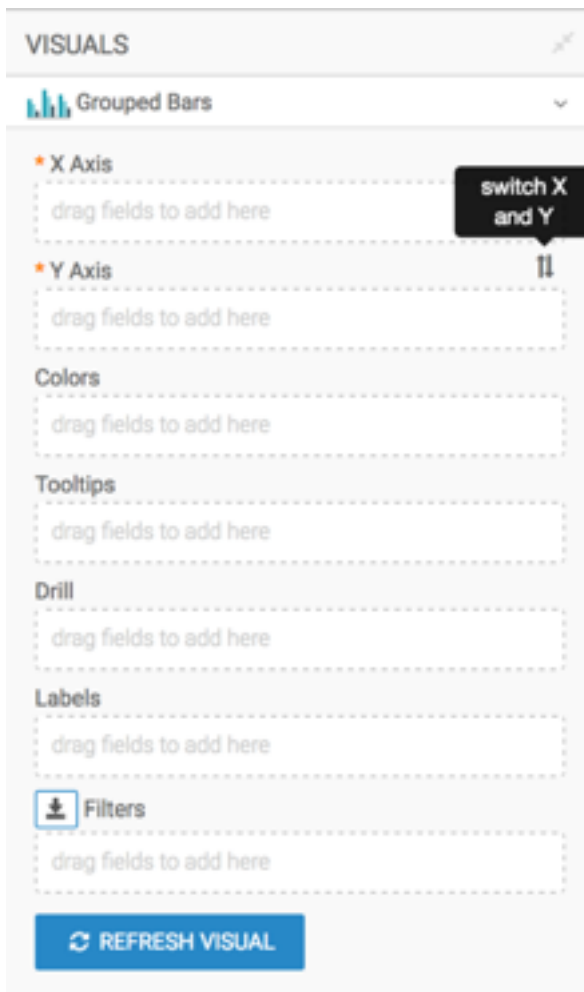

If the Dimensions/Measure and Compare To shelves hold numeric values, this shelf specifies both the small value to the right side of the main measure (default placement), and an arrow.

Some additional information about the arrow:

- If the primary measure indicator is higher than the Compare To value, the arrow points up and it has the color specified for the up arrow in the color settings of the visual.
- If the compare value is higher, than the arrow points down, in the color specified for the down arrow in the color settings of the visual.
- If the two values are identical, the arrow is 'flat'. It means that it is horizontal and points to the right.



It is possible to switch the comparison direction by *flipping the comparison* setting.

## Gauge

In Cloudera Data Visualization, Gauge visuals are powerful tools for communicating performance against set targets, projected trends, and a qualitative assessment of the measurement.

About this task

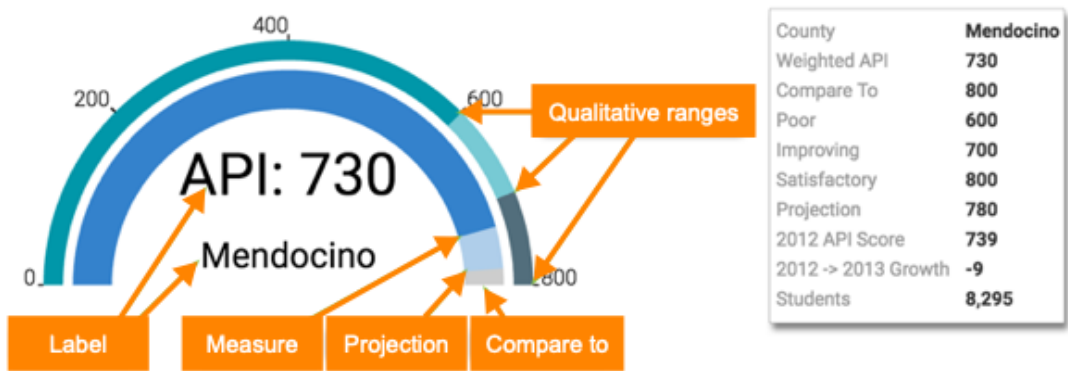
Gauges show minimum and maximum values on an evenly distributed scale, and qualitative ranges for classifying the primary measurement as different colors, which is very useful for visually distinguishing them from one another.

Gauges are semi-circular by default, and include many setting adjustments.

You can review the following three examples of gauge charts to see their structure:

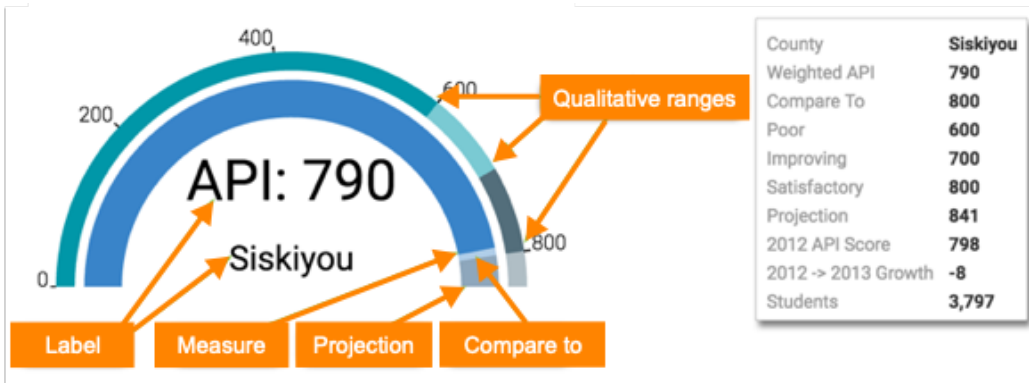
Example 1: Measure < Projection < Compare To

In this scenario, both the measurement and its projected future value are less than the target value.



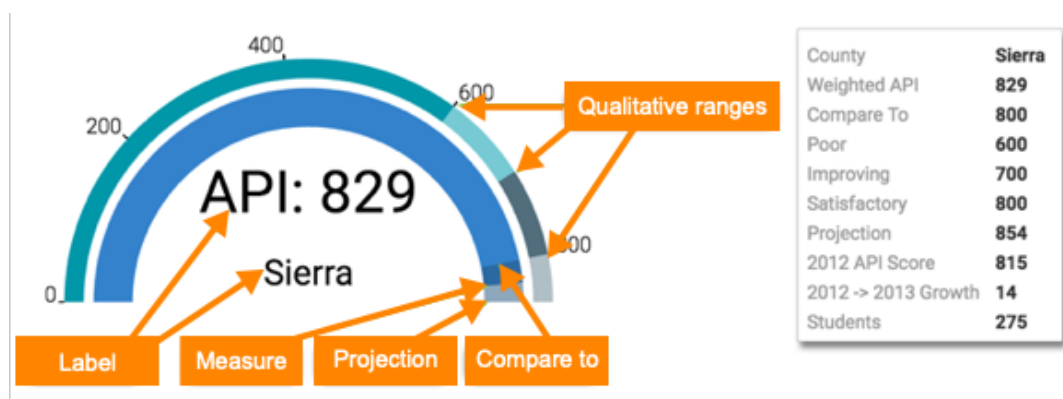
Example 2: Measure < Compare To < Projection

In this scenario, the measurement is less than the target value, but its projection is expected to exceed the target.



Example 3: Compare To < Measure < Projection

In this scenario, the measurement has already exceeded the target value, and the projection is even greater.



- The long dark inner arc of the visual represents the value on the Measure shelf. It is the feature measurement of the visual. In Example 3, the last section appears in dark blue because the value of Measure is greater than the Compare To value.
- The extension of the same arc is the expected value of the measure at a future date, supplied by the Projection shelf of the visual. The overlay of colors and their opacity leads to different effects depending on the relative values of Measure, Projection, and Compare To shelves:
  - In Example 1, this appears in pale blue and does not terminate the arc. This is because the value on the Projection shelf is less than the Compare To value.
  - In Example 2, Projection appears in darker grey as extension beyond the lower Compare To value (in pale blue).
  - In Example 3, Projection again appears in darker grey, but this time as an extension beyond the darker blue arc that shows by how much the Measure exceeds the lower Compare To value.
- The Compare To shelf shows the target value for the measurement. In these examples, it has a value of 800 for all gauges.
- The secondary outer arc shows the Qualitative Ranges that form the upper limits of the 'goodness' for the current measurement. From the origin to the upper value, they specify relative levels of performance success. You may define anywhere from 0 to 4 qualitative ranges.
- The Label shelf overrides default labeling taken from the Measure shelf. This is an opportunity to clarify what is being measured, as well as the units of measurement. This shelf accepts a maximum of two values.

Like other Cloudera Data Visualization visuals, the Gauge visual may be trellised using X and Y shelves, have additional fields on the Tooltips shelf, and use Filters. For more information, see *Shelves for gauge visuals*.

We are working with the District Performance dataset, built on a datafile that contains the California School District APIs from 2012 and 2013. The range of possible scores varies from a low of 200 to a high of 1000. However, the statewide API performance target is 800.

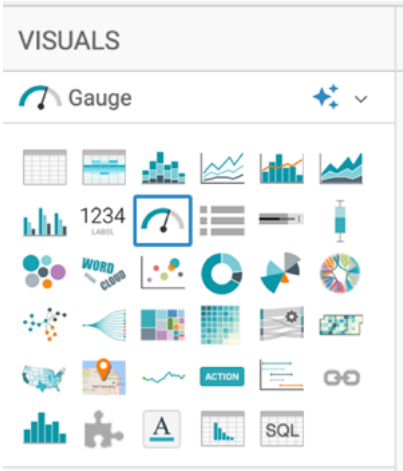

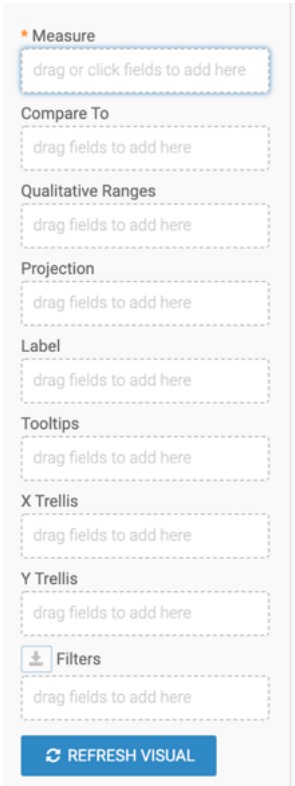

1. Click the (right-arrow) icon to the left of the field, and select the [ ] Enter/Edit Expression option.
2. In the Enter/Edit Expression modal window, change the expression to the scalar value of 600.
3. Click VALIDATE & SAVE to ensure that everything works.

- g) To create other ranges:

1. Click the (right-arrow) icon to the left of the field, and select the Duplicate option.
2. Open the Enter/Edit Expression modal window for the duplicate and change the value.
3. Click VALIDATE & SAVE.

In this example, we defined three ranges: at 600, 700, and 800, and we aliased the qualitative ranges as Poor, Improving, and Satisfactory, in that order.

An alternative to specifying qualitative ranges through the shelf is to calculate them as percentages of the Compare To field. To do that, follow the instructions in *Specifying qualitative range as percentages*.

- h) For the Projection shelf, add the field Api13.

- i) Specify the equation that projects the current measurement to some future date by clicking the (right-arrow) icon to the left of the field, selecting the [ ] Enter/Edit Expression option, and changing the expression to the following SQL clause:

```

```
sum([Api13]*[Valid])/sum([Valid]) + 50)
```

- j) For the Label shelf, add the field Api13, and convert the expression to the following SQL clause:

```

You can add the field Cname under the first field and change its aggregation to max([Cname]).

- k) For the Tooltips shelf, add more fields here to provide additional information.

In this example, the following tooltips are used:

- floor(sum([Api13]\*[Valid])/sum([Valid])) - floor(sum([Api12]\*[Valid])/sum([Valid]))
- sum([Valid])


It is good practice to apply an alias to these fields. In this example, the following aliases are used: 2012 API Score, 2012 -> 2013 Growth, and Students.

- l) For the Filters shelf, add the filters you need.

In this example the following filters are used: Cname for name of the County, selecting the values Alameda, Kings, Marin, Mendocino, Sierra, and Siskiyou.

- m) For the Y shelf, add the field Cname (county name) to trellis the visual, and alias it as County.

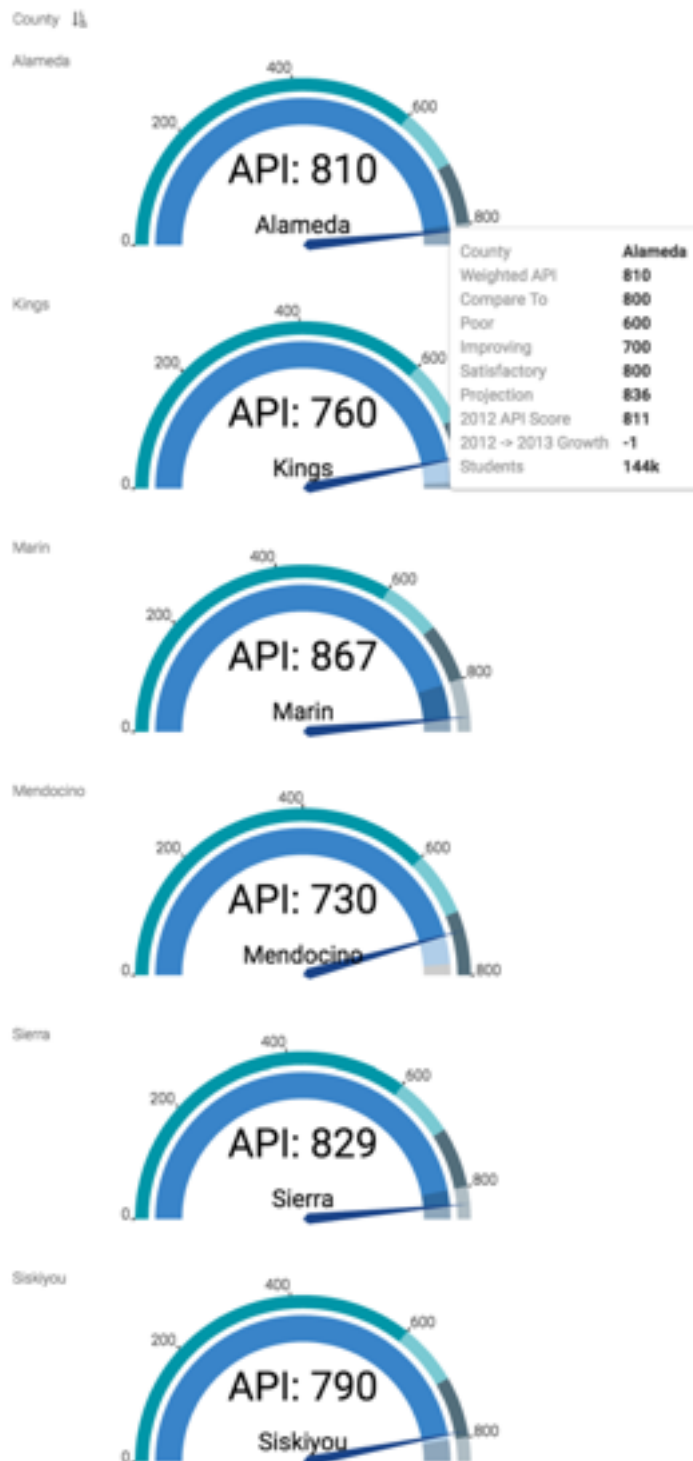

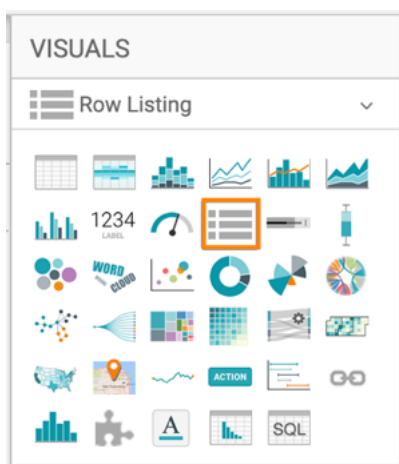

## Shelves for row listing visuals

Cloudera Data Visualization Row Listing visuals have the following shelves.

### Dimensions

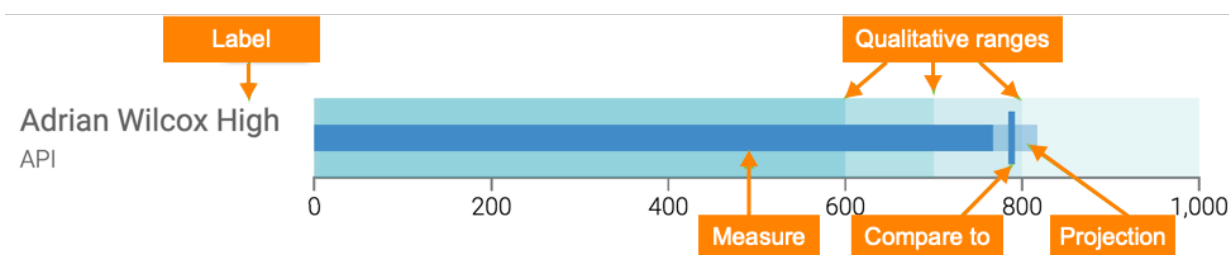
## Bullet

### About this task

Bullet visuals are a variation of bar charts, customized for showing progress towards a predefined goal. They are developed specifically for financial data, but may be used in many other situations. They are an alternative to gauges.

This is an example of a Bullet visual for a high schools. It illustrates the various elements of the bullet chart.



- The dark bar in the middle of the visual represents the value on the Measure shelf. It is the feature measurement of the visual.
- The lighter-shaded extension of the same bar is the expected value of the measure at a future date. This value is on the Projection shelf of the visual.
- The vertical bar is the target value of the measurement. Place this calculation on the Compare To shelf.
- Calculations on the Qualitative Ranges shelf determine the upper limits of the 'goodness' for the current measurement. From the origin to the upper value, they specify poor, better, good, and excellent performance. You may define anywhere from 0 to 4 qualitative ranges.
- The Label shelf overrides default labeling taken from the Measure shelf. This is an opportunity to clarify what is being measured, as well as the units of measurement. This shelf accepts a maximum of two values.

Just as other Cloudera Data Visualization visuals, the Bullet visual may be trellised using X and Y shelves, have additional fields on the Tooltips shelf, and you can use Filters with it. It also includes additional setting adjustments. For more information, see *Shelves for bullet visuals*.

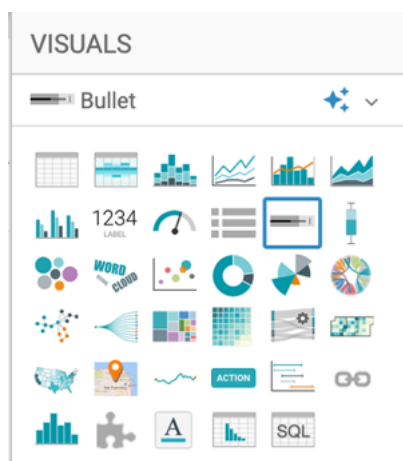

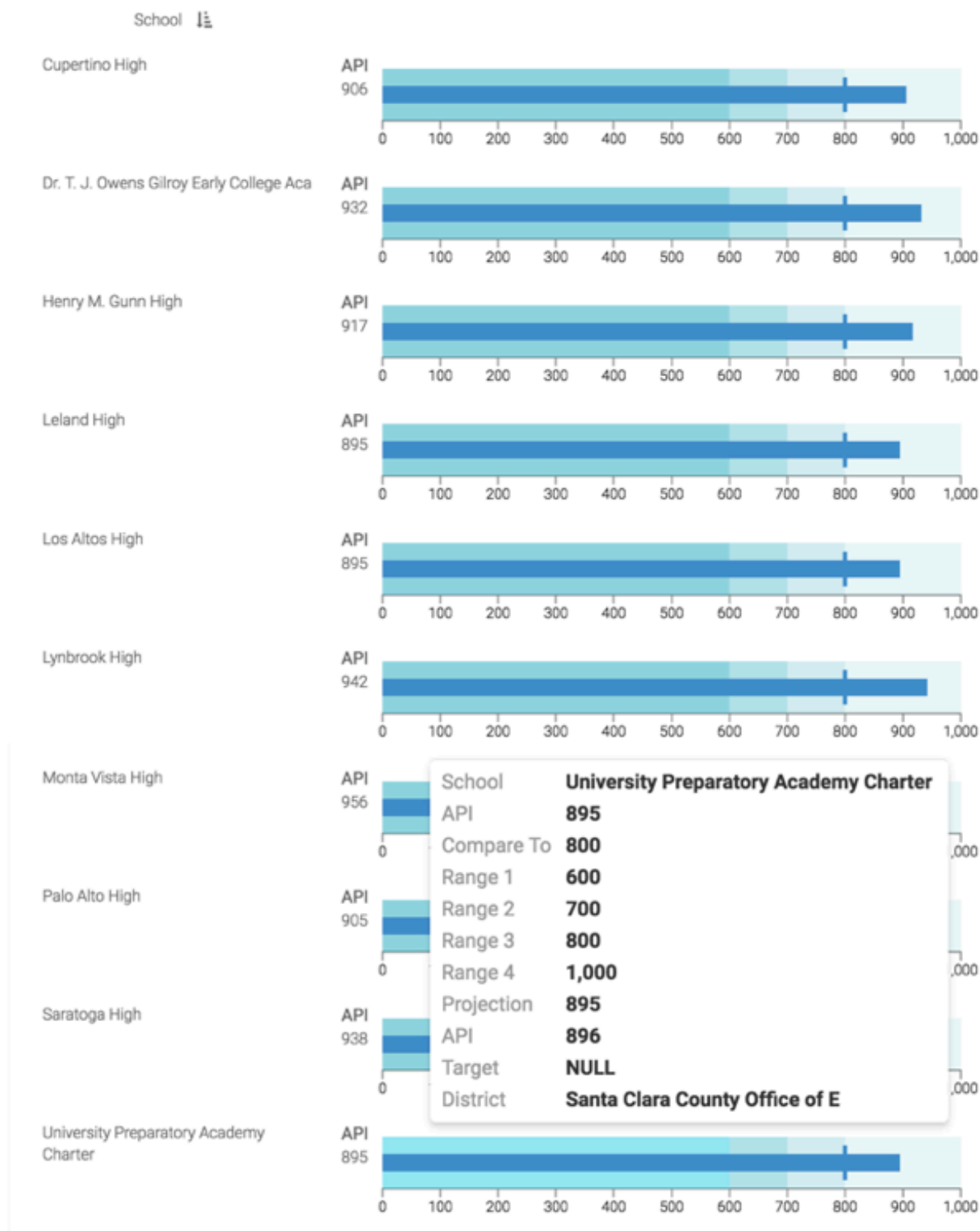

## Packed bubbles

This is different from the traditional approach, where bubbles represent three dimensions of data — one each for horizontal and vertical axes, and one for the area of bubble. This type of visualization is part of flexibility built into Scatter visuals available in Cloudera Data Visualization.

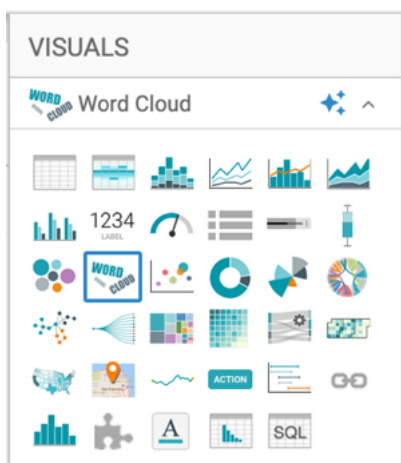

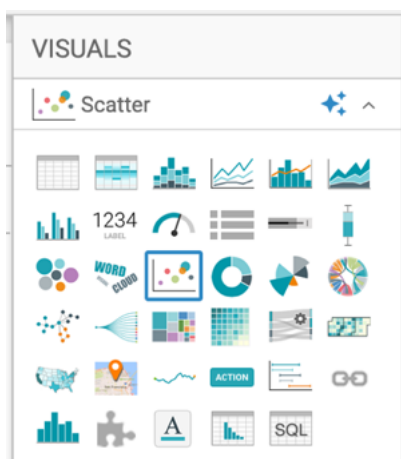



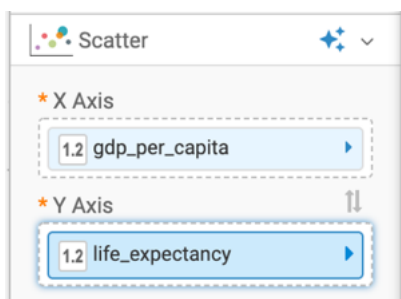

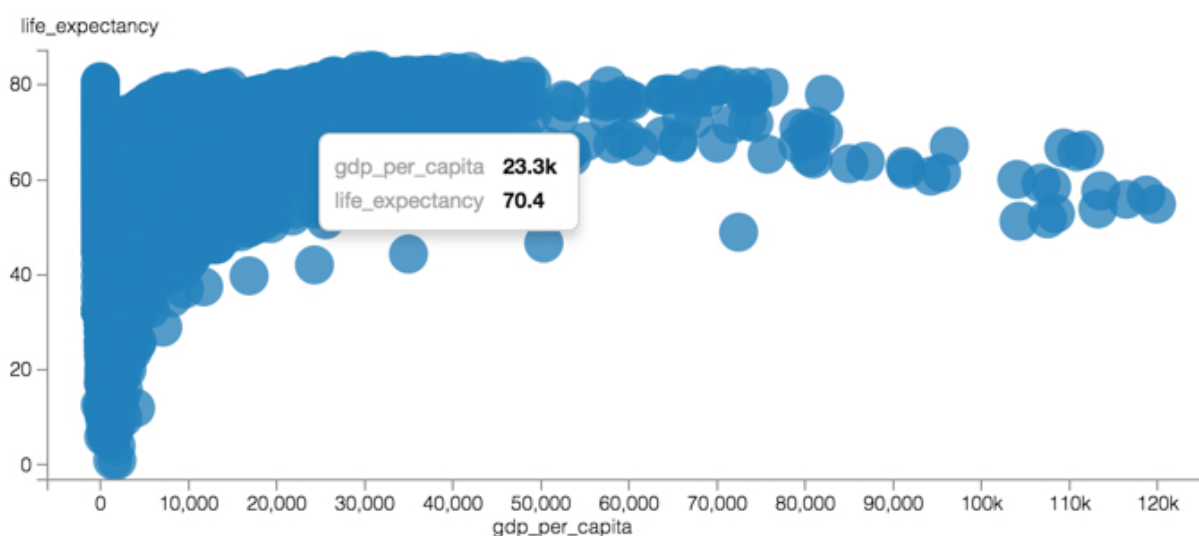

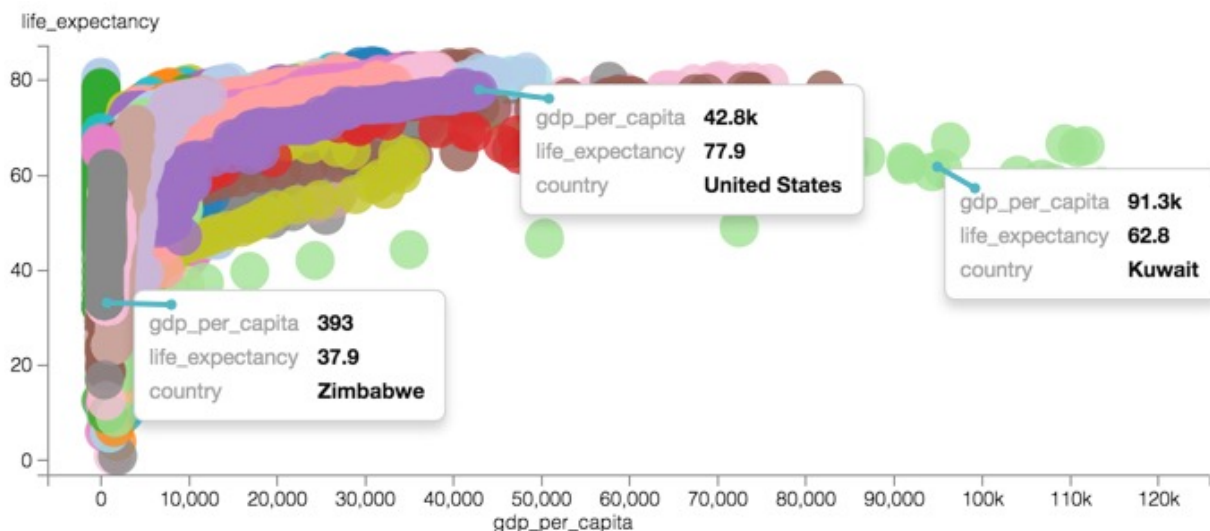


While you can see the general shape of data and a few outliers, there is too little distinguishing information to help us understand the trends.

6. Use the Colors shelf to see if a pattern emerges.

Under Dimensions, select `country` and drag it to the Colors shelf.

7. Click REFRESH VISUAL and examine the resulting graph.



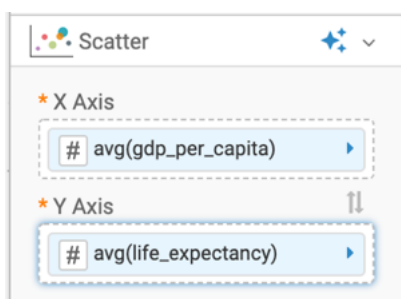
You can now see the trend for some of the countries very clearly, over time. The visualization is less than ideal, yet obvious details show:

- Zimbabwe, in gray, shows an appreciable increase in life expectancy, but relative to other countries, very little economic improvement (measured as GDP per capita).
- United States, in purple, shows the expected improvement in both longevity and in GDP.
- Kuwait, in light green, is a true outlier that shows phenomenal increase in GDP per capita, but suffers a noticeable decrease in life expectancy from about the mid-century to present day.

8. Add aggregation back to the measures on the X Axis and Y Axis shelves. This time, you want to see the average of the dimensions.

- On the shelf, on the `gdp_per_capita` field, click the (right arrow) icon to open the FIELD PROPERTIES menu.
- Expand Aggregates and select Average.
- Repeat it for the `life_expectancy` field

The shelves now contain the modified fields.

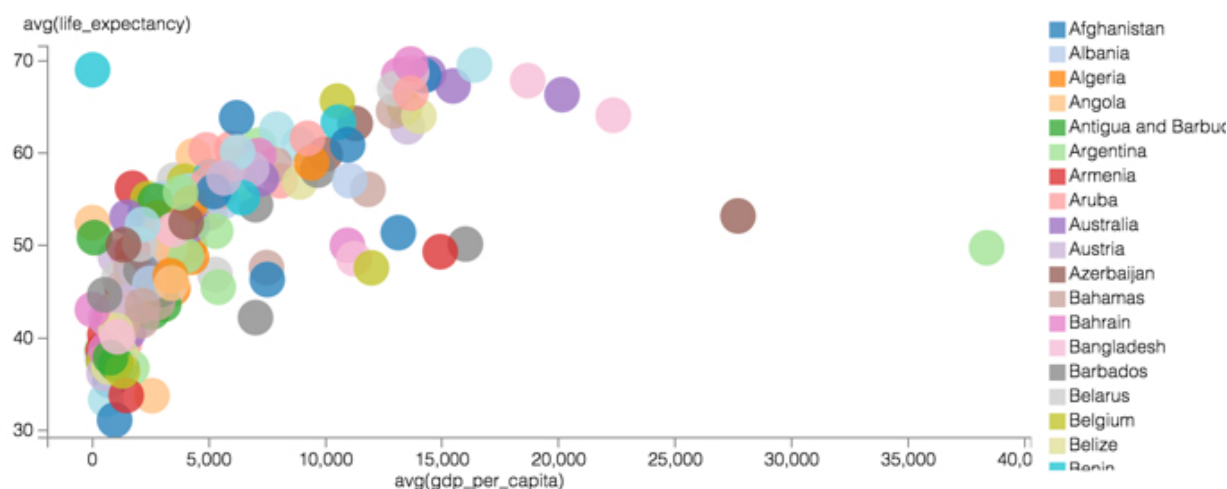

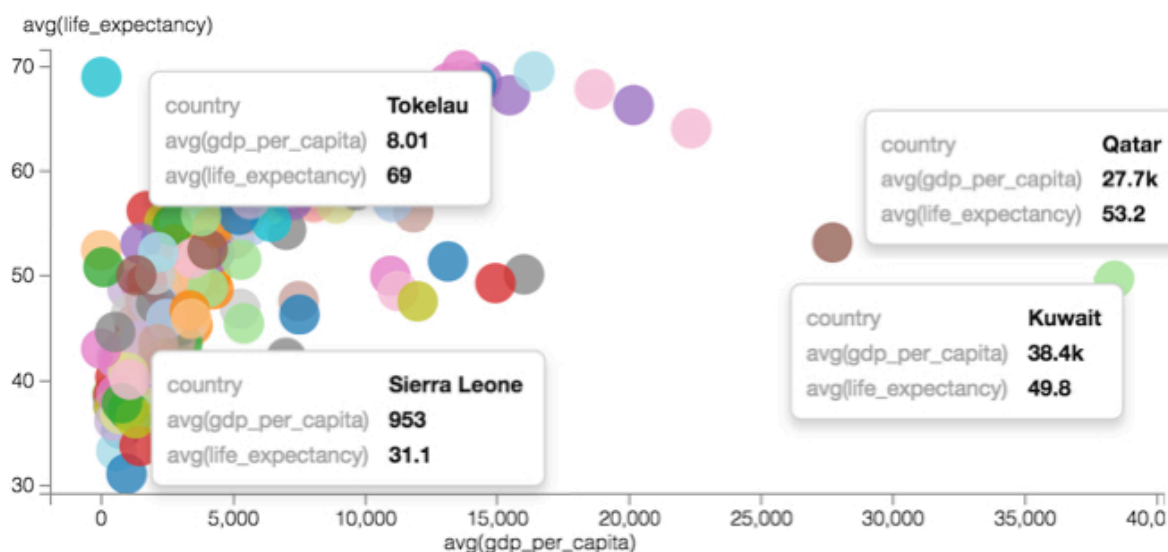

The distribution is an average of ALL years covered by the dataset, from 1990 through 2010. Still, some outliers are already clearly visible: Qatar and Kuwait for exceptionally high GDP per capita, Tokelau for high life expectancy at very low GDP per capita, and Sierra Leone, with the lowest life expectancy in the world.

It is useful to remember at this point that GDP per capita is actually influenced by the population of the country.

## Adding size to scatter visuals

In Scatter visuals, you can control the size of the individual bubbles to show variation of a measure more clearly.

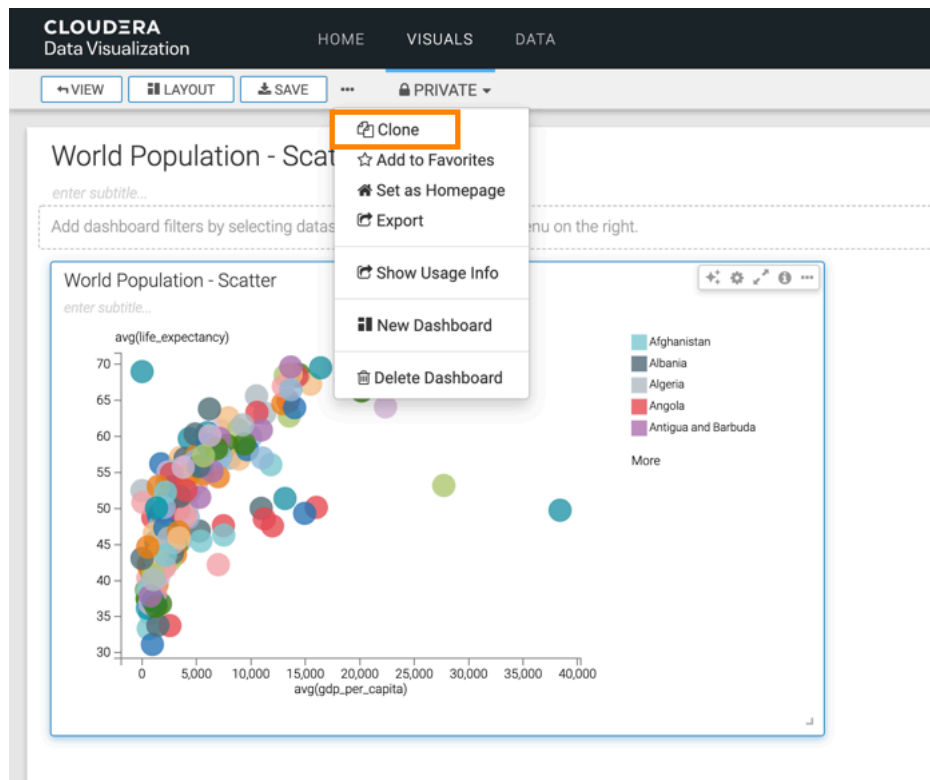
### About this task

The World Life Expectancy dataset has several other dimensions and measurements that you can use to enrich the scatter visual. Consider how using the Size shelf, which controls the size of the individual bubbles, changes our immediate understanding of the dataset and represents the relative population size of each country more clearly.

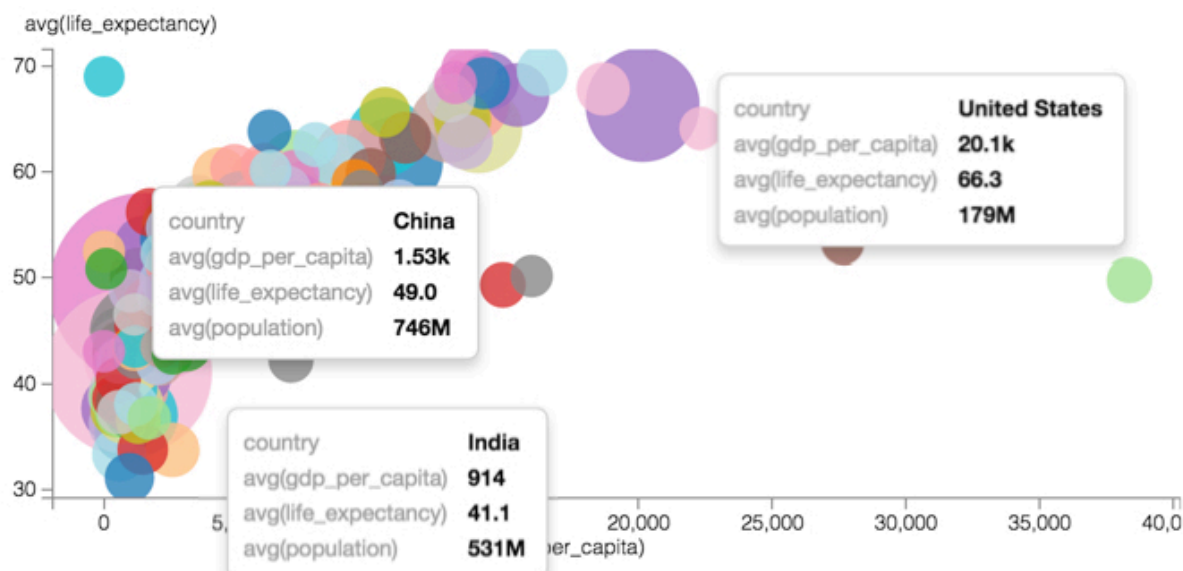

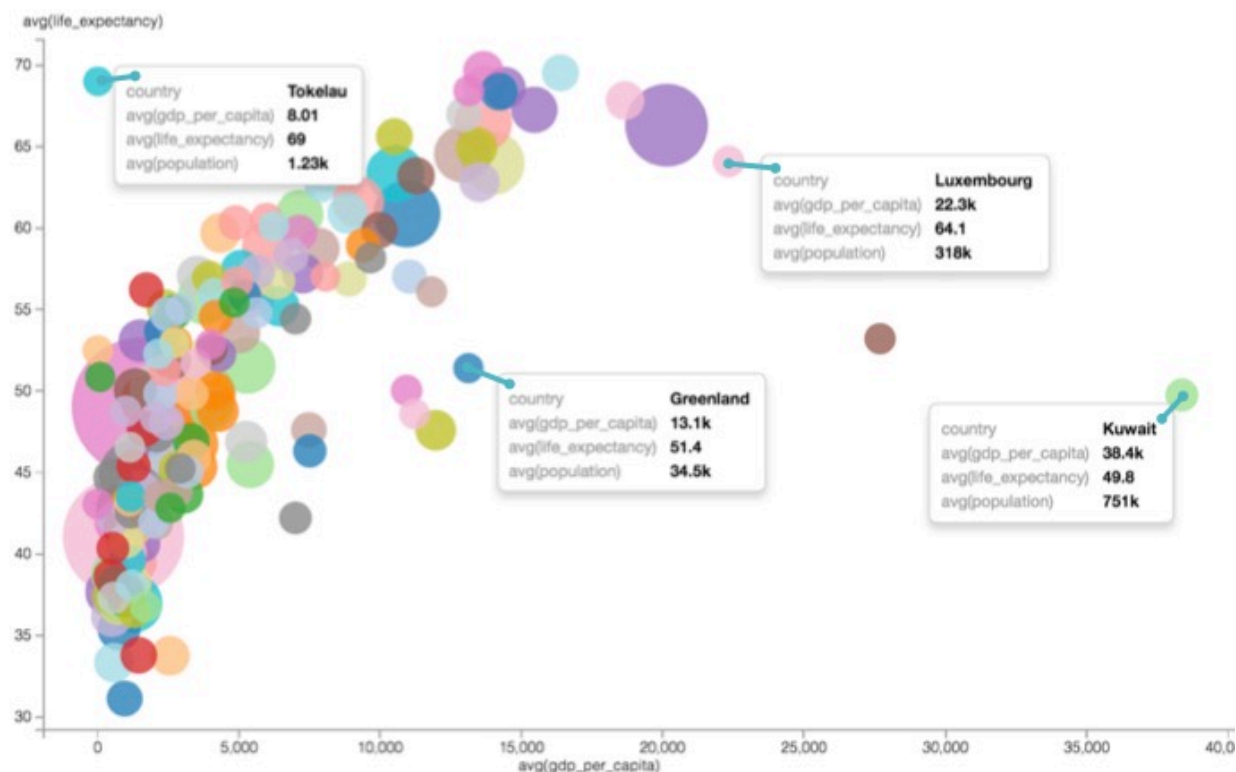


## 6. It is important to realize that the relative size of the bubbles is not linearly proportional to their values.

At the lower range of population levels, the visual shows the same size marks for countries with very different average populations, such as Tokelau, where avg(population)=1.23K, Greenland, with avg(population)=34.5K, Luxembourg, with avg(population)=318K, and Kuwait, with avg(population)=751K. This is because by default,

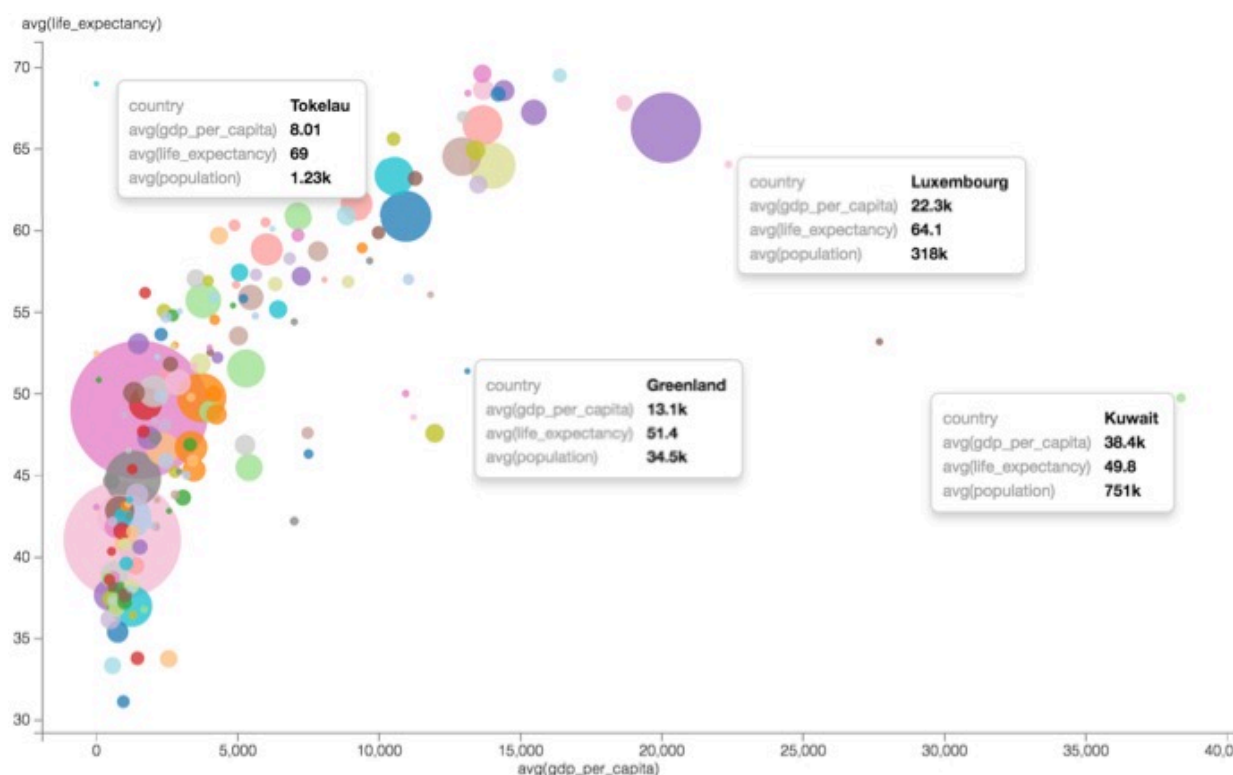
the size of marks ranges from 10 to 50 pixels. Divided equally across the range of values, this squeezes too many disparate measurements on the lower end to use the same mark size 'bucket'.

**Figure 2: World Population Figures with Mark Size Range of 10 - 50 Pixels**



It is easy to somewhat alleviate this problem by changing the range of sizes of the bubbles, as described in *Changing the mark size range*. This graph shows the size range of 1-50.

Incidentally, and obviously, the increased size range generates a more realistic representation of relative population size.

## Adding transition animation to scatter visuals

Scatter visuals have a powerful feature called transition animation.

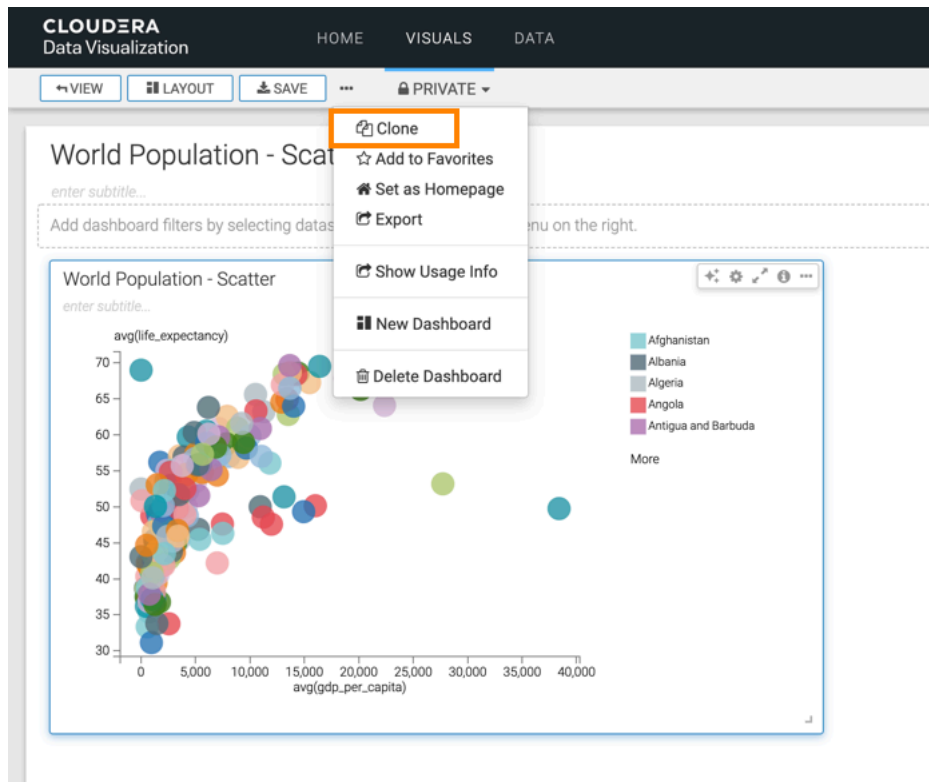
### About this task

In the World Life Expectancy dataset, the time is used as the transition 'axis' to show how GDP per capita, life expectancy, and population size changes over time, from year 1990 through year 2010.

The starting point of the following example is the 'World Population - Scatter with Size' visual developed in *Adding size to scatters*.

## Procedure

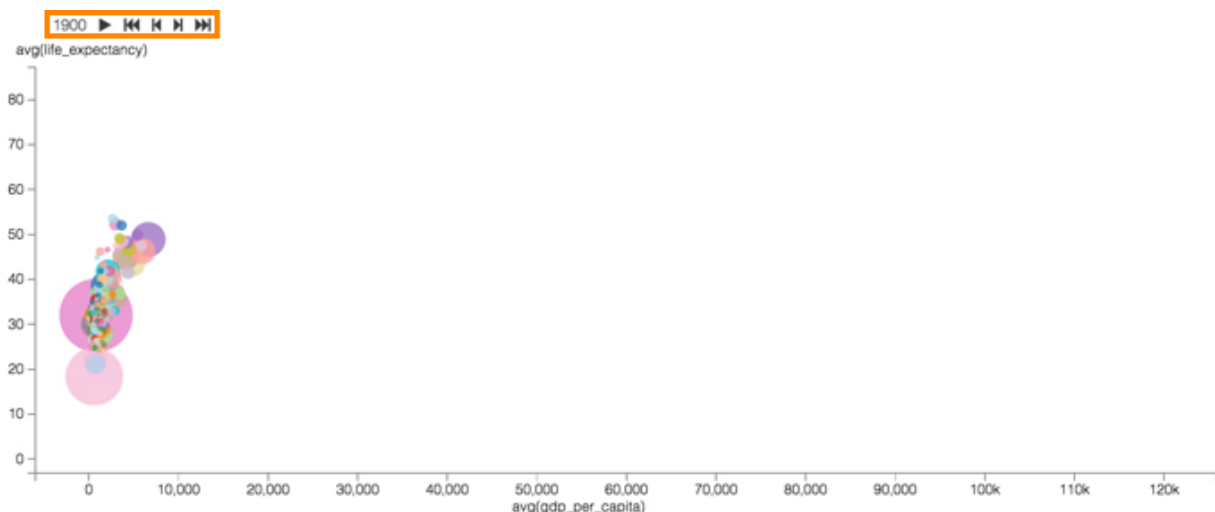
1. Click Clone to create a new visual that has the same properties as the original.



2. Under Dimensions, select year and drag it to the Transition shelf.
3. On the sum(population) field, click the (right arrow) icon to open the FIELD PROPERTIES menu.
4. Expand Aggregates and select Average.
5. Click REFRESH VISUAL.

The Scatter visual refreshes, but this time you can see that it has animation controls at the very top, over the vertical axis legend. The controls common to all video animations: 'play' (which changes to 'pause' when the animation is active), 'back to start', 'back-up', 'advance', and 'to end'.

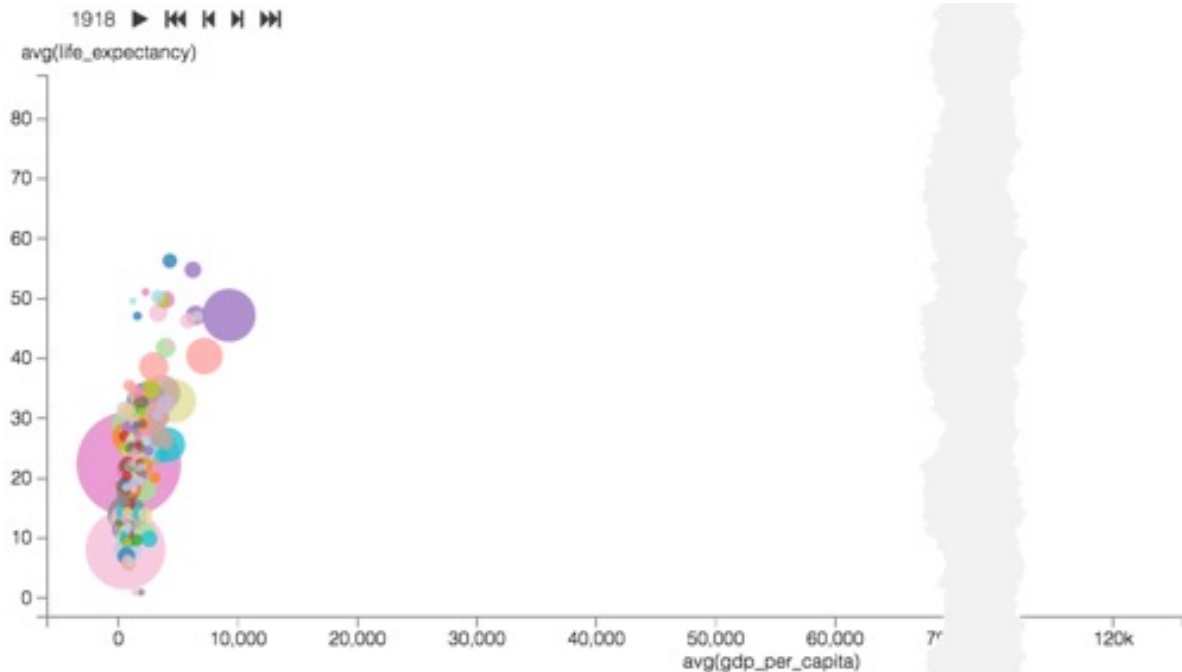
You can also notice that both axes extend far beyond the data points for the initial conditions, year=1990. This is because the cover the entire range of measurements for all data.



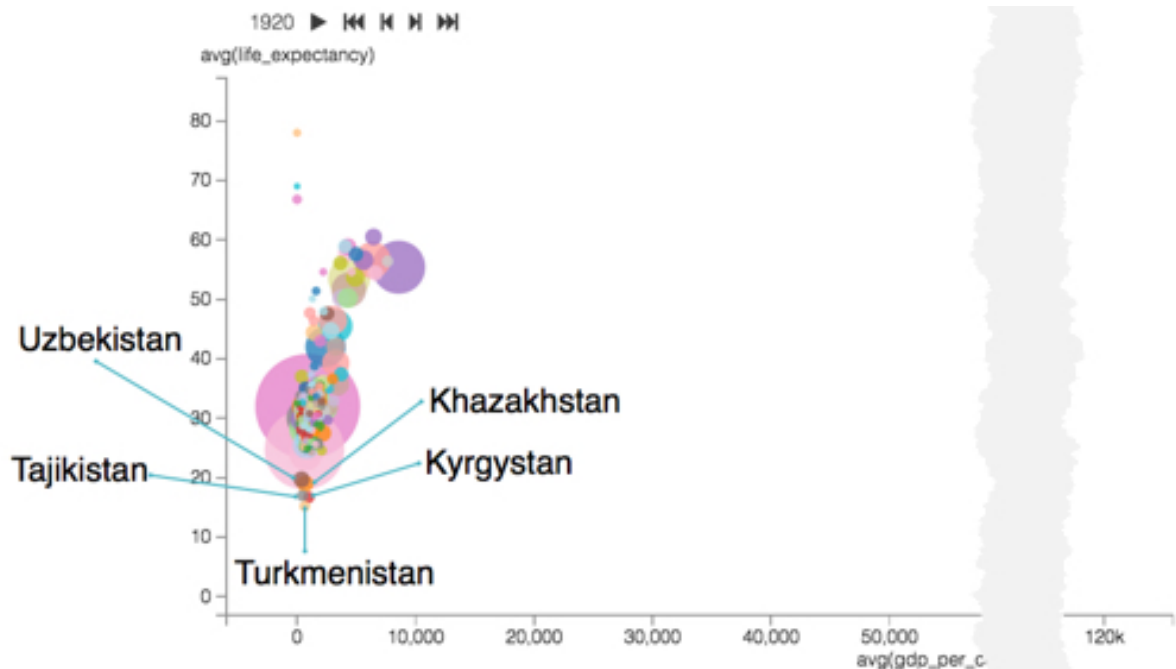
6. Turn on the gridline option, as described in *Enabling gridlines*.
7. Adjust the speed of animation, as described in *Changing transition delay*.
8. Press play and see the changes in data.

Here are some highlights:

- The World-Wide downward bounce in life expectancy centered on 1918, due to the Spanish Flu pandemic.

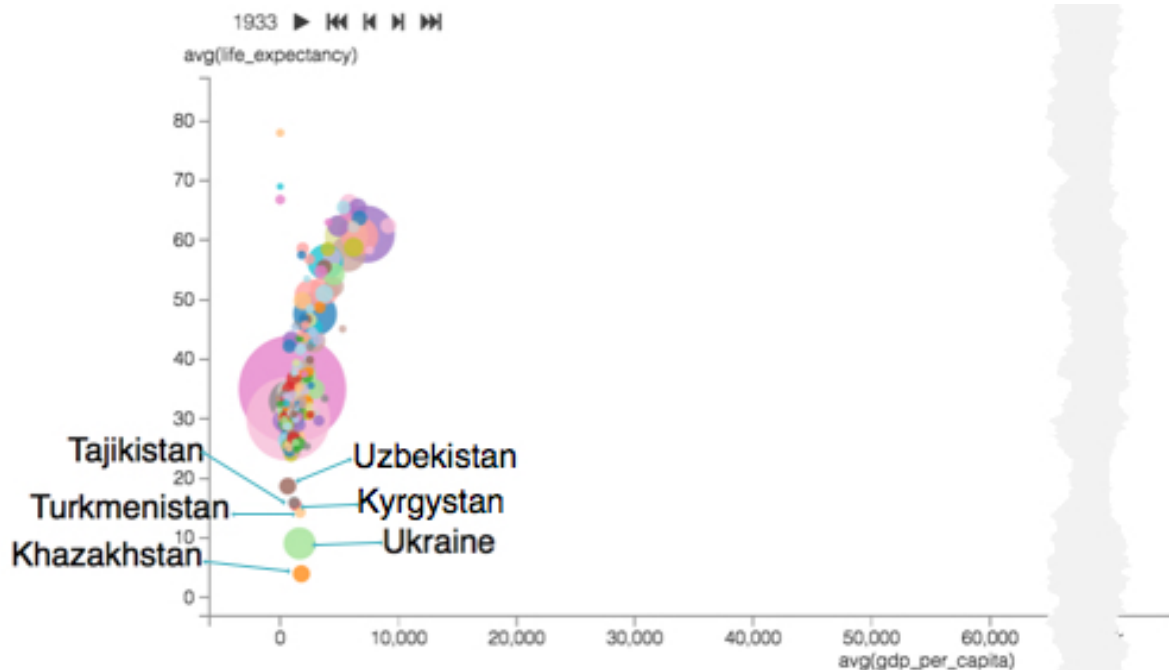


- The Soviet Union secularization efforts and agricultural policies in its Asian territories resulted in war and famine that claimed many lives in Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Tajikistan, Kyrgyzstan, and Turkmenistan. This is reflected in the precipitous decrease in life expectancy for these countries in 1919-1923, with heaviest losses in 1920.

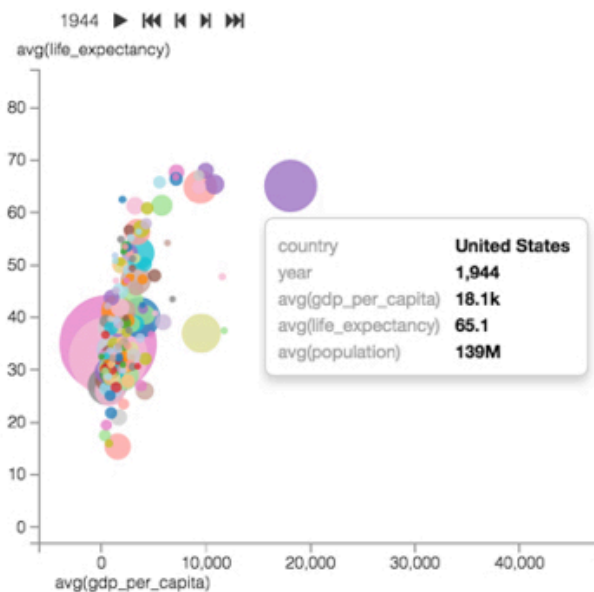
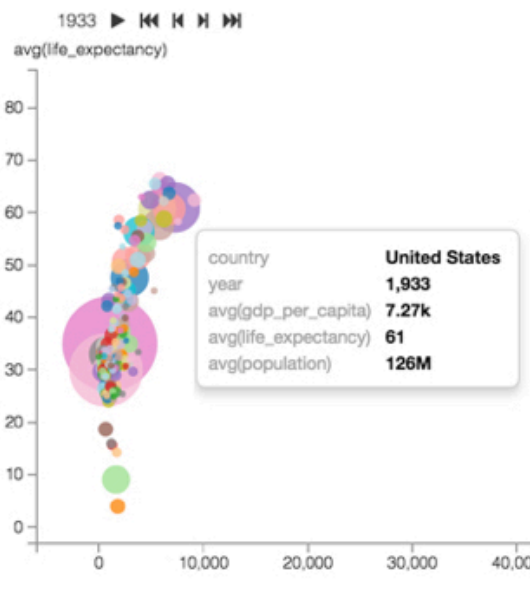


- There was another significant decrease in life expectancy due to the loss of as many as 8 million lives in the Soviet famine of 1932–33 and more specifically, the Holodomor. Soviet Union farm collectivization in the

Russia and Ukraine withheld grain from farmers and collectivized farms until unrealistic production quotas were met.



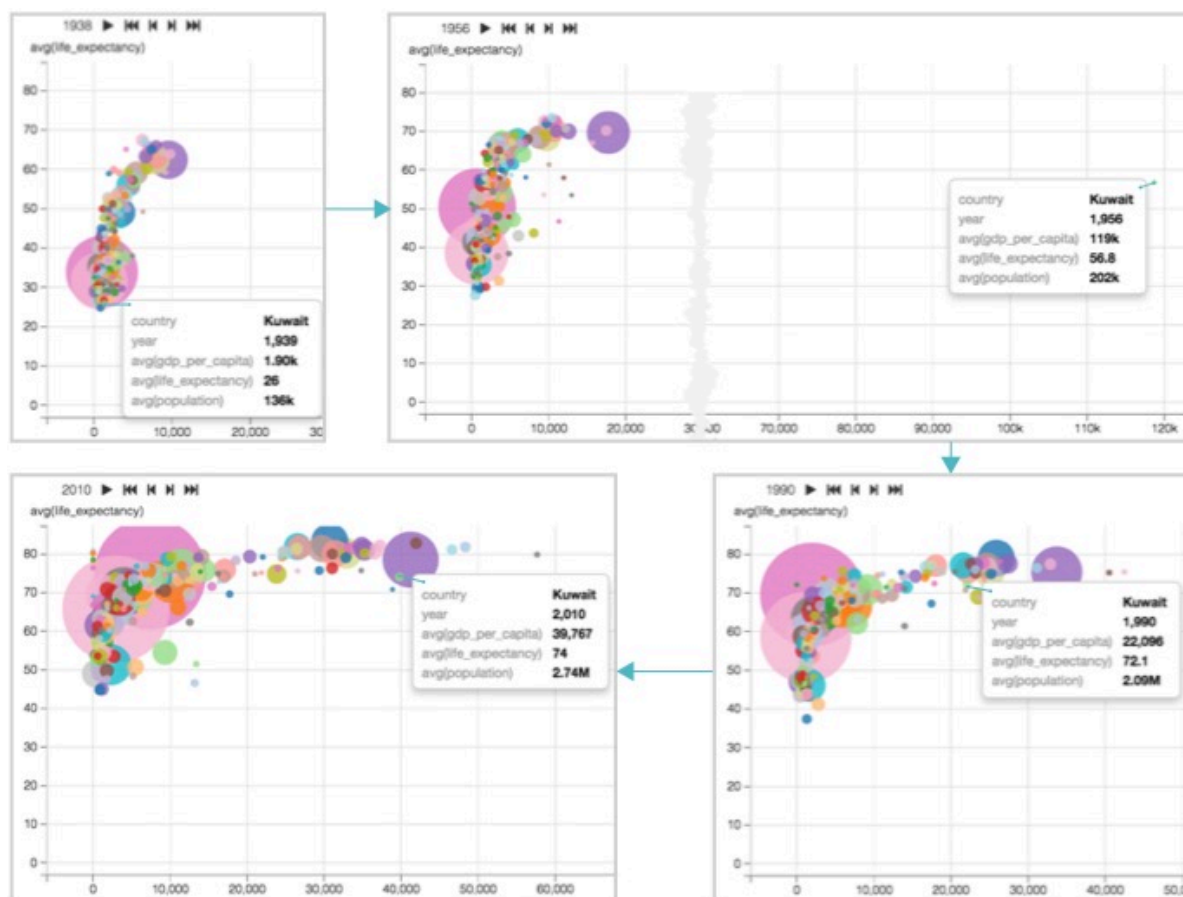
- The United States economy grew rapidly from mid-1930s through mid-1940s, because New Deal's economic relief and work creation policies stabilized the country after the Great Depression, while the World War II material support of the Allies and its own involvement in Europe, Africa, and the Pacific meant even greater production of materials, armaments, and two new naval fleets. You can see that GDP per capita increased nearly 3-fold, while the population increase and life expectancy were relatively modest.



- The exceptional increase in GDP in a very modest country of Kuwait after the discovery of the world's sixth largest oil deposits in 1938, through 1956 peak levels of GDP per capita growth, and large scale modernization from 1946 through 1982. After a period of international instability in 1980s, the 1990 invasion



by Iraq destroyed much of the infrastructure. After 1991 US intervention, the country has been rebuilding its infrastructure.



9. Click the pencil/edit icon next to the title of the visualization to enter a name for the visual.

In this example, the title is changed to 'World Population - Scatter with Transition'. You can also add a brief description of the visual as a subtitle below the title of the visualization.

10. At the top left corner of the Dashboard Designer, click SAVE.

### What to do next

While we can see the data for individual countries more clearly, it is often useful to contrast well-defined logical segments of data.

As a next step, you can compare and contrast GDP per capita and life expectancy for different UN Regions in *Adding trellises to scatter visuals*.

## Adding trellis to scatters

In Scatter visuals, you can add trellises for comparing and contrasting data. To discover variation within the dataset, to see both similarities and differences among categorical subsets of data, it is very useful to see visuals for these categories of data side by side. In Cloudera Data Visualization, this is very easy to do with the trellis option, which is essentially a doubling down on one or both of the axes.

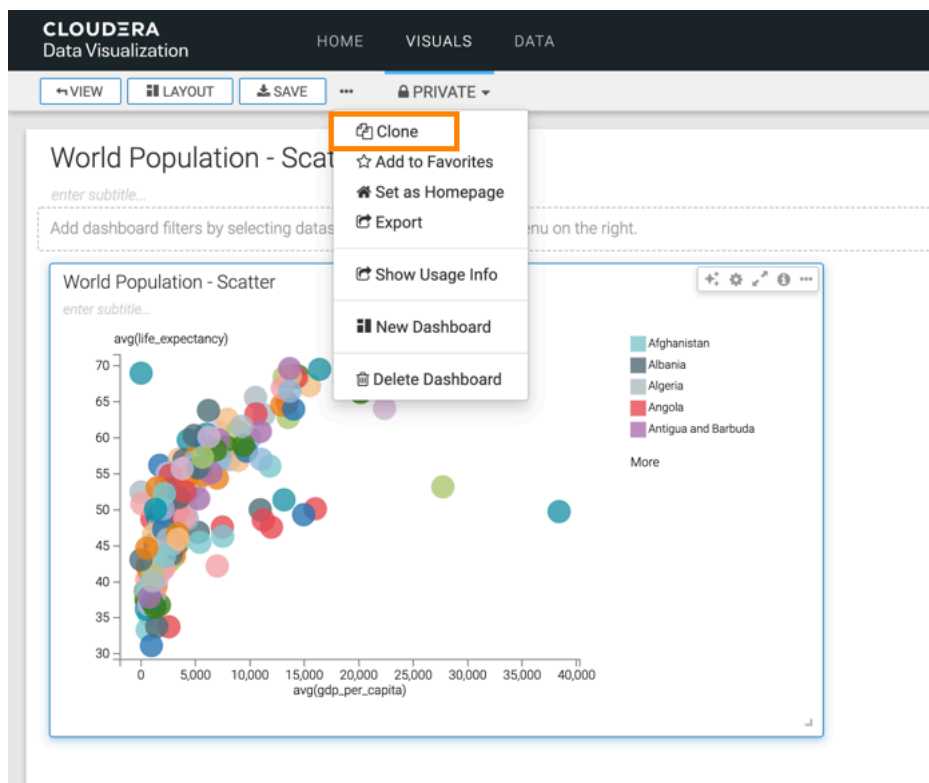
### About this task

In the World Life Expectancy dataset, you can use `un_region` to compare how life expectancy and GDP per capita vary in different geographic zones. For an even greater degree of detail, you could use `un_subregion`.

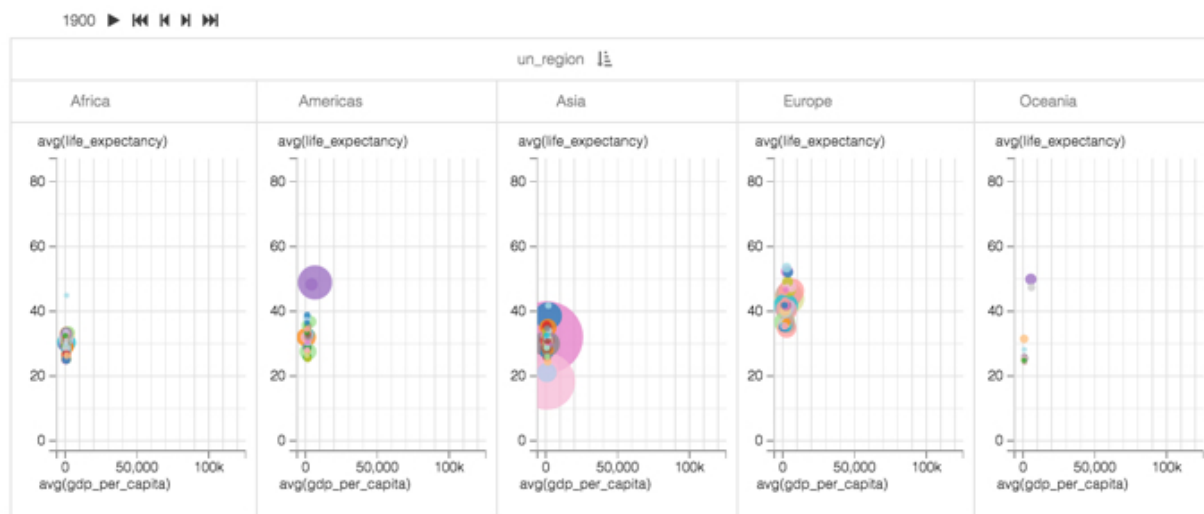

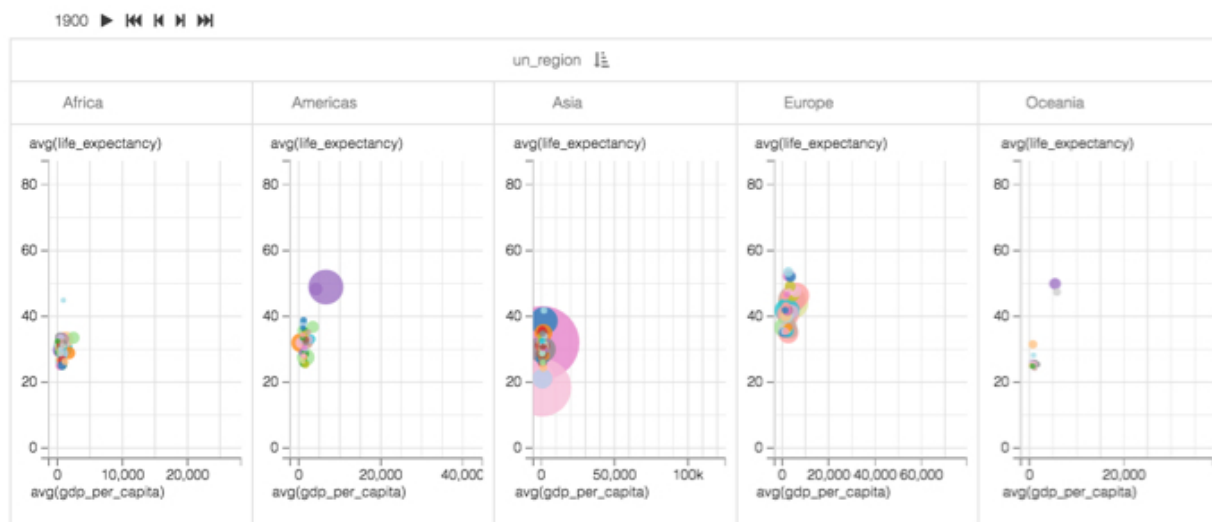
The Scatter visual refreshes, but this time you can see that it is divided into five separate graphs, that correspond to the identified UN Regions: Africa, America, Asia, Europe, and Oceania. There is a single animation control at the top, so when you click Play, all UN Regions animate simultaneously.



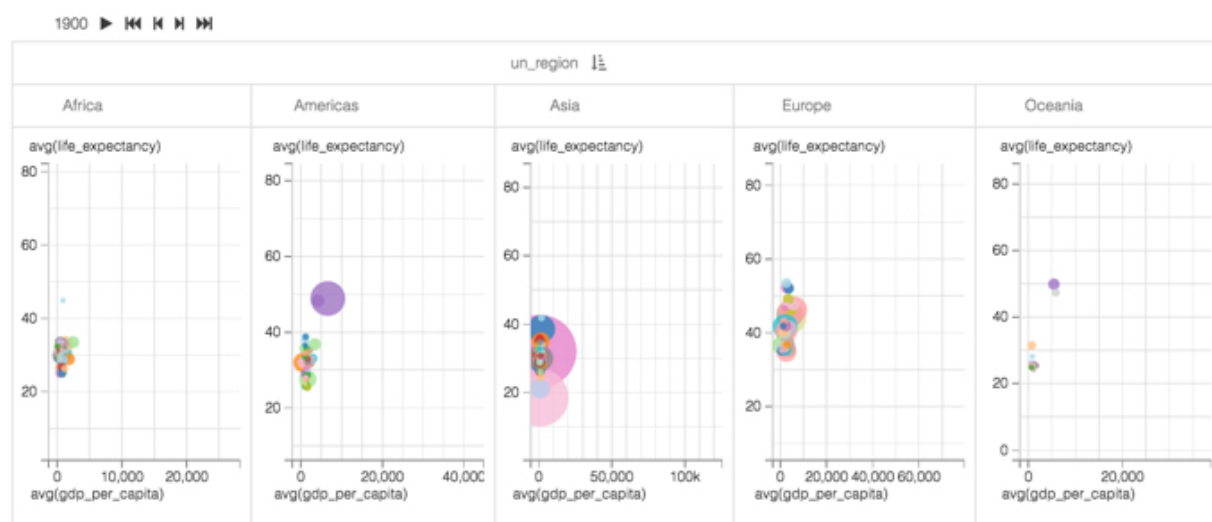
After running the animation, you will notice that the horizontal axes extend far beyond the necessary space for some of the areas. In particular, the GDP per Capita scale seems too large for Africa.

- To have each graph use its own optimized scale for the horizontal axis, enable the independent x-axis option, as described in *Enabling independent axis scale*, and click REFRESH VISUAL.

You can see that each area has its horizontal scale.



- Similarly, choose the independent Y axis option. The differences in vertical scaling are slight, but still noticeable.

## Pie

However, you can change them to the more traditional closed pie configuration by controlling the arc width of the circle, as described in *Changing arc width*.

The following steps demonstrate how to create a new Pie visual on the Capital Expenditure by Industry dataset. You must first create this dataset, following the steps described in *Creating datasets*.

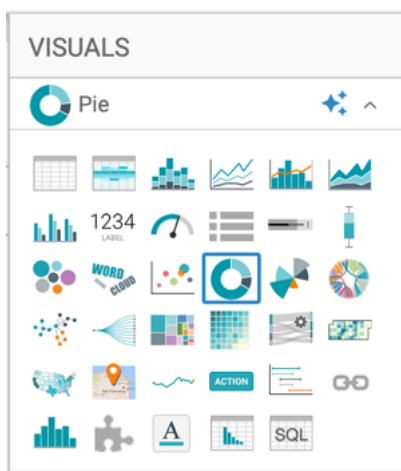

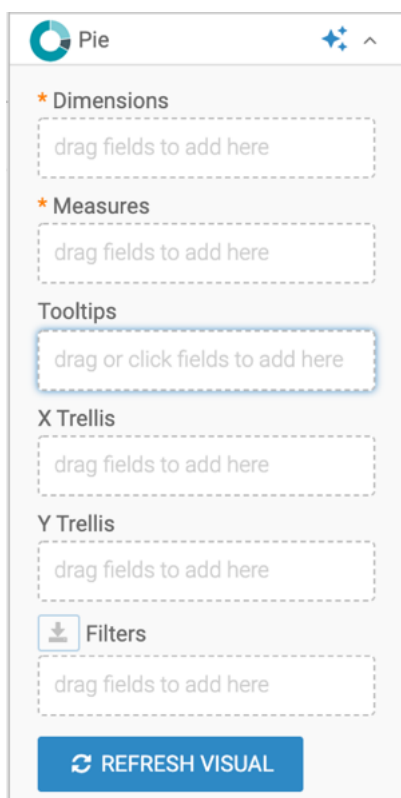

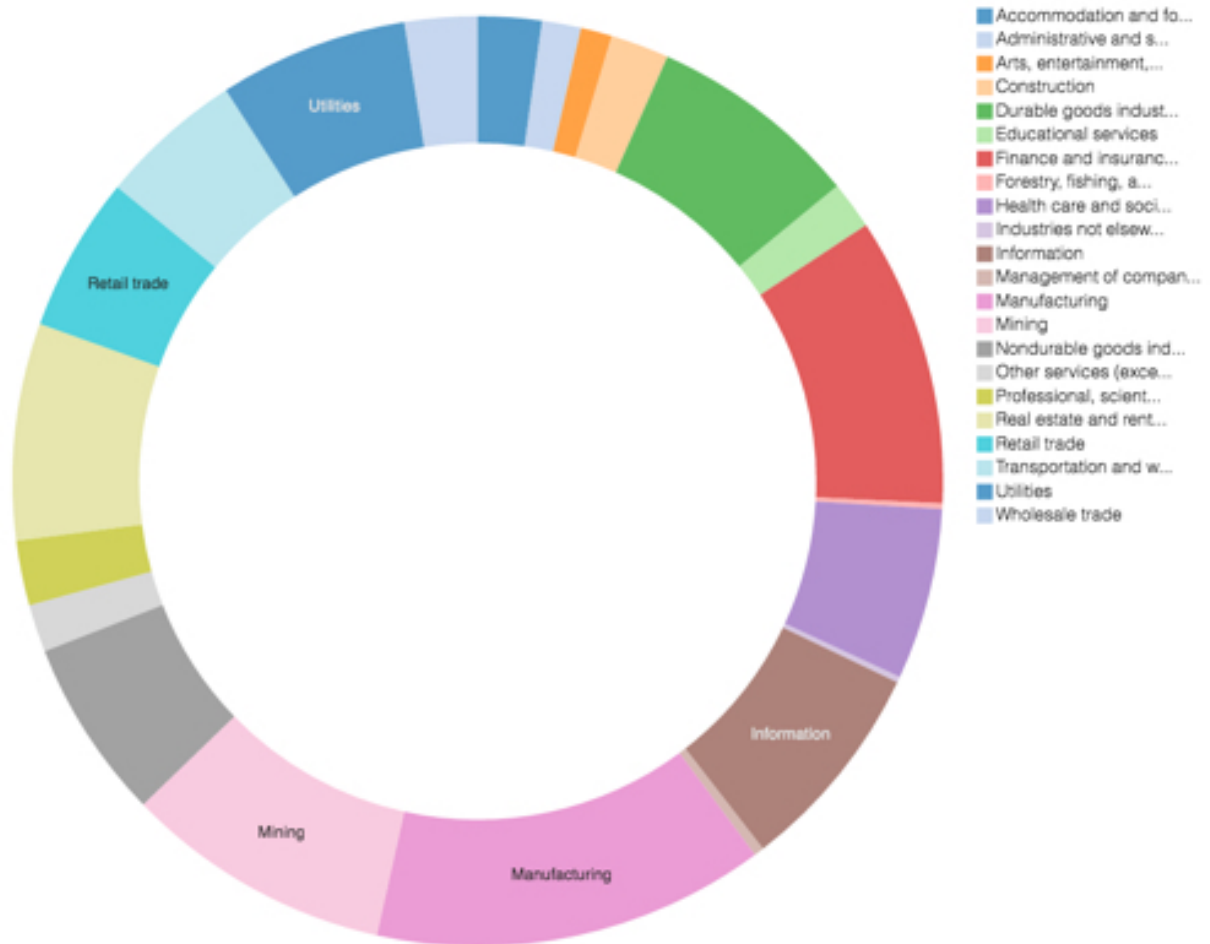

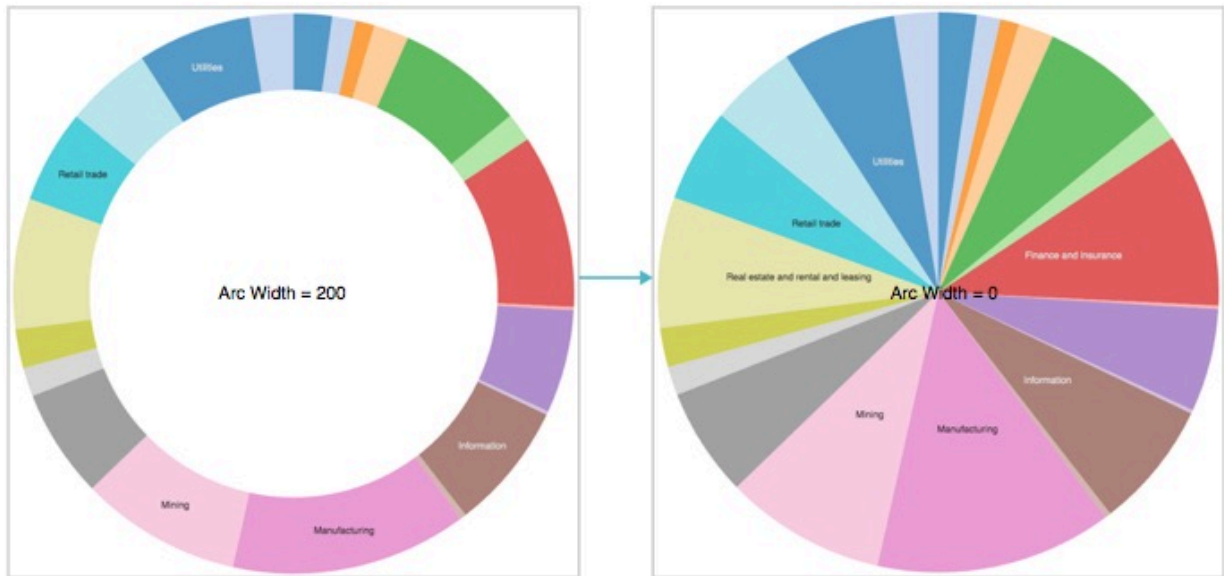

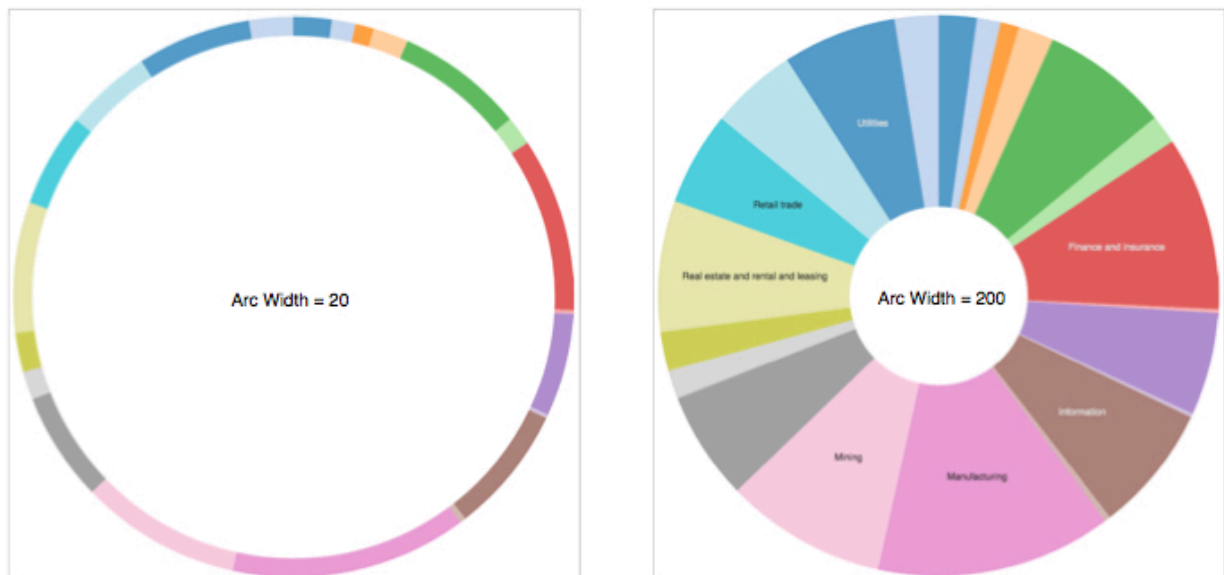

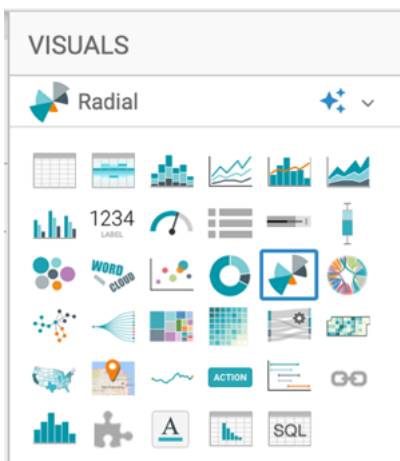

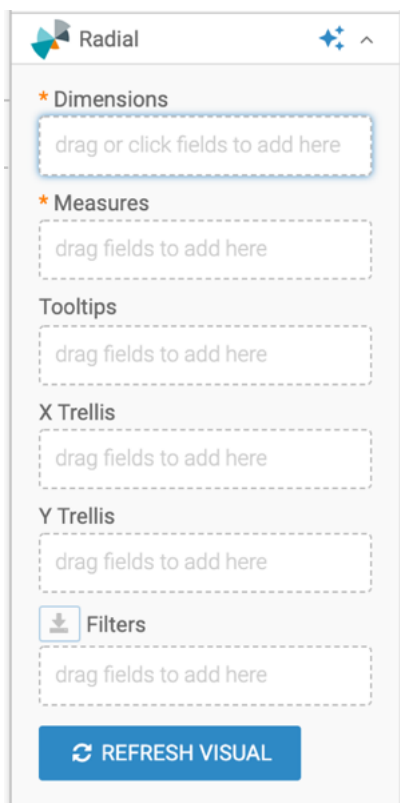

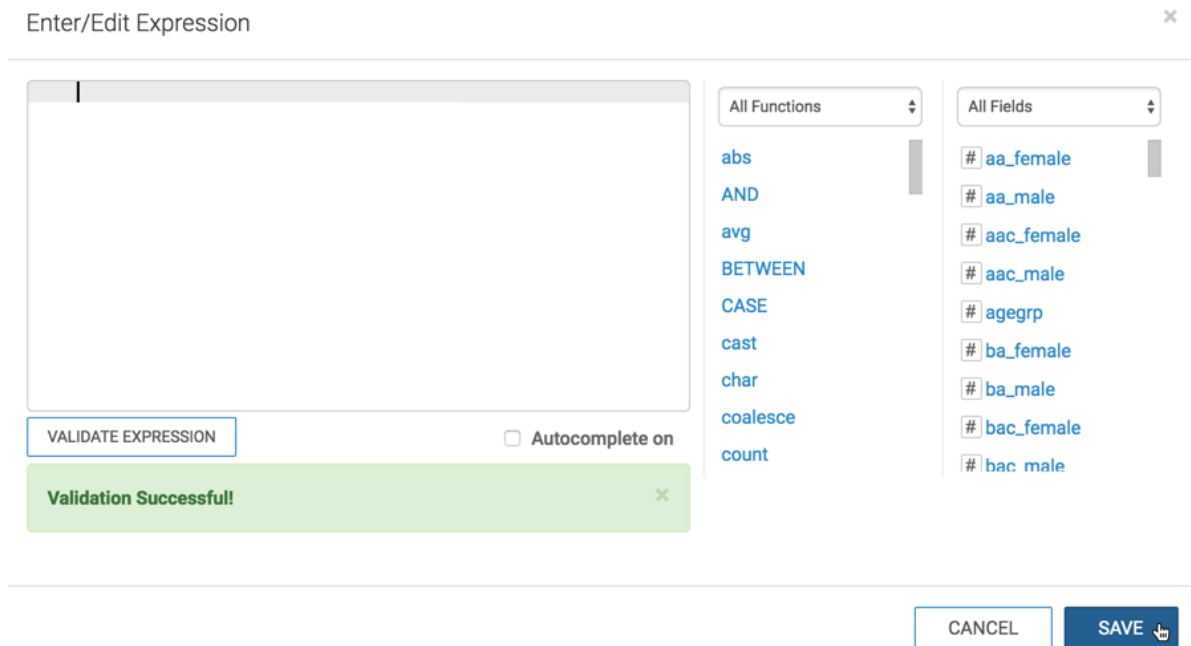

## Trellised radial

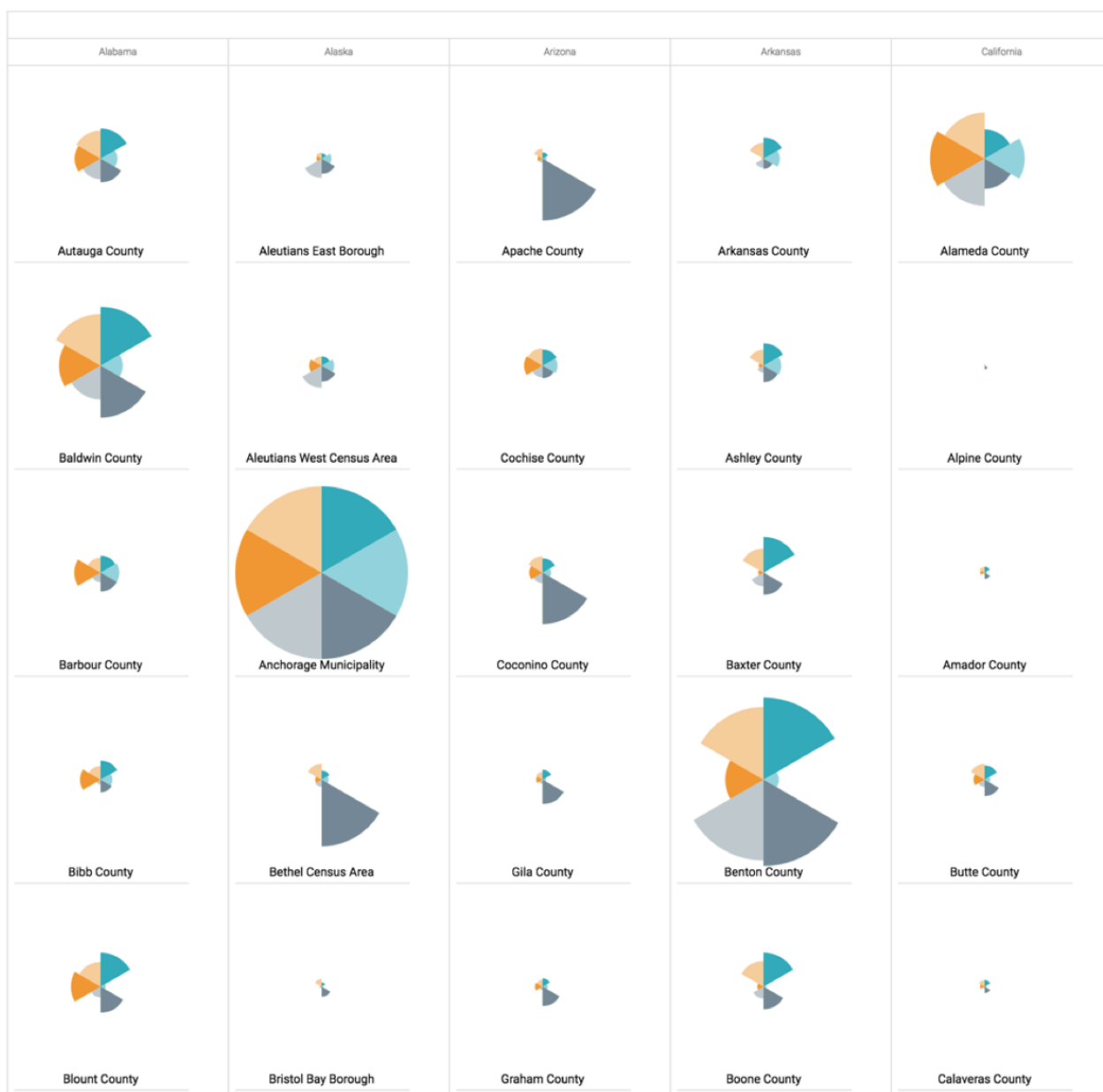

## Chord

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to create Chord visuals. These visuals expose the inter-relationships between entities, making them an ideal choice for comparing the similarities within a dataset, or between different groups of data. The nodes/dimensions are on the circumference of a circle, and the relationships between them are the arcs inside the circle. The size of the node is proportional to the measurement. Cloudera Data Visualization uses color to help distinguish the overlapping relationship arcs.

### About this task

Chord visuals are similar to Correlation Heatmaps because they both compare exactly two dimensions. Chords, however, plot dimensions that cover the same value domain, and are better at pointing out the presence of a relationship between nodes than the relative magnitude of that relationship.

The following steps demonstrate how to create a new chord visual on the SF Cabrides dataset. This dataset is based on data previously imported into Cloudera Data Visualization from a datafile. Each distinct line segment between two dimensions reports the correlation data. Because the values for pick-up and drop-off areas, `srcarea` and `tgtarea`, are in the same domain, it makes the dataset ideal for demonstrating chord visuals.

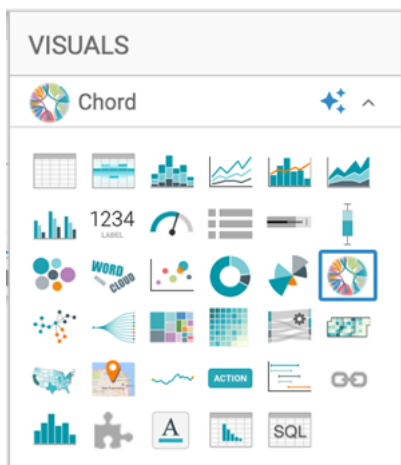

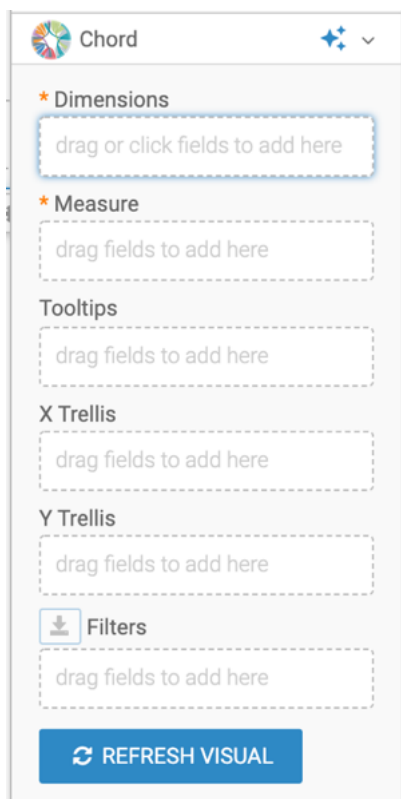

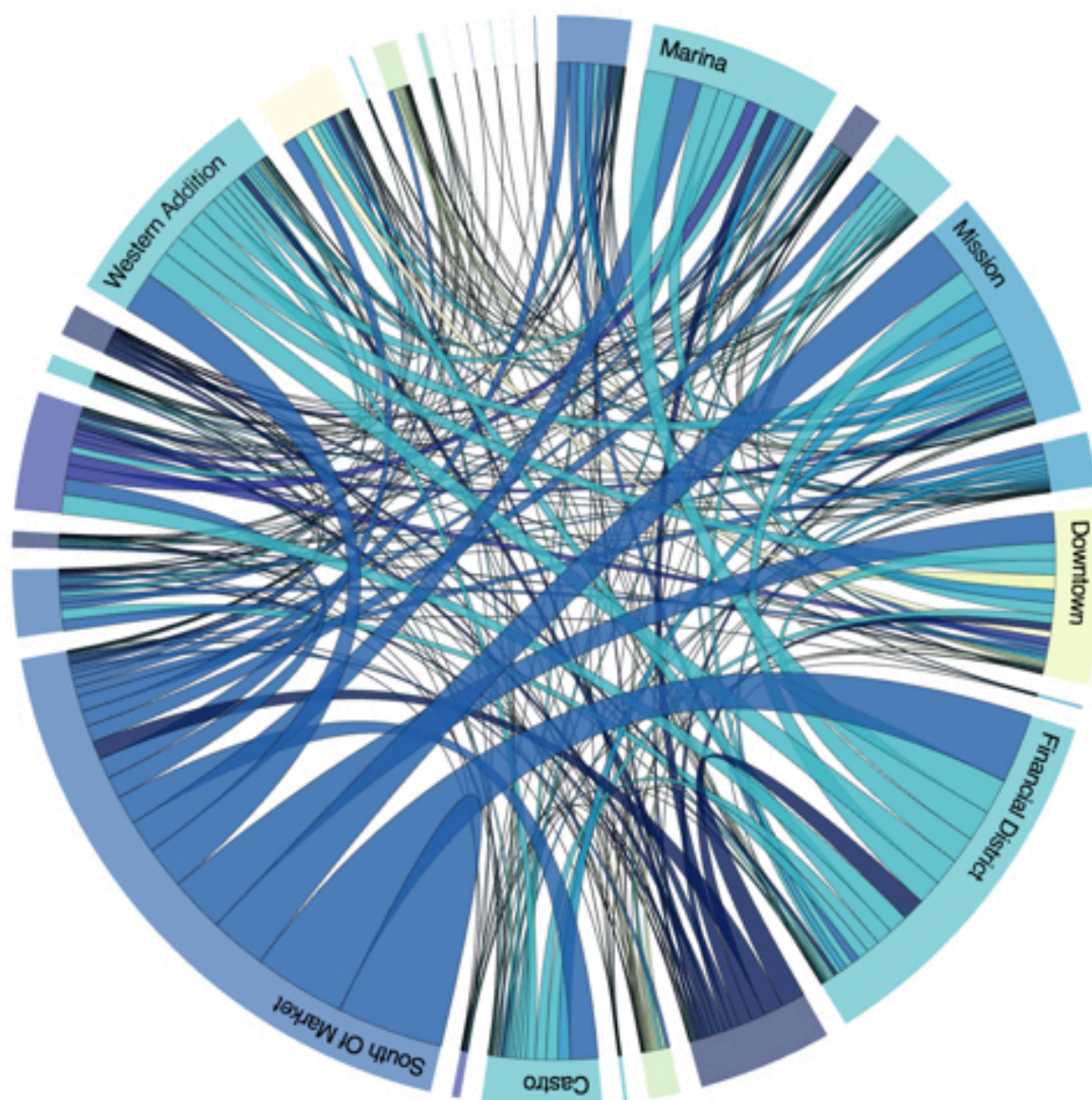

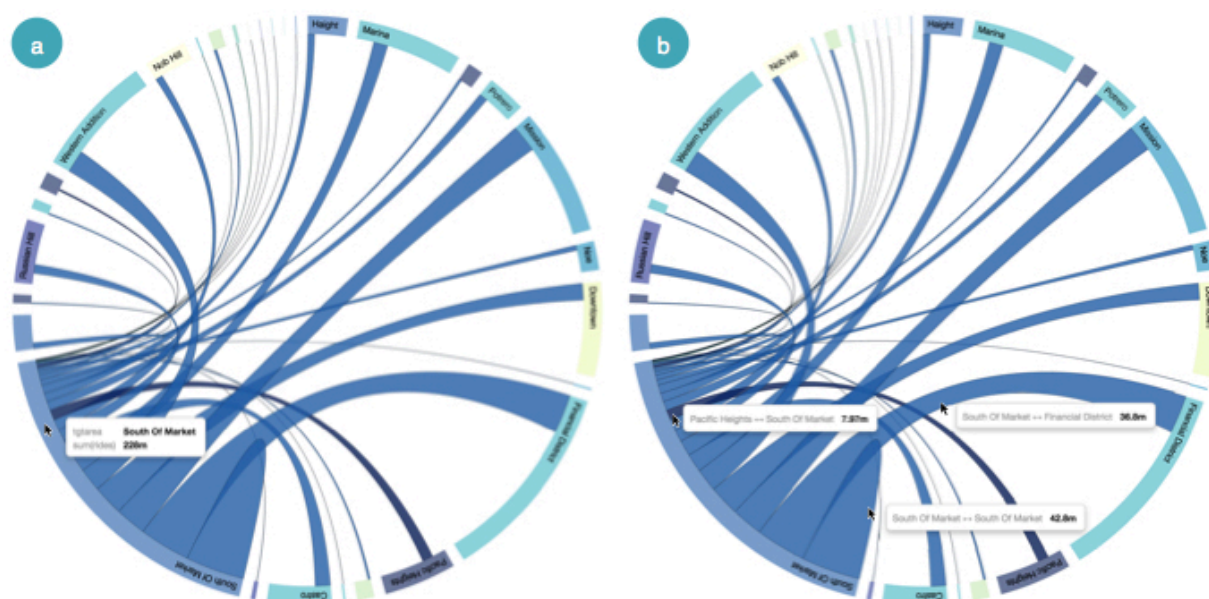

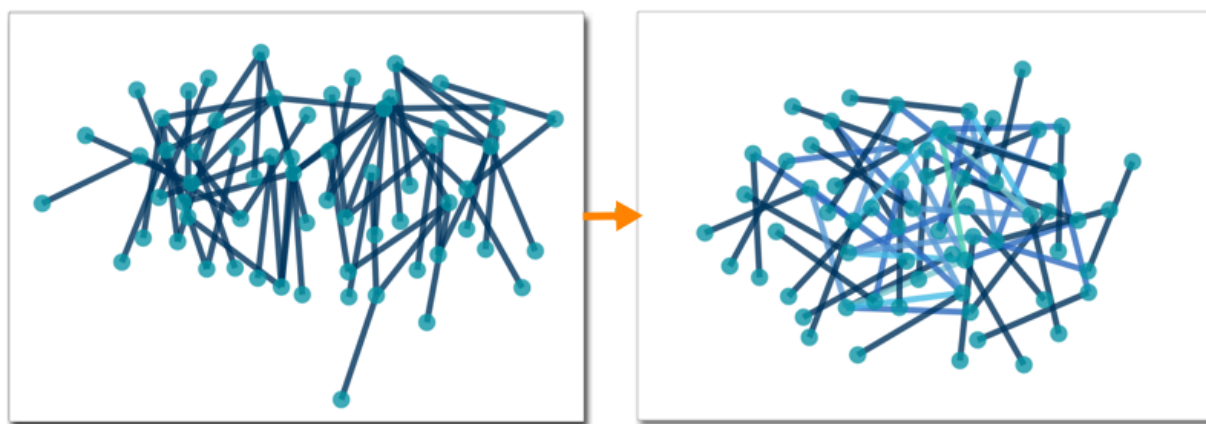

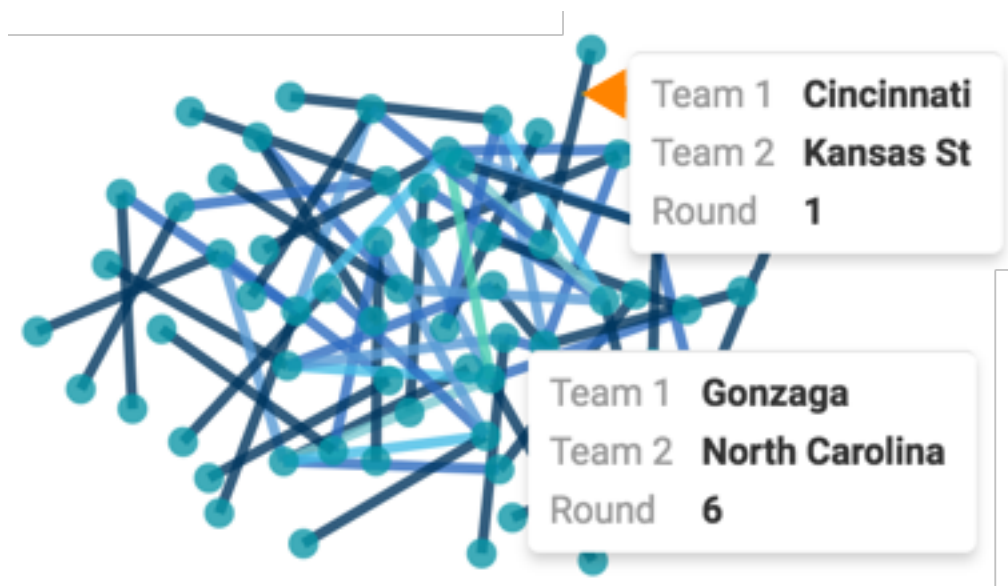

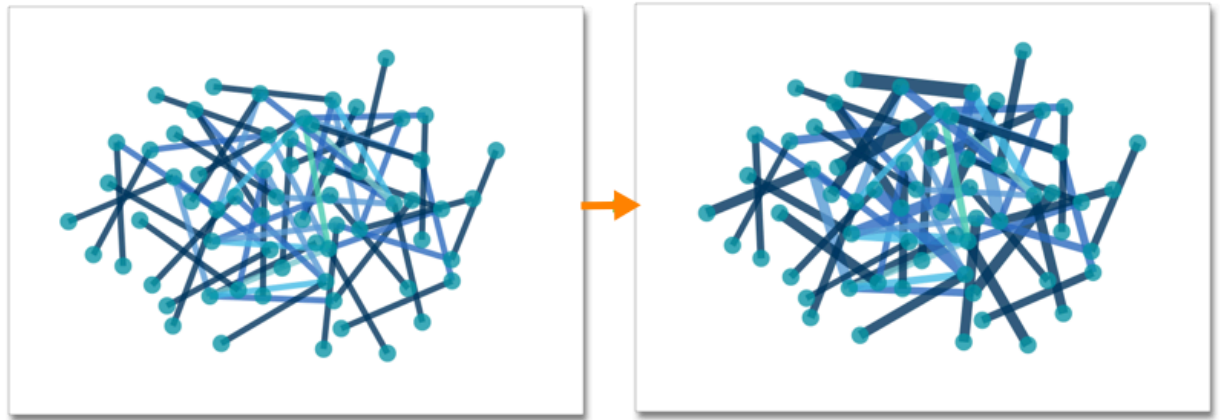

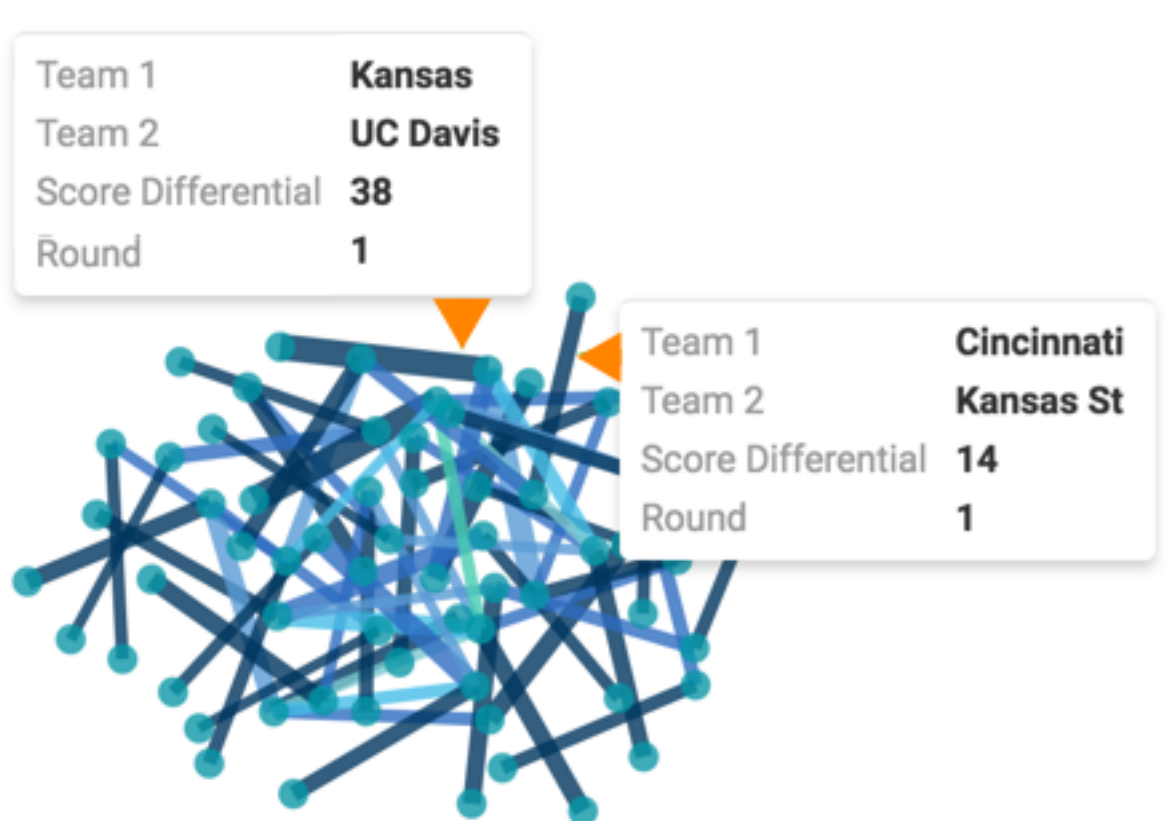

**Figure 15: Tooltips on a network visual with active link color shelf**





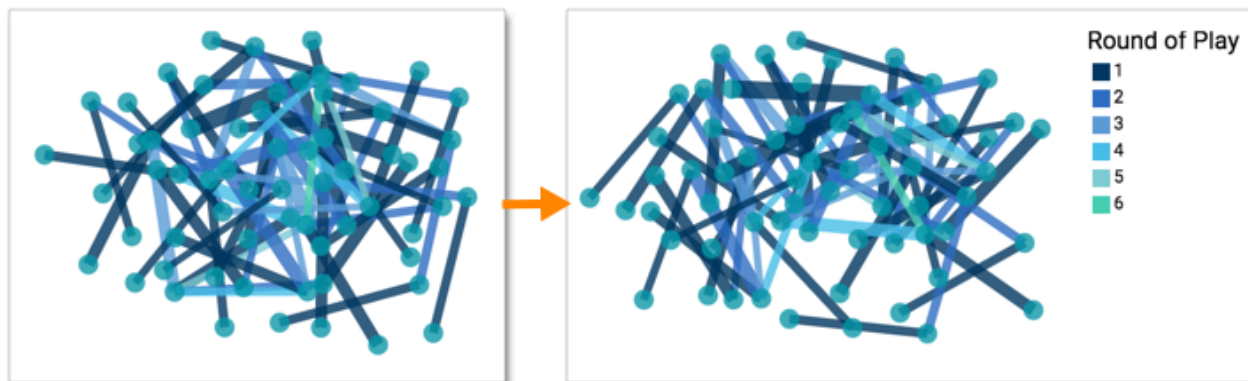

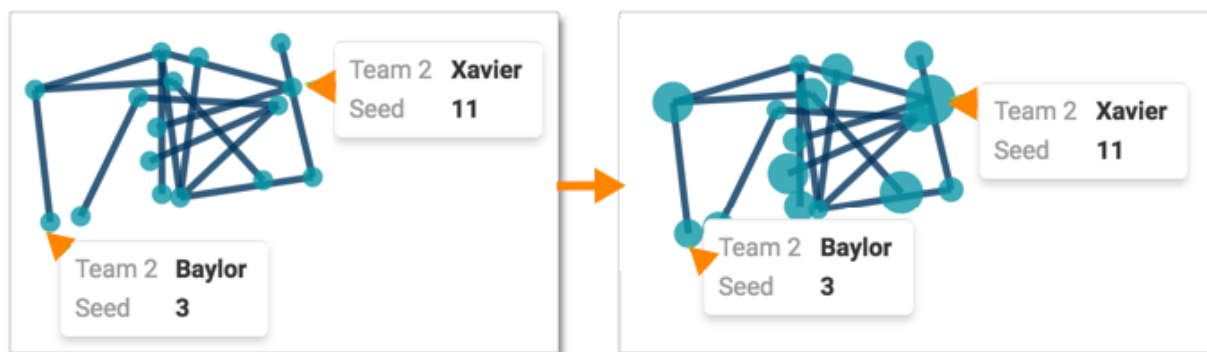

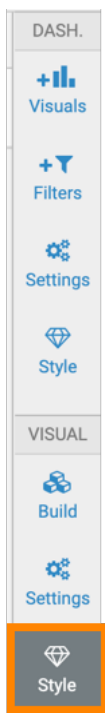

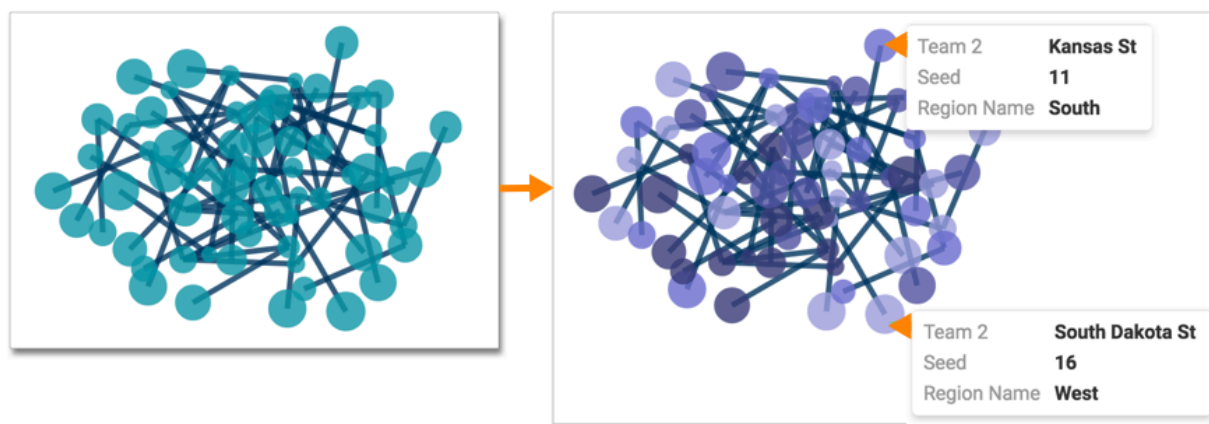

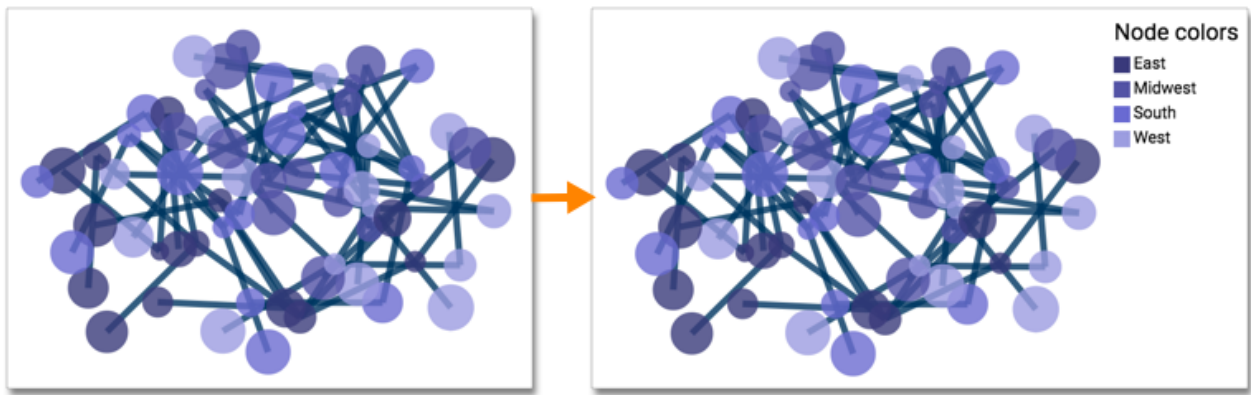

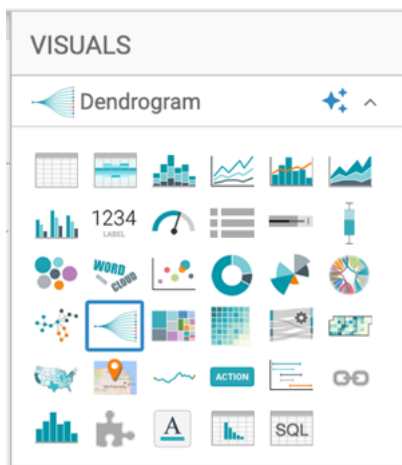

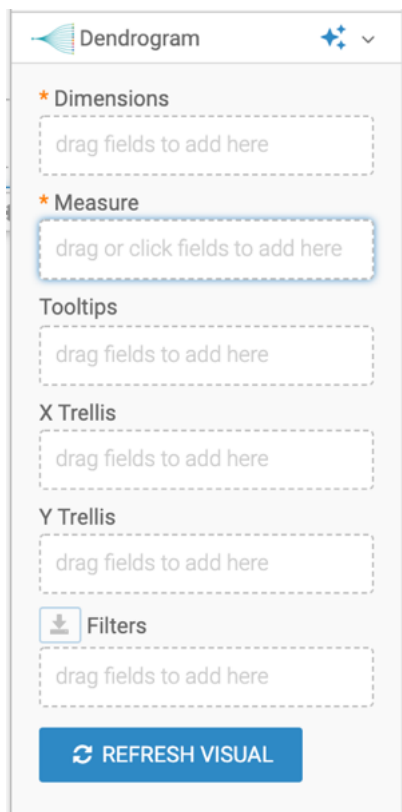

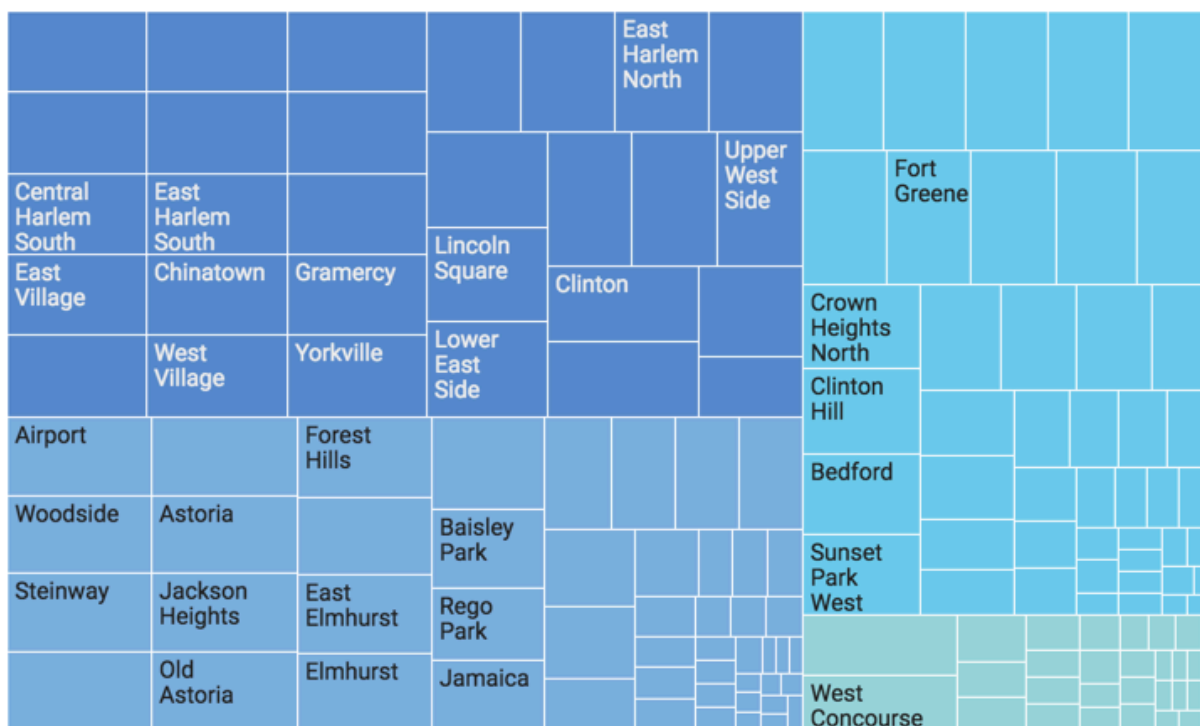

## Correlation heatmap

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to create Correlation Heatmap visuals. Correlation Heatmaps use colored cells, typically in a monochromatic scale, to show a 2D correlation matrix (table) between two discrete dimensions or event types. The values of the first dimensions appear as rows of the table, while the values of the second dimension are represented by the columns of the table. The color value of the cells is proportional to the number of measurements that match the dimensional values. This enables you to quickly identify incidence patterns, and to recognize anomalies.

Correlation Heatmap visuals are similar to Chords because they both compare exactly two dimensions. Correlation heatmaps are ideal for comparing the measurement for each pair of dimension values.

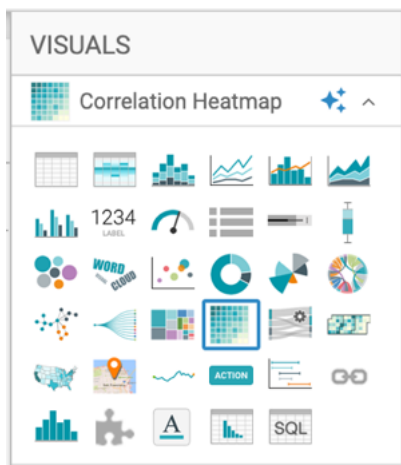

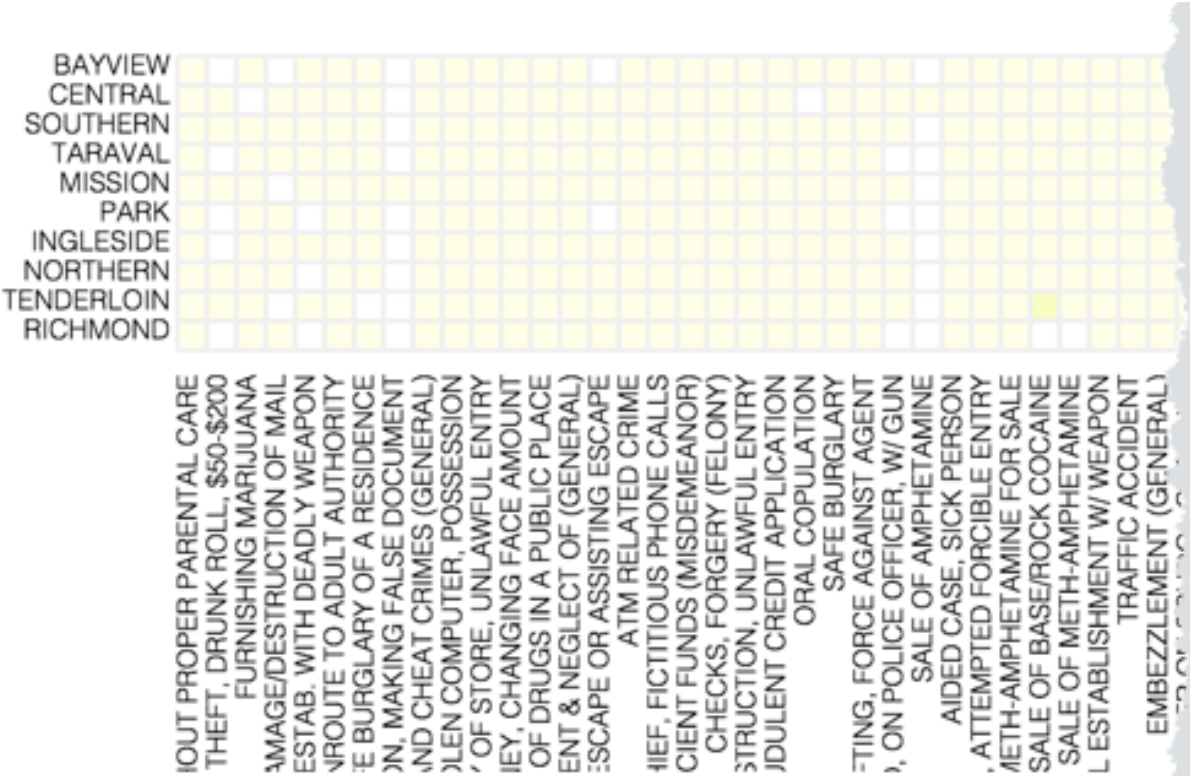

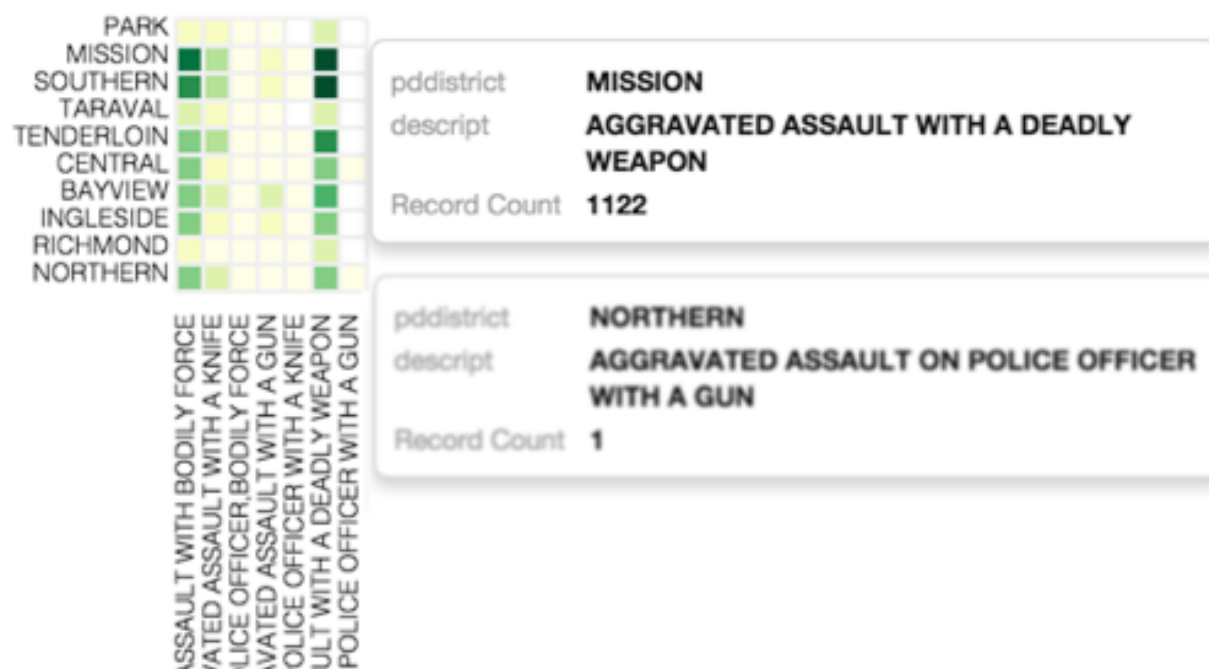

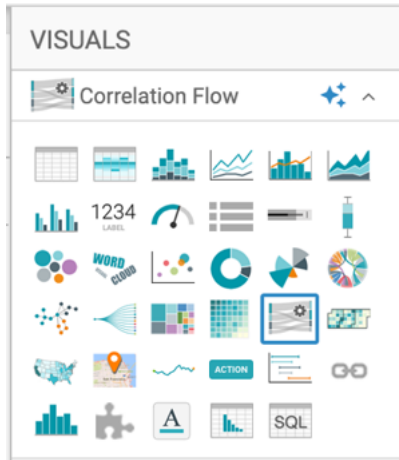

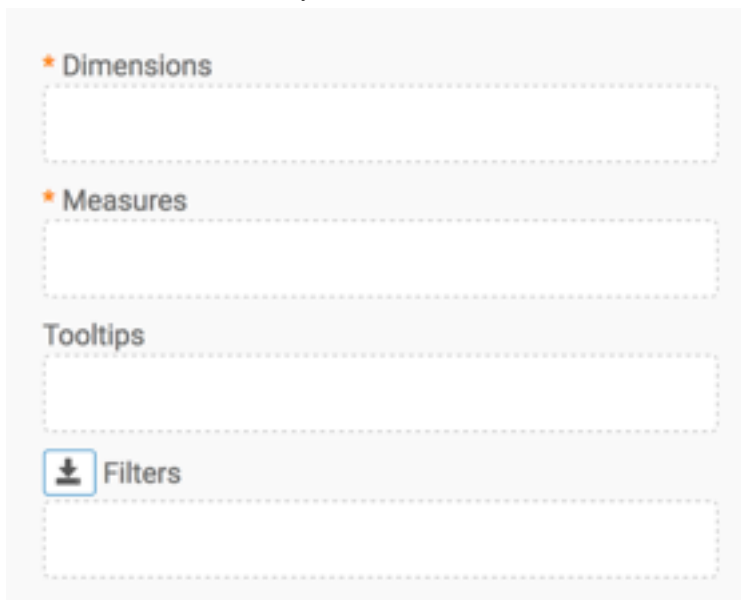

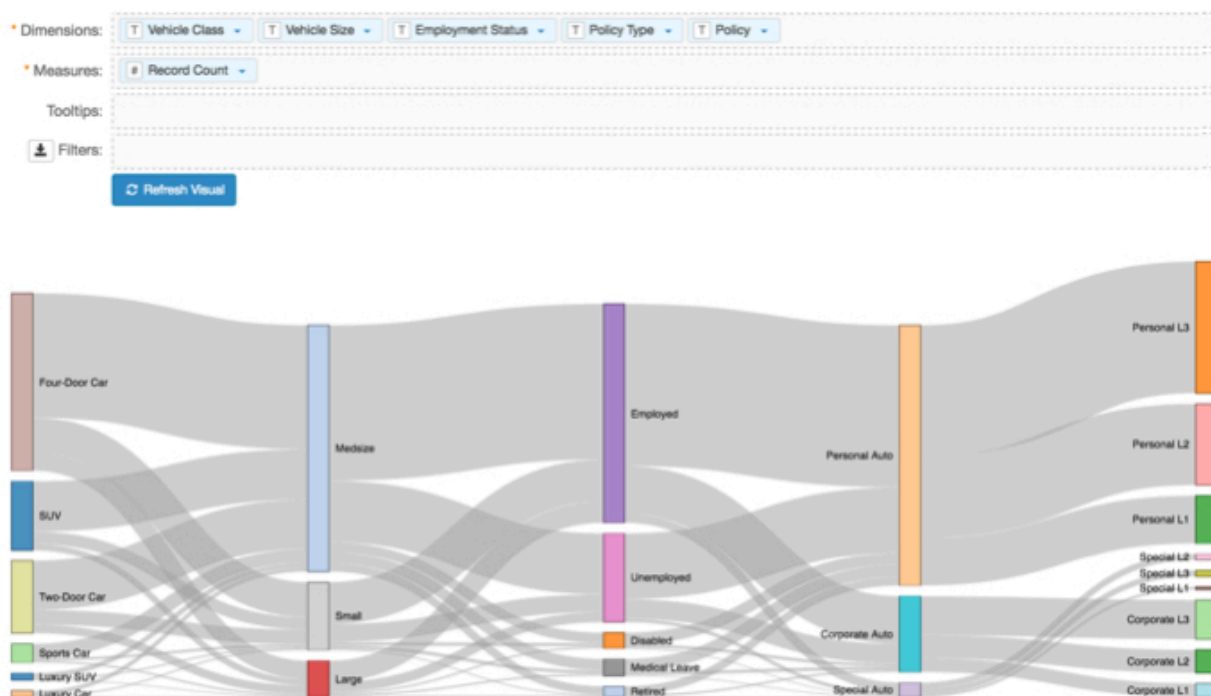

**Figure 20: Correlation Flow Visual**

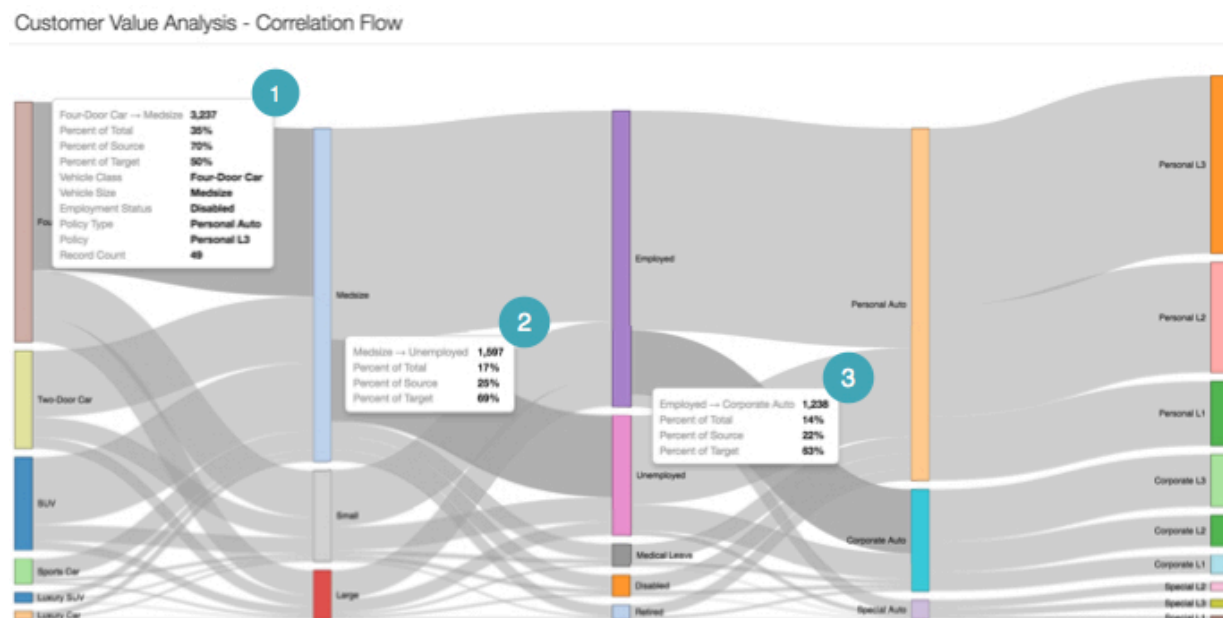

- Tooltip 1 demonstrates the correlation between Four-Door and Medsize vehicles. The dataset has 3,237 Four-Door cars, and they represent 36% of the total. Additionally, 70% of these cars are considered Medsize. Viewing this from the other direction of the correlation relationship, 50% of all Medsize cars are four-door cars.
- Tooltip 2 demonstrates the correlation between Medsize vehicles and Unemployed owners. It shows that 1,597 people are in both categories, and this segment represents 17% of all records. 25% of Medsize cars are owned by people who are unemployed, while 69% of unemployed people own a medsize vehicle.
- Tooltip 3 demonstrates the correlation between Employed owners and the ones who have a Corporate Auto vehicle policy. It shows that 1,238 people are in these two categories, which is 14% of the total. 22% of

employed owners have a corporate auto policy, while 63% of people with a corporate auto policy are actively employed.

## Maps

- A filled or choropleth map (Greek ##### for area or region and ##### for multitude) shows geographical areas that are shaded in proportion to the value of the measurement that is displayed on the map.



**Tip:** Consider the following when building choropleth maps:

- Use choropleth maps when your data are attached to enumeration units, such as counties, countries, zipcodes, and so on.
- Standardize data to show rates and ratios instead of raw data counts. For example, instead of plotting gross GDP, plot GDP per Capita.
- Use choropleth maps when you have data with continuous statistical surface. For example, Population is a count and representing it in colored map may be misleading. Population density is a ratio with a continuous statistical surface (even where 0 represents unpopulated areas); so it can be used in choropleth maps.
- A geomap with symbols or marks, such as bubbles, superimposes these symbols onto a geographical map. By default, the area of the marks corresponds to the relative size of the measurement.

Cloudera Data Visualization supports the following geographical specifications by automatically recognizing them as qualified GEO dimensions inside the dataset:

- country
- state or province for United States and Canada, respectively
- county, for United States only
- zipcode or postal code for United States and Canada, respectively
- longitude and latitude
- DMA, for Nielsen Designated Market Area Regions, in United States

If the relevant field in your dataset is not named correctly, be sure to adjust it using the Change Type Geo Option, described in *Change type*. Note also that you must use Geo Type fields when limiting the Drill Into options. For more information, see *Limiting drill into options*.

## Interactive maps

An interactive map paints geographic details over a basic map tile layer provided by a third-party provider. Cloudera Data Visualization offers several overlay layers for data display. It is an excellent choice for displaying large amounts of geo-based information in relevant detail.

- The base Map Servers include either Google Maps or Mapbox.
- The overlay layers that display data include the Heatmap, Cluster, Circles, and Routes and pins options.

**Note:**

- To use this feature, an Admin user must first specify, through the Site Settings interface, the API keys granted to your organization. This is described in *Keys for interactive visuals*.
- This visual type supports zero, one, or two field aggregations on the measures shelf. If no measure is supplied, the map will paint with an assumed value of 1. With one measure, all options use that measure. With two measures, the Heatmap, Cluster and Routes & Pins use the first measure only, while the Circles display both measures.
- Remember that to place information onto a map or interactive map visual, the records must contain geographical information, such as valid latitude and longitude pairs, zipcodes, states, and so on. To learn how to cast dataset fields into usable type, see *Change type* and *Geo type*.

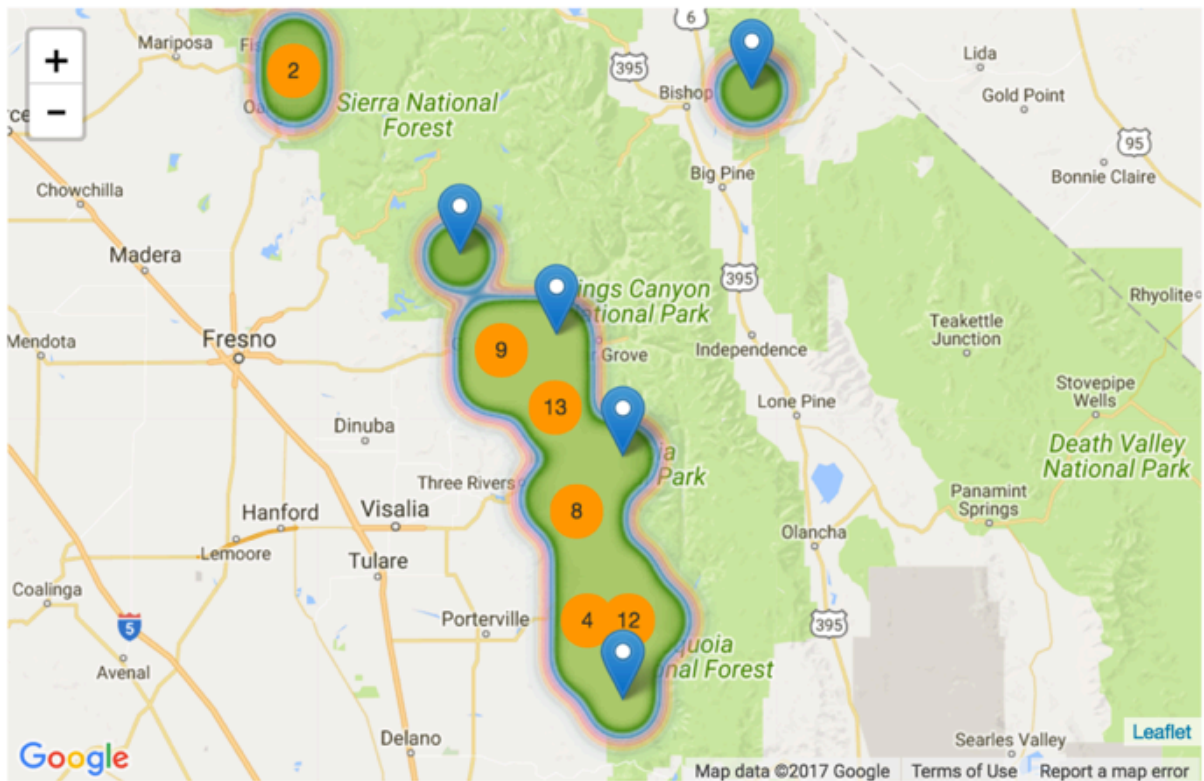
8. In this representation, there is noticeable overlap on the Heatmap. However, you can see the boundaries of each region by hovering the pointer over a section of the map.

The total count of measurements in each region is in the circle inside the region. This comes from the Cluster. Both Heatmap and Cluster are on my default.

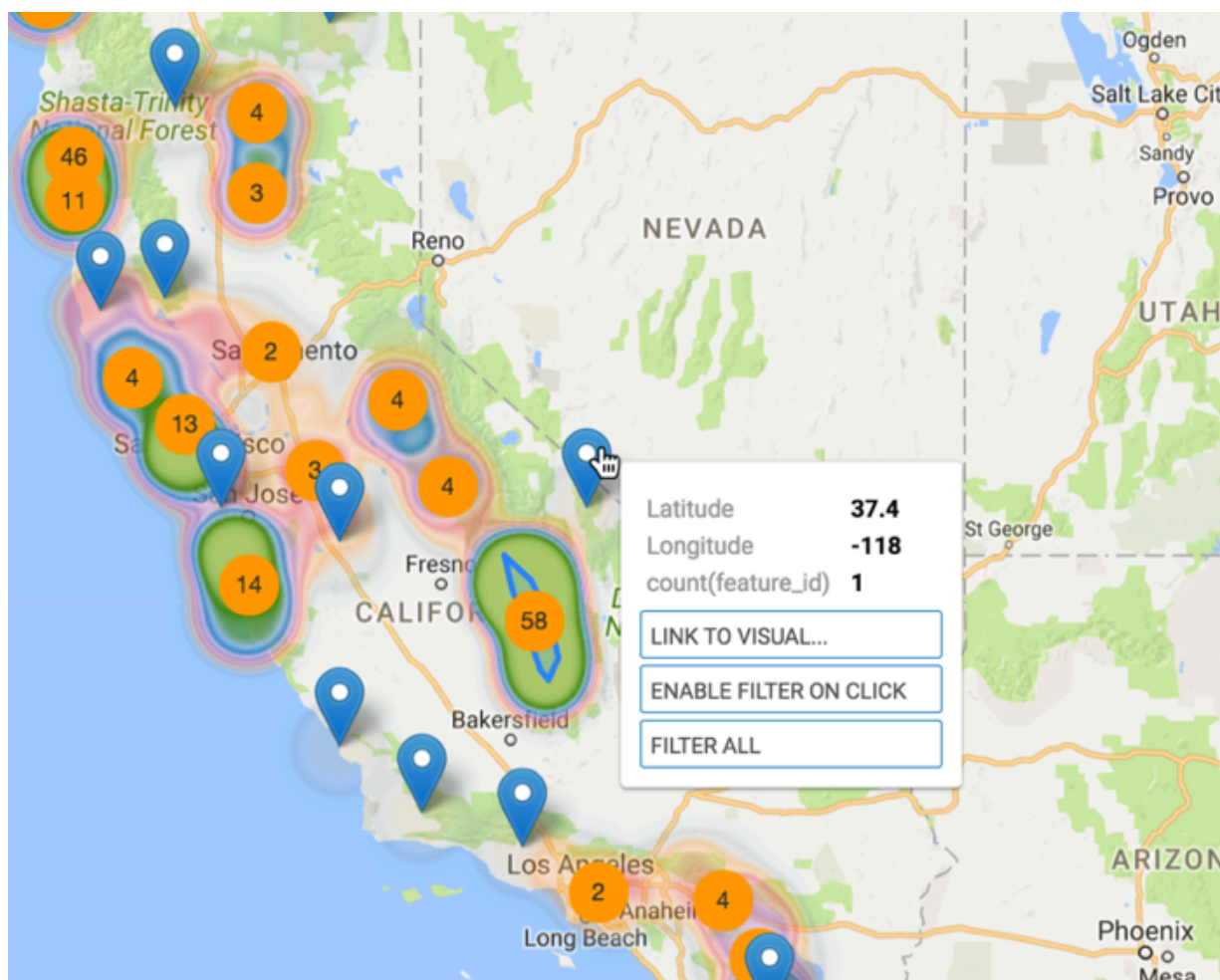


9. To see more detail, manipulate the map through magnification changes. You can also click on the map and manually 'pan' it to the area of interest.

The following image shows that the regions automatically adjust into smaller sections, and you can see both greater detail and more individual 'totals'.



10. The 'interactive' part of this visual is that after clicking on a region to zoom-in and reposition, to the level of an individual marker, you can enable click behavior.



11. Change the title to California Woods.  
12. At the top left corner of the Dashboard Designer, click SAVE.

### Choropleth interactive maps

In an Interactive Map visual, Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to create choropleth maps. A choropleth map shows geographical areas that are shaded in proportion to the value of the measurement that is displayed on the map.

## About this task



**Tip:** Consider the following when building choropleth maps:

- Use choropleth maps when your data is attached to enumeration units, such as counties, countries or zip codes.
- Standardize data to show rates and ratios instead of raw data counts. For example, instead of plotting gross GDP, plot GDP per capita.
- Use choropleth maps when you have data with continuous statistical surface. For example, Population is a count and representing it in colored map may be misleading. Population density is a ratio with a continuous statistical surface (even where 0 represents unpopulated areas); so it can be used in choropleth maps.

In this example, you will create a choropleth map that colors the average tax liability in California by zip code. The choropleth Interactive Map visual is based on the Personal Income Tax Statistics by Zip Code dataset. For an overview of shelves that specify this visual, see *Shelves for interactive maps*.

## Before you begin

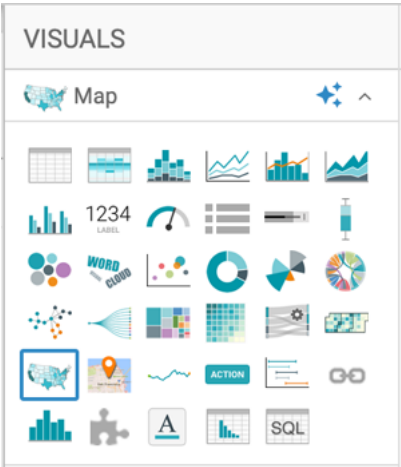
To create a choropleth map, you must specify the following for each visual:

- Custom mapbox style, which has a choropleth shape file in it. For more information, see *Adding a custom mapbox style*.
- Layer ID, which is the name of a unique layer within the Custom Mapbox style that identifies the shapes that you would like to color by a measure in your data. For more information, see *Specifying a choropleth layer ID*.
- Geo-type as Shape ID: The dataset must have at least one field in the Geo shelf to determine the location on the map. You must change the Geo-type to Shape ID. A Shape ID is a key that joins the shapes in the Custom mapbox style and the field in the Cloudera Data Visualization dataset. This helps in identifying the measure that maps to the shape. This Geo field must be in the dataset that was used to create the custom mapbox style.

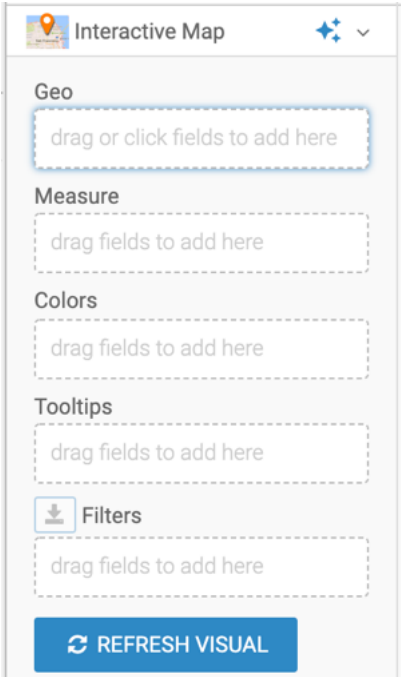
## Procedure

- 2. In the VISUALS menu, find and click Interactive Map.

### Geo

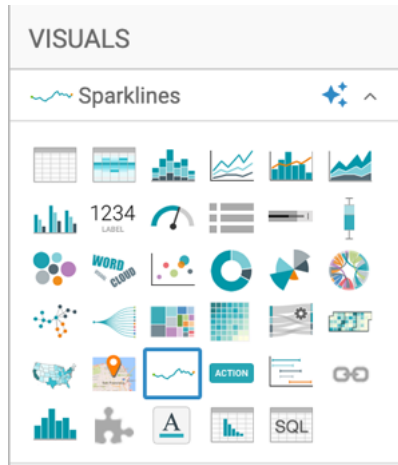

## Sparklines

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to create Sparklines visuals. A Sparklines chart shows the general shape of the variation in measurement (usually over time) in a simple, condensed, and memorable manner. Sparklines are small and succinct, and can be easily located with the text where they are discussed. You can contrast Sparklines with typical X/Y charts that are designed to show as much data as possible.

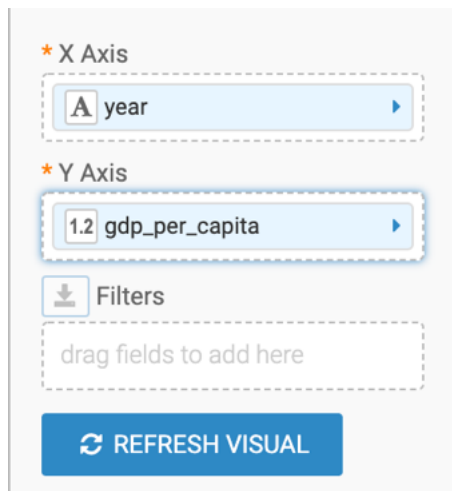
### Procedure

1. Start a new visual based on the World Life Expectancy dataset.
2. Select Sparklines in the VISUALS menu.



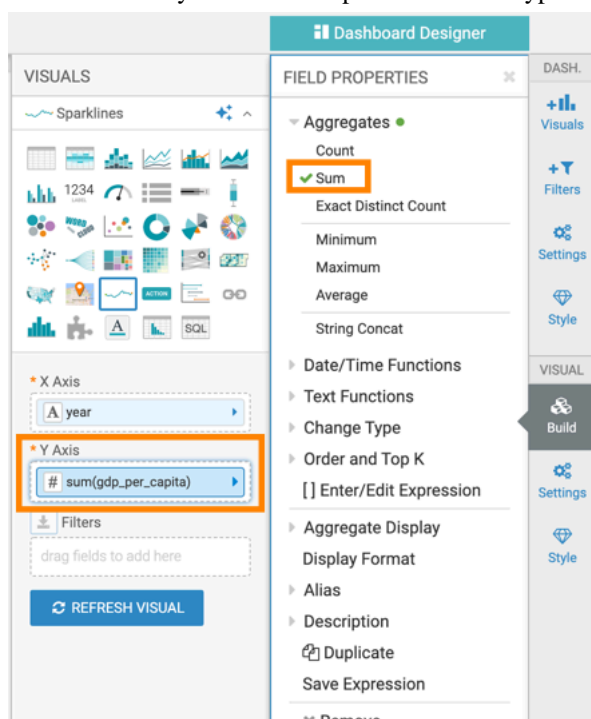

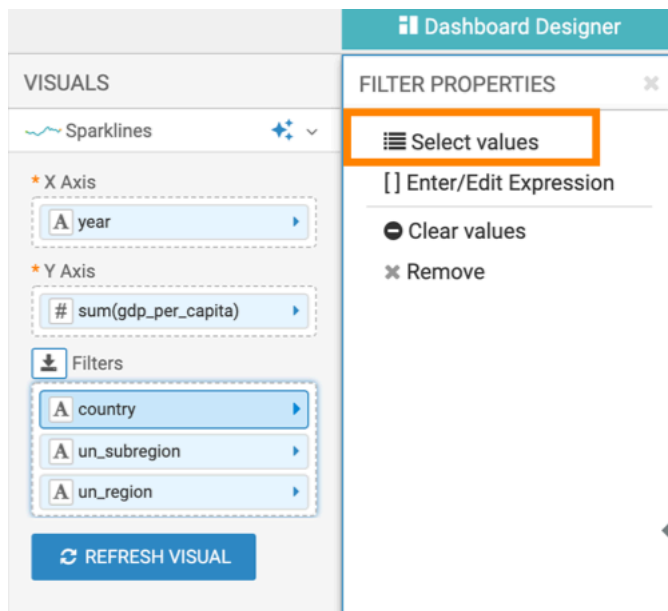

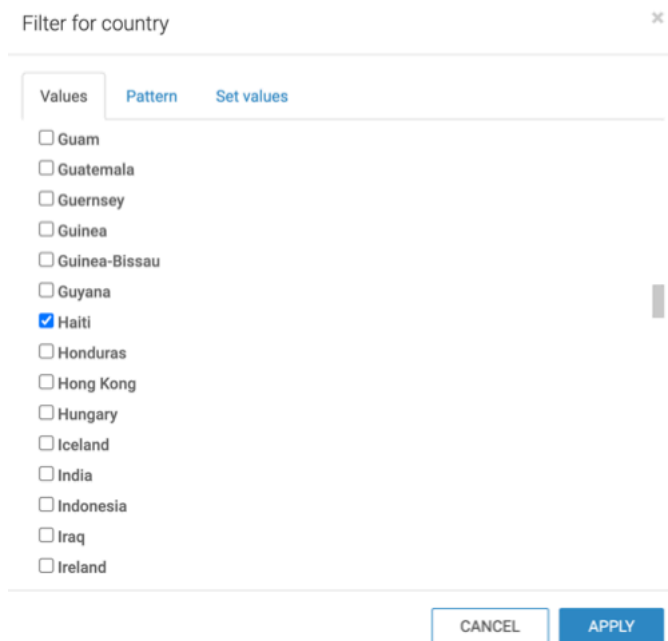

## AI visual

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to embed interactive and intelligent components into dashboards and applications.

The AI visual provides a natural language interface for exploring datasets through text or speech. It enables you to ask questions in everyday language and receive contextual, data-driven responses directly within dashboards. By combining conversational input with flexible query approaches, the AI visual makes it easier to analyze data and discover insights without requiring technical expertise.

When added to a dashboard, the AI visual connects to the selected dataset and answers user questions using the configured AI Approach. Depending on the settings and the query, it may:

- Use the ongoing conversation context – Reference previous exchanges to provide more relevant, contextual answers.
- Run a SQL query – Translate the user question into SQL, run it on the dataset, and summarize the results.
- Perform a similarity search – Run a query against the vectorized dataset and return matching records.

**Important:**

The option to select between AI approaches is available starting with Cloudera Data Visualization 8.0.6. If you are using AI visual in an earlier product version, you can only view visuals on embeddings-supported connections and use the similarity search feature.

The retrieved information is then passed to the large language model, which generates a natural language response displayed within the visual.

The AI visual can apply smart filters to your dashboard based on your questions. For example, asking about a specific topic will automatically adjust other visuals to highlight relevant data. This helps validate the AI's response and offers a more intuitive way to explore insights, without the need to manually search through filters or menus.

You can create an AI visual in Cloudera Data Visualization to let users query data through natural language. Before creating the visual, you must configure the required AI engine and data settings, and ensure the dataset meets the requirements for the chosen AI approach (SQL query or similarity search).

**For SQL query AI approach**

There are no special data requirements if you are using the SQL query AI approach.

### For Similarity search AI approach

If you want to use similarity search as the AI approach, you must connect to a data source that contains a vector column with pre-created embeddings. This can be done in different ways depending on how your data is stored and ingested.

One common method is to upload a CSV file into a supported vector database (Solr or SQLite). For instructions, see [Importing data in CSV format](#).



**Note:** The CSV file must include a vector column with pre-generated embeddings.

Another option is to use continuous data ingestion. If your dataset is updated continuously (for example stored in an Apache Iceberg table), you can use a data pipeline to:

- Convert new records into vector embeddings
- Write them into the connected vector database

Continuous data ingestion allows you to keep the dataset used by the AI visual up to date and relevant with minimal manual effort. Follow the below steps to connect to the required data source.

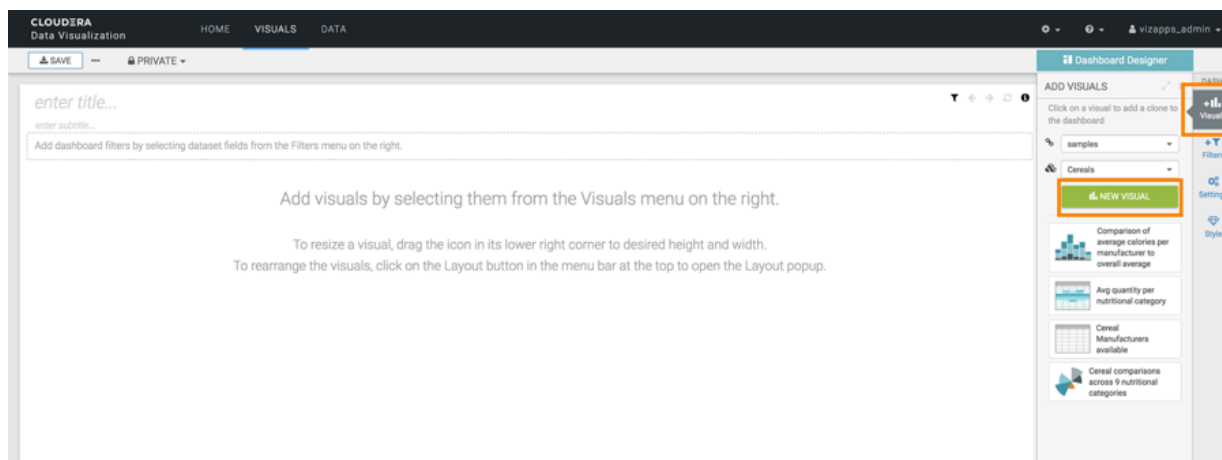
1. Ensure the data you plan to use with the AI visual is vectorized and available in a supported vector database (SQLite, Solr 9+, or CSS). This can be from a CSV upload or a continuously updated data source.
2. Connect to the vector database that contains your dataset with vector embeddings.
3. Create a dataset from the vectorized data. For instructions, see [Creating a dataset](#).



**Note:** Solr integration requires Solr 9. Earlier versions, including Solr 8, are not supported.

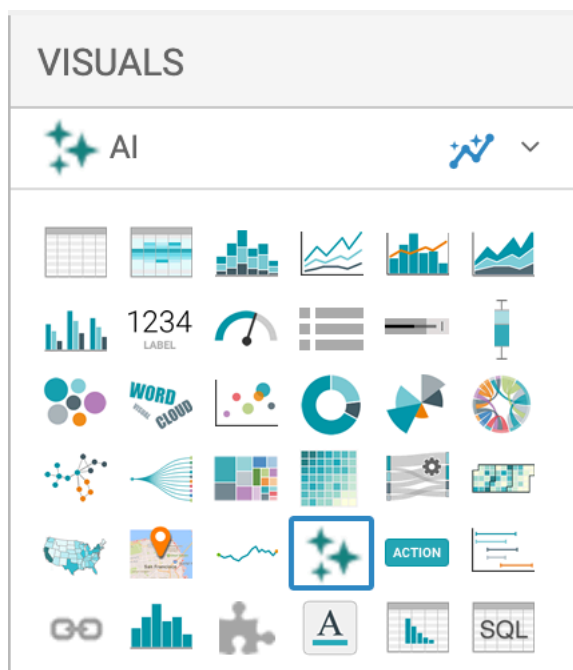
## Procedure

1. On the main navigation bar, click VISUALS.
  - To add the AI visual to an existing dashboard: open the dashboard and click EDIT.
  - To start fresh: click **Create New Dashboard** to open a new, blank dashboard.
2. In the Dashboard Designer interface, open the Visuals menu from the side menu bar and click NEW VISUAL.



The Visual Builder appears. By default, a table visual is created. For more information, see [Visual Builder overview](#).

3. In the VISUALS menu, click the AI visual icon.



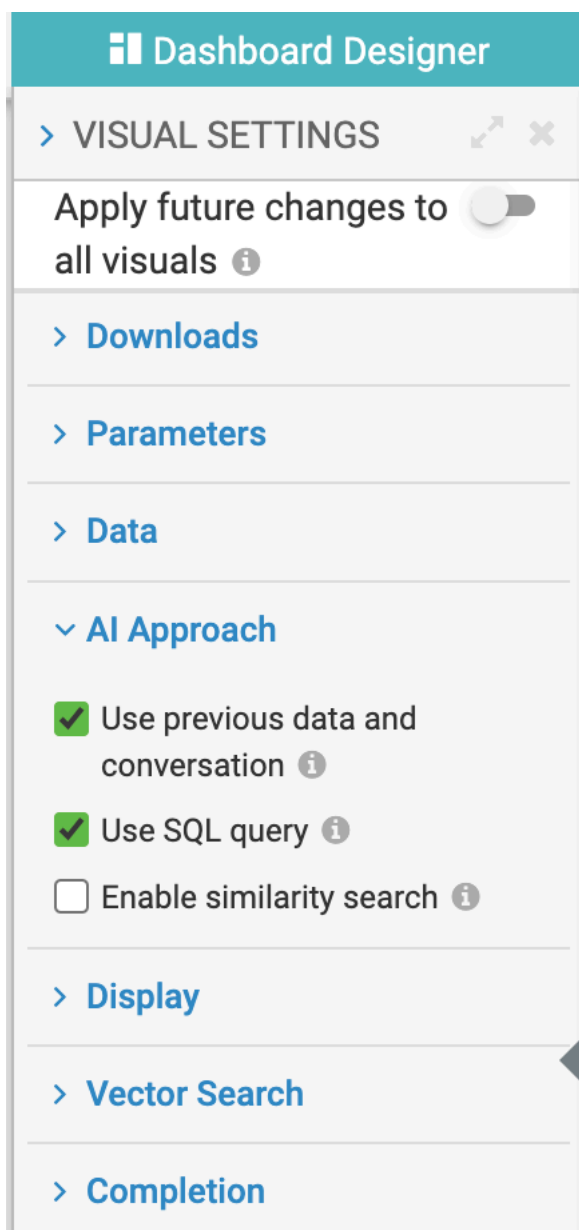
A blank AI visual is added to the dashboard.

The screen also displays the current AI approach (SQL query by default) and the default completion model. You can adjust the AI approach and other settings in the **VISUAL Settings** panel.

4. Click **Settings AI Approach** from the right-side **VISUAL** menu and choose how user queries will be answered.

The following options are available:

- **Use previous data and conversation** – Incorporates previous context in the conversation to refine or expand responses to provide more contextual answers. This option is enabled by default.
- **Use SQL query** – Generates SQL queries against the connected dataset and summarizes the results. It is enabled by default, and when enabled, it disables similarity search.
- **Enable similarity search** – Performs a vector-based search to find the most relevant records to answer the query. When enabled, SQL query is disabled automatically. This option is only available for SQLite, Solr 9+, and CSS datasets.



To use the AI visual, you must select either SQL query or similarity search. With both options, you can also include previous data and conversation context.

If you are using SQL query, continue with Step 5.

If you are using similarity search, first you need to populate the shelves of the AI visual.

- a. Switch back to the Build menu and populate the AI visual shelves from the fields listed in the DATA pane.

- **Embeddings:** Add vector fields containing embeddings that you want the AI model to analyze in a semantic way.
- **Context Dimensions:** Add fields to group or segment embedding results into categories.
- **Context Aggregates:** Add aggregated fields that summarize data for similar records in the AI visual. This allows the AI visual to better answer questions related to quantities, distributions, and comparisons.
- **Tooltip:** Define the source information to be included in the response tooltip. This information appears when the user hovers over the response's Info icon, but it is not sent to the completion service.
- **Limit:** Define the maximum number of data rows retrieved from the vector database and analyzed.

b. Click **REFRESH VISUAL**.

c. [Optional] If you are using similarity search, you can configure embedding and completion related settings. Click **Settings Vector Search** from the right-side **VISUAL** menu to:

- Set the maximum number of tokens. You can use 0 or a negative value to disable this setting
- Change the default profile
- Provide a template for vector search responses



**Note:** If you are using SQL query as the AI approach, the Vector Search menu is disabled.

5. Click **Settings Completion** from the right-side **VISUAL** menu to configure completion.

You can:

- Change the selected profile.
- Set the maximum number of tokens. If exceeded, the request is not sent to the service and an error message is displayed.
- Choose a context overflow policy that defines how to handle situations where the length of generated tokens exceeds the context window size:
  - **Throw an error:** Raises an error when the conversation length exceeds the defined context window.
  - **Remove old conversation first:** Automatically manages conversation length by removing old tokens.
  - **Truncate embedding context first:** Truncates the embedding context, retaining the latest tokens.
- Specify the context placeholder text that is used in the search results when data is missing or empty. If set, the text replaces empty values, if left blank, empty values are removed.
- Specify the question prompt, which is the formatting of the user question.
- If you are using SQL query, you also have the option to provide custom instructions for formatting SQL query results. These instructions guide how data analysis results are presented to the users.



**Note:** If you are using similarity search, the SQL result formatting instructions field is not available.

6. Click **Settings Display** from the right-side **VISUAL** menu to configure how the visual is displayed.

- Customize the chat welcome message, which is displayed as the first chat message from the AI visual.
- Set the display format for the conversation: plain text or markdown

7. Click **SAVE**.

## Using an AI visual



The AI visual allows you to explore datasets through natural language queries. You can ask questions by typing or speaking, review detailed execution steps to understand how responses are generated, and share parameters across visuals to keep dashboards synchronized.

### Interacting with the AI visual

Once the AI visual is configured, you can begin exploring your data through conversational queries. You can ask questions about your data using voice or text. The AI visual generates responses based on the connected dataset,



making it easy to gain insights using natural language. The AI visual uses the configured approach to generate responses that directly reference the underlying dataset.

- Text input: Type your question into the input field and click SEND to submit the query. The AI visual processes your question and returns a relevant response based on the dataset.
-  Speech input: Click  to ask a question using your voice. Your speech is converted to text and entered into the input field. Click SEND to submit the query.
- Follow-up queries: Continue the conversation by asking follow-up questions, refining or extending your original query, using either voice or text input.

### Viewing response details

You can view detailed information about how the AI visual generated a response. Execution details provide a transparent, step-by-step view of how the AI visual generated the response. This summary can help you understand exactly how your queries are processed and the data used in the analysis or to confirm that data sources, filters, and calculations are accurate before making decisions based on the output.

You can also use it for debugging purposes, to identify where a query or analysis may have produced unexpected results.

To view the response generation details, click  next to the reply. The Execution Details modal shows:

- Overview – Summary information of AI approach, completion profile, dataset details, filters applied, steps and duration of execution, response length, and the original question.



#### Important:

The option to select between AI approaches is available starting with Cloudera Data Visualization 8.0.6. If you are using AI visual in an earlier product version, you can only view visuals on embeddings-supported connections and use the similarity search feature.

- Execution Steps – A breakdown of how the response was generated
  - Checking Previous Data – determines whether earlier queries already contain the needed information
  - Collecting Dataset Information and Filters – shows dataset details and applied dashboard filters
  - Generating SQL – shows the generated query and visual configuration
  - Executing Query – shows the query execution results
  - Analyzing Results – provides the natural language summary of the query results


You can expand each step to view the associated data, dataset information, filters, or query results.

To keep a copy of the execution details, click Download.

### Sharing parameters

When using an AI visual to query the underlying dataset, the generated parameters can be shared with other visuals on the dashboard to enable cross-filtering.

Sharing parameters allows you to explore relationships between different data points quickly. When you change a shared parameter, all dependent visuals on the dashboard update automatically. This feature helps synchronize multiple visuals to reflect the same subset of data, eliminating the need to adjust each visual manually. By applying the same filter across multiple visuals at once, sharing parameters saves time and ensures consistency, making it easier to analyze and compare related data points.

1. Open the Share Parameters modal by clicking  next to the reply.

The dialog lists available parameters. Each parameter shows column and values information.

2. Select the parameters you want to share.

You can use Select All or Select None if multiple parameters are available.

3. [Optional] Include null values.

Enable the toggle if you want null or empty results from the AI query included in the shared parameters, allowing other visuals to filter for missing or empty data.

4. Click SHARE PARAMETERS to apply parameter sharing.

You can click Cancel if needed to close the dialog without making changes.

## Shelves for AI visual

Overview of shelves for Cloudera Data Visualization AI visual.

The AI visual supports the following shelves:

### Embeddings

The Embeddings shelf is designed for the vector database comparisons. The user input is vectorized and compared to the defined embeddings to retrieve rows containing the most similar embeddings. The first field that contains results is returned.

Add a Dimension or Measures vector field that contains embeddings.

This is a mandatory shelf that accepts multiple fields.

### Embedding Context

The Embedding Context shelf allows you to add fields that you want to send as part of the chat prompt in a formatted manner, incorporating all embedding context data.

This is a mandatory and sensitive shelf that accepts multiple fields. For information on how to mark a dataset field as 'Sensitive' to restrict its usage in specific visual shelves, see *Editing dataset fields*.

### Context Aggregates

The Context Aggregates shelf allows you to include aggregated fields that summarize data for similar records in the AI visual. You can use this shelf to enhance data insights by providing more accurate responses to questions involving quantities, distributions, or comparisons.



#### Note:

Only aggregated fields are supported. Adding non-aggregated fields will result in an error when refreshing the visual or sending a question.

Aggregation is performed on rows that share the same Dimension, Tooltip, and Vector fields. By including Context Aggregates, you ensure that numeric values (such as counts, sums, or averages) are calculated across similar records, rather than returning individual row-level results that may not provide meaningful insights.

### Tooltip

The Tooltip shelf facilitates adding a field for source information to be shown along the displayed results.



**Note:** The Tooltip shelf is limited to one field for the AI visual type.

### Limit

This setting defines the maximum number of data rows that are processed by the visual.

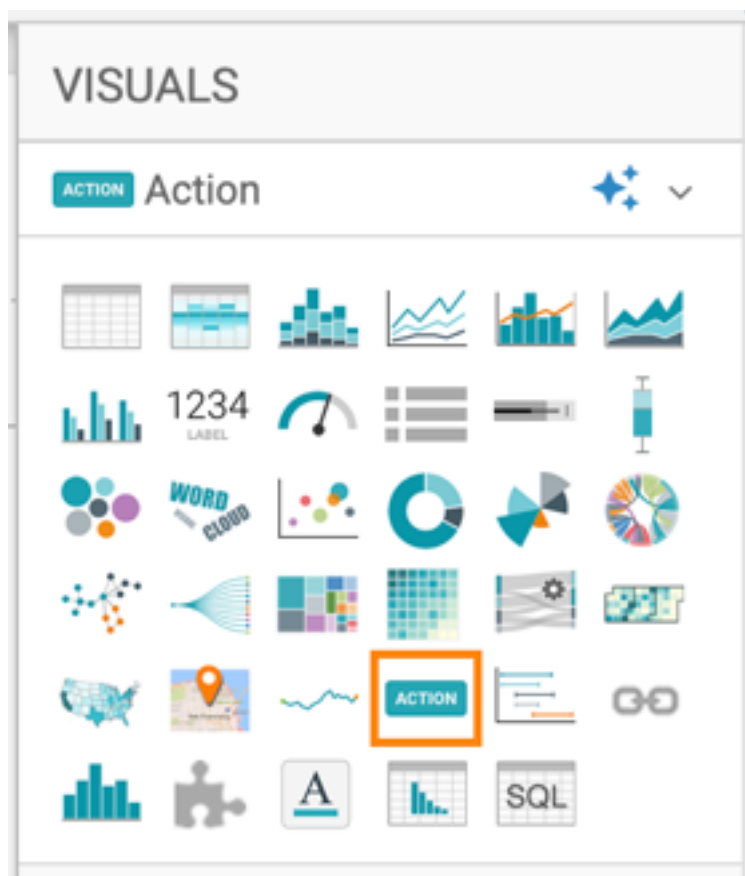



## Timeline

Cloudera Data Visualization allows you to create Timeline visuals. Timelines are graphical representations of activities/events displayed against time.

### About this task

In a Timeline visual, each activity/event is represented by a bar of a time period along a suitable time scale. You need two different timestamps to define the projection of the time period. The starting point of the bar reflects the start date, the end point reflects the end date, and the length of the bar corresponds to the duration of the activity.

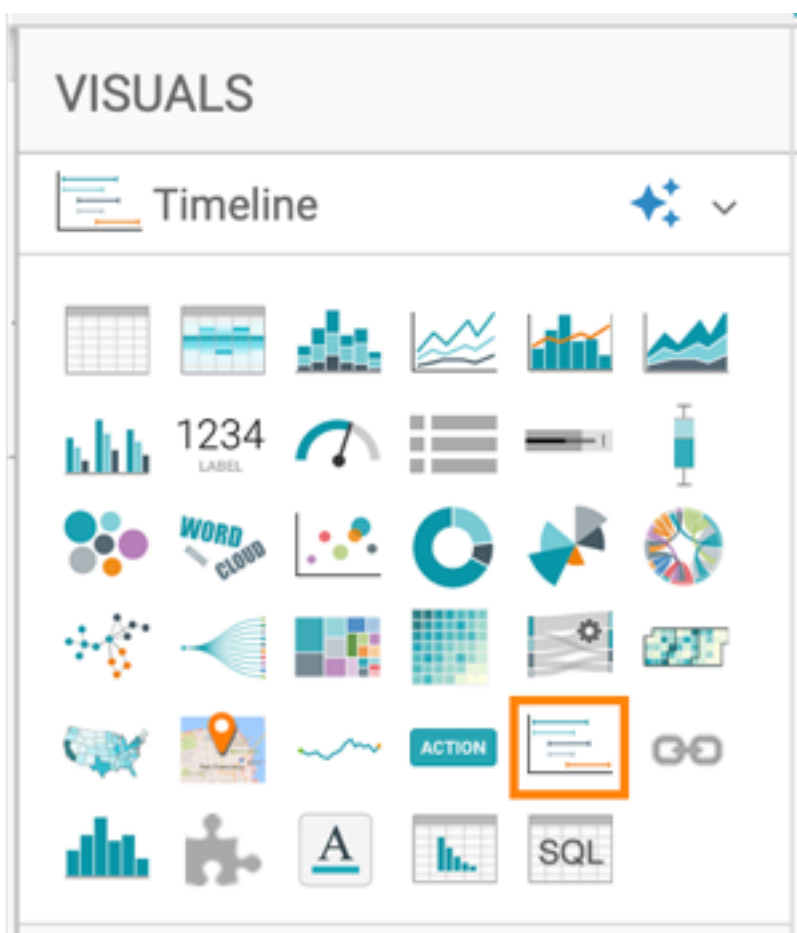

## Histograms

You can create Histogram visuals in Cloudera Data Visualization. Histograms enable the quick visual analysis of numerical data distribution. They provide an estimate of the frequency distribution of a continuous quantitative variable, accomplished by splitting it into consecutive, non-overlapping intervals, referred to as "buckets".

### About this task



**Note:** Histograms can only be plotted for bare metrics, not aggregates. For example, you can plot a histogram for population, not for avg(population).

To work around this limitation, first save the calculated metric as derived data, and then use this field as a measure in a histogram. See *Derived data*.

When you change the number of buckets (the default is 10), Cloudera Data Visualization determines the data range and splits it equally among the buckets, groups the metric into these buckets, and plots vertical bars to represent it.

Histograms support both normalized and cumulative forms, and may be used in a trellis formation.

The following steps demonstrate how to create a new histogram visual on the World Life Expectancy dataset.

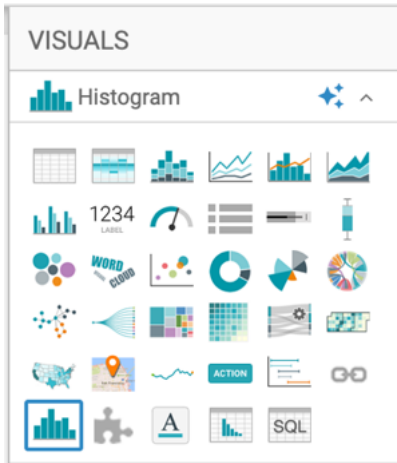

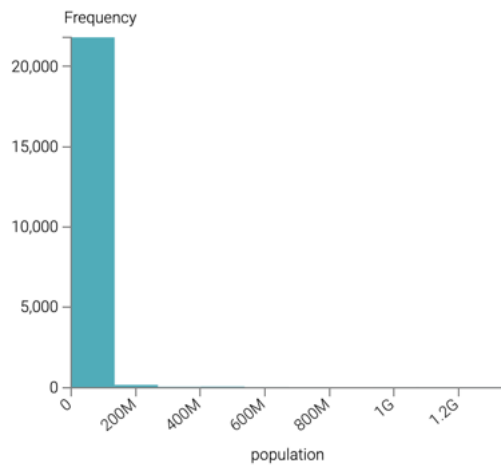

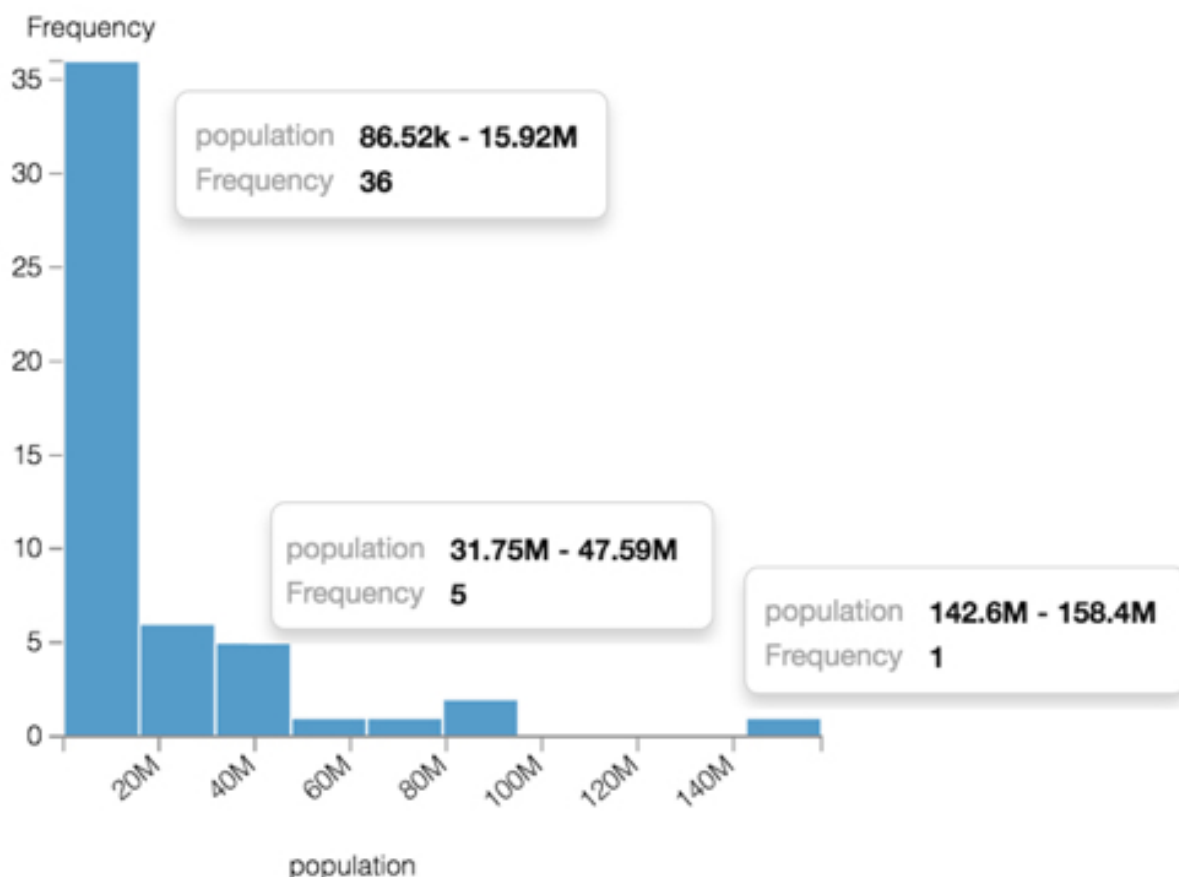

Increasing the bucket count results in narrower buckets, meaning each bucket represents a smaller range of values. This can provide a more detailed view of the data distribution. Conversely, reducing the bucket count widens each bucket, simplifying the visualization and giving a broader overview.

The following example shows a histogram with 10 buckets compared to a histogram with 20 buckets. You can see how doubling the number of buckets reduces the range of values in each bucket by half, providing a more granular look at data distribution.



## Specifying data range

You can specify the exact portion of your dataset to visualize, allowing you to focus on specific data intervals. This is especially useful for narrowing in on relevant subsets without including outliers or unnecessary values.

### Procedure

1. On the right side of the Dashboard Designer, go to the VISUAL menu and click Settings.
2. In the Settings menu, click Basic to expand its options.

3. Define the range of values to focus on for your histogram.
  - a) In the Range - min field, enter the minimum value for your range.  
This will be the starting point for the histogram's x-axis.
  - b) In the Range - max field, enter the maximum value for your range.  
This will define the endpoint for the histogram's x-axis.

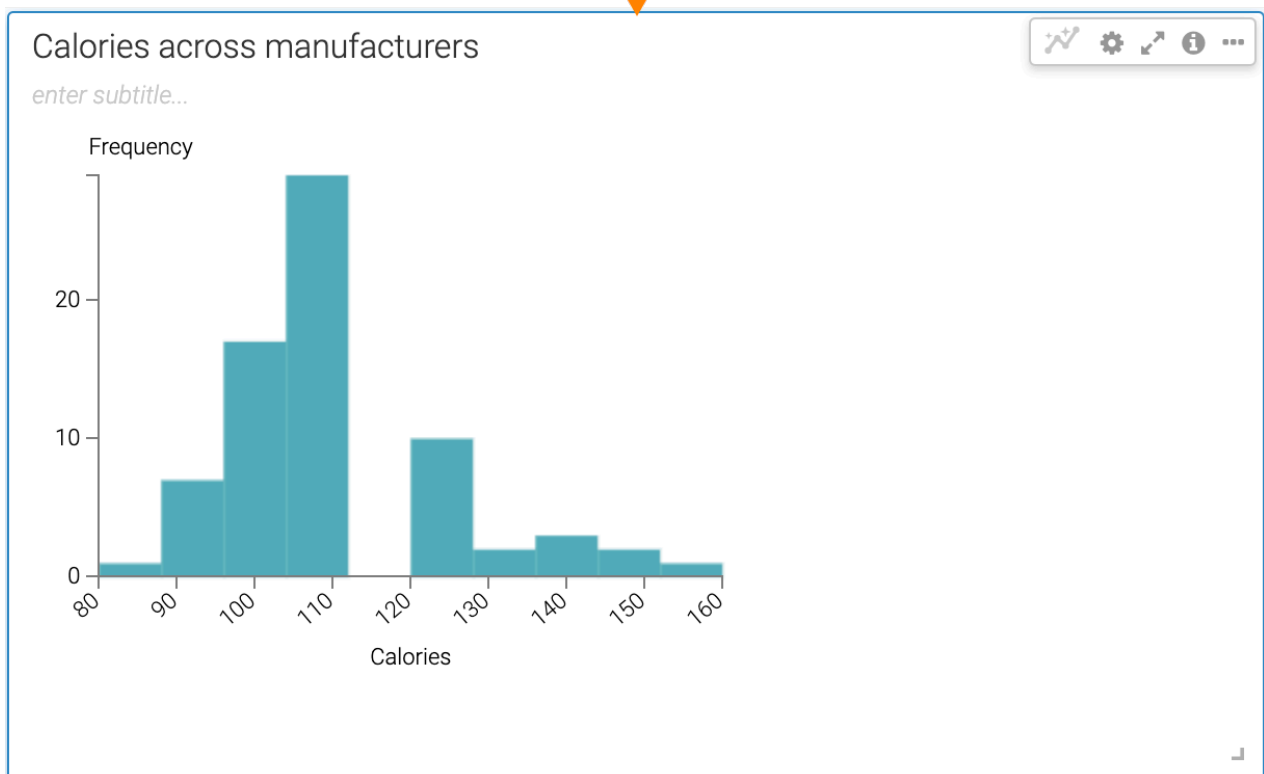
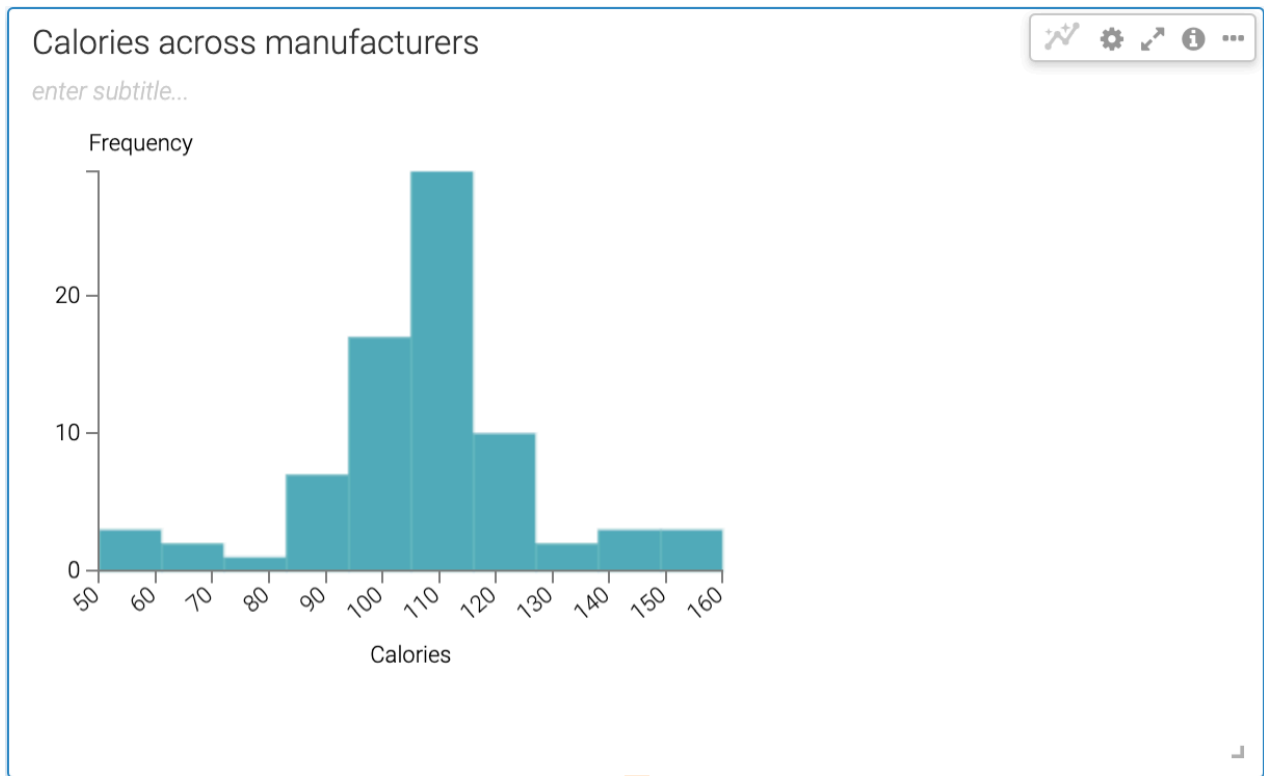
After setting these values, the histogram will automatically update to display only the data within the specified range. You can adjust the values as needed to explore different parts of your dataset.

### Example

Using the range setting, you can easily control the focus of your histogram, allowing you to isolate and analyze specific intervals of your data.



The following example shows a histogram with a wider range compared to a histogram with narrower range. You can see how adjusting the range changes the histogram's appearance by displaying more or fewer data points.

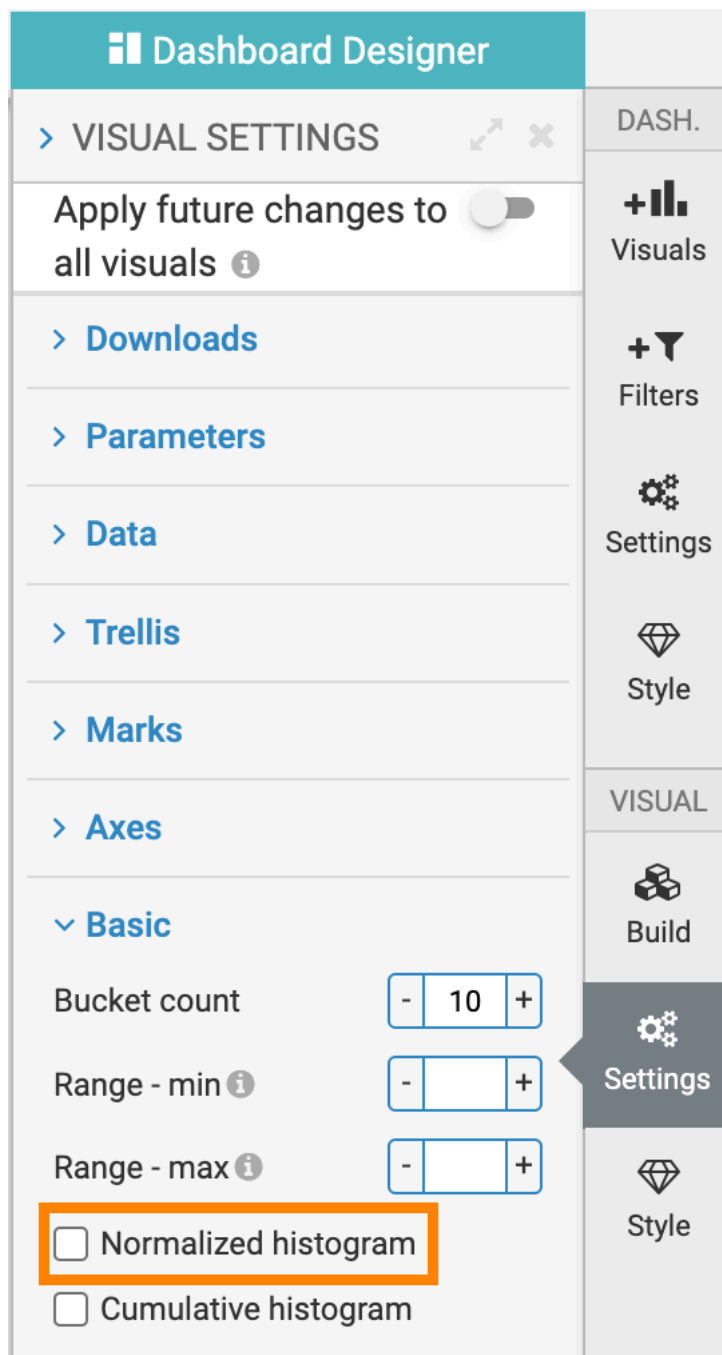


## Normalizing the histogram

By default, the vertical axis of a histogram represents the count of values that map to a particular bucket. To represent these values as percentages of the total, you can normalize the histogram. This adjustment changes the histogram counts so they sum to 1, with each bar representing the proportionate frequency.

### Procedure

1. On the right side of the Dashboard Designer, go to the VISUAL menu and click Settings.
2. In the Settings menu, click Basic to expand its options.
3. Select the Normalized histogram option.



### Example

The following image compares two versions of a histogram. In the standard histogram (top), the vertical axis and tooltips display raw counts. In the normalized histogram (bottom), the vertical axis and tooltips show values as percentages, indicating the relative frequency of each bucket.



### Using the cumulative option

By default, a histogram displays the count or frequency for each bucket individually. Enabling the cumulative option adjusts the histogram so that each bucket's count or frequency is added to the previous total. As a result, the right-most bucket shows the total count or 1 (100%) if the histogram is normalized.

### Procedure

1. On the right side of the Dashboard Designer, go to the VISUAL menu and click Settings.
2. In the Settings menu, click Basic to expand its options.

3. Select the Cumulative histogram option.

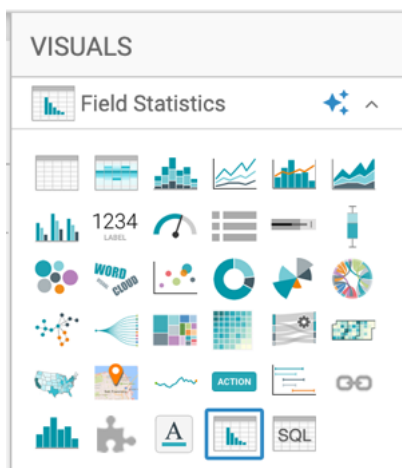


## Field statistics

Cloudera Data Visualization enables you to create Field statistics visuals. Field statistics visuals describe the dataset in statistical terms. They work across all data connections, and on datasets that contain table joins.

### Procedure

1. Start a new visual based on the US County Population dataset.  
For instructions, see *Creating a visual*.
2. Select Field Statistics in the VISUALS menu.



The visual appears as a table that shows the following statistical information for each field in the dataset.

- Actions column contains some widgets for making changes to the appearance of the table.
- Field column indicates the name of the dataset field, and provides an option to include only a limited number of top values, when applicable.
- Type column indicates the data type of the dataset field.
- Distinct Values column reports the number of distinct values for this field. This is typically a good indication of the field's suitability as a dimension.
- Minimum column reports the smallest (lowest) value in the dataset field. For strings, this would be the 'least' in alphabetical sort.

In this example, for field `stname` (state name), this would be Alabama, and for field `ctname` (county name), this would be Abbeville County.



























- Maximum column reports the largest (highest) value in the dataset field. For strings, this would be the 'greatest' in alphabetical sort.

In this example, for field `stname` (state name), this would be Wyoming, and for field `ctname` (county name), this would be Zieback County.

- Detail column holds a graphic that is either a bar chart of top K values, or a distribution histogram of these values, for each column.

3. You can make changes to the visual through the following actions:

- In the Actions column, click the (double up) icon to move the field to the very top of the table.
- In the Actions column, click the (up) icon to move the field up one row in the table.
- In the Actions column, click the (down) icon to move the field down one row in the table.
- In the Actions column, click the (trash) icon to remove the field from the table.
- In the Field column, toggle between:
  - Change to top k to change the Detail column to show a bar representation of the top 20 values (default) for the dataset field
  - Change to histogram to change the Detail column to show a distribution histogram for the dataset field

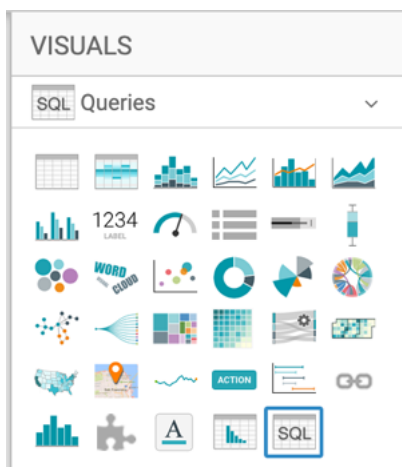
